

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#### **Neighbor to Neighbor**

Create an Environment that Fosters Reading in the Home One of the easiest and most important activities you can do with children is to read to them out loud. This is true for preschool aged children, including those who are reading independently. Children who are read to frequently, tend to become superior readers and also end up doing better in school than children who are read to infrequently.

Educators have discovered that reading stimulates the imagination, enhances children's vocabularies, introduces them to components of stories; (i.e., characters, plots, action, and sequence), and provides them with

A child's environment has a strong influence on his or her desire to learn. Children who are exposed to books and reading from a very young age are more likely to express an interest in reading at a later stage.

Listed below are action steps to take to help encourage your child's involvement in reading:

Build up a collection of children's printed materials: Children will show more interest in reading if books and other print materials are readily available. Begin collecting a variety of children's books and magazines and keep them in convenient places. School age children are also beginning to parents are Margarita Gonzalez of pay more attention to current events. There are a number of junior versions' of popular magazines that appeal to children's interest (e.g., Sports'

Illustrated for Kids.) Visit the Library: Public libraries are great resources for children's print Felicita Reyna of Post, Victor and materials. Make frequent visit's to the library. Check out some books and allow children to explore the vast selection of reading materials. Encourage, children with parent's support to obtain a library card in the child's name. Set aside a special time for reading each day: Children will come to expeqt and look forward to the daily reading time if you allow a consistent schedule.

> Read books that peak children's curiosity: Books allow children to use their imaginations to explore people, places, and things that go beyond their limited life experiences.

> Parents, take the opportunity to also read to your children on a regular basis

Defer questions until after you finish reading: If possible, when you are reading aloud, especially to school age children, have them hold their questions until you are finished reading. This can help children focus more on the content of the story.

Stop reading at a suspenseful point in the book: Reading a good book can be exciting. Every now and then, time it just right so your reading time is over about the same time that you arrive at a spot where something exciting is about to happen in the book. Children will be very eager to hear what is going to happen the next day!

#### **Dorothy Austin Dennis**

Services for Mrs. Wiley Bert Dennis were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 25, 2004, in Johnsonís Funeral Home with the Rev. Ben Hubert and the Rev. Karen Schmeltekoph officiating. Burial followed in the Fairmount Cemetery.

She died Feb. 23. Born Dorothy Lee Austin on March 15, 1915, in San Angelo to Rose and Robert Austin, she was the granddaughter of H.R. Rowlands and J.J. Austins, some of the first citizens of Tom Green County. She attended San Angelo schools, graduating from Central High, and attended San Angelo Junior College and

San Angelo Business College. Later, she attended Texas Tech University. For five years she served as secretary to Louis L. Farr Jr., manager of the Sawyer Cattle Co. (Bar S Ranch).

On Sept. 9, 1938, she married Wiley Bert Dennis. The couple moved to Pecos County where the Dennis brothers operated a ranching business. They leased the Maud S. Kincaid (Saenger) Ranch where the couple resided for five years. In 1943, they purchased a ranch in Borden County.

Active in both ranch and community activities, she did research on the histories of Borden County ranches and families for the Borden County Historical Society. Her findings were published in several historical magazines. She served as president of the Altrurian Daughtersí Club in Snyder and in 1963 was president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisersí Auxiliary. She worked closely with the Miss Wool of Texas program and was named an honorary member of the auxiliary. While her children were in


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In 1997, she published her autobiography, iIn Pursuit of Happiness.î The book chronicles her memories of life in San Angelo and as a ranch wife in Pecos and Borden counties.

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

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## On God's Word

God Protects His Child...Matthew 2:12-23

Last week we looked at the arrival of the Magi that they might pay homage to the "King of the Jews." While en-route to Bethlehem they were filled with great joy because they saw "his star" (Jupiter) reach its highest ecliptic point just over where Jesus lived. Upon their arrival they saw the "young child" in a house with his mother Mary. As pre-determined, they gave gifts to Jesus and paid him proper homage as the "King of the Jews." We now continue with Matthew 2:12-23.

"And being warned of God in a dream that they should not return to Herod, they departed into their own country another way." God is so loving and gracious to all who reverence Him. The Magians were not Israelites. Yet they were humble to the signs in the heavens. They were meek to search out the scriptures and begin their journey to Jerusalem and ultimately to Bethlehem. Even their gifts of treasures were not held back. And they showed proper respect to the young Child. God looks upon the heart.

Continuing with 2:13, "And when they were departed, behold, the angel of the Lord appeareth to Joseph in a dream, saying, "Arise, and take the young child and his mother, and flee into Egypt, and be thou there until I bring thee word: for Herod will seek the young child to destroy him. When he arose, he took the young child and his mother by night, and departed into Egypt: And was there until the death of Herod, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying, 'Out of Egypt have I called my son." There should be no doubt that Joseph was a man after God's own heart. He put God and His word first on his list of priorities.

"Then Herod, when he saw that he was mocked of the wise men [Magi from the east], was exceeding wroth, and sent forth, and slew all the children that were in Bethlehem, and in all the coasts thereof, from two years old and under, according to the time which he had diligently enquired of the wise men." There it is...right in God's word. Herod discovered that the child was around two years old when he questioned the Magi (recorded in verse 7). His choice of two years and under was not random, but a result of a diligent enquiry into the Magi's astronomical observations. We can also note that this event was one of many spiritual attempts by the devil to kill the seed of the woman prophesied of in Genesis 3:15.

We continue with Matthew 2:17, "Then was fulfilled that which was spoken by Jeremy [Jeremiah] the prophet, saying, 'In Rama was there a voice heard, lamentation, and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children, and would not be comforted, because they are not."

"But when Herod was dead, behold, an angel of the Lord appeareth in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, saying, 'Arise, and take the young child and his mother, and go into the land of Israel: for they are dead which sought the young child's life.' And he arose, and took the young child and his mother, and came into the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus did reign in Judea in the room of his father Herod, he was afraid to go thither: notwithstanding, being warned of God in a dream, he turned aside into the parts of Galilee: And he came and dwelt in a city called Nazareth: that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by the prophets, 'He shall be called a Nazarene." Once again, Joseph received God's word and meekly moved. We can see throughout these accounts that God truly picked the best of His people to raise His beloved child Jesus Christ. They put God's will first in their lives. Their example of faithfulness and meekness was seen in Jesus' life when he said, "...nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt." (Matthew 26:37-46).

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
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


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


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

To speak in terms of government's "throwing an ever-greater menu of options at the American people" is to beg the question: should government have the power to constrict peaceful activities in the first place? 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# Hating Mel

Here's a no spin review of Mel Gibson's movie "The Passion of the Christ," which opens on Ash Wednesday (2/25). First off, the film is a faithful rendition of the execution of Jesus according to the four Gospels. Only twice does Gibson stray from Scripture. The initial departure is to introduce Satan into the narrative; that does not happen in the Bible. Second, Gibson beefs up the role of Simon of Cyrene, the Jew who was forced by the Romans to carry Jesus' cross when he could no longer do it.

Simon emerges as a heroic figure.

The film runs two hours, and at least half of it is explicitly violent. The pain Jesus endured at the hands of the brutal Roman soldiers became numbing to watch after a while, at least to me. Gibson clearly wants the audience to be uncomfortable because the torture scenes are unrelenting. This kind of exposition, of course, is not for everyone.

If you are familiar with the writings of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, nothing in the film's script will surprise you. There are Jewish villains and Jewish heroes. Most of the Romans are awful. The storyline does not depart from traditional Christian teaching. Yet the movie and Gibson himself continue to be viciously attacked

Even Abraham Foxman, the militant leader of the Anti-Defamation League, now admits the film is not anti-Semitic. Yet Foxman continues to object to it on the basis of what it might do. And that's the crux of this matter. Some Jews believe persecution is just a shout away, to quote Mick Jagger. This prospective must be respected. For thousands of years Jews have been treated with brutality and disrespect, often by the followers of Jesus.

So fair-minded people can understand the emotion that some Jews feel when they hear that a Jewish character, Judas, betrays Jesus and another Jewish character, Caiphas, agitates for his death in the movie. The apprehension is real and understandable, but it is wrong to use it as an excuse to vilify a man who wants to tell a scriptural story that he believes illustrates his faith.

As the Muslim killers on 9/11 and the pedophile Catholic priests prove, there are bad people in all religions. Rational individuals understand although evil has many faces, it does not reside in any particular race. Even at the height of Third Reich atrocities, there were good Germans.

People who hate Jews don't need a movie to fuel their neurosis. Haters will find a way. And ironically, Mel Gibson's movie is about love. Christians believe Jesus loved mankind so much that he willingly gave up his life to give human beings redemption from their failings. Also, please remember that Jesus, above all, was a Jew.

The brutal attacks on Gibson may themselves create bad will. Most Americans who see this movie, I believe, will respect Gibson for making it. They may well see the defamation that has been heaped on him as grossly unfair.



So I know the guy a bit, and I know his passion is to persuade people that Jesus was a man to be admired and imitated. It is Gibson's prerogative to use the Gospels to make that point. It is also the prerogative of his critics to frown on the project. But trying to destroy the man's reputation is something else. It reminds me of Roman justice: Guilt or innocence really didn't matter as long as the harsh

### County considers proposals for Giles W. Dalby facility contract

Garza County officials are seeking RFPs (requests for proposals) for the operation, maintenance and management of the Giles W. Dalby Correctional Facility.

The contract with the facility's current manager is set to expire soon, and the court will accept proposals from interested parties through 2 p.m. March 18. Proposals are being accepted in the county judge's office.

Proposal requirements include:

iAdraft operation and management agreement that provides for compliance with state law.

i Proof of financial ability iwhich does not obligate the tax revenues of Garza Countyî and ievidence of financing ability for the entire projectO.î "Evidence of the sheriff's role and function in the operation and management plan. (According to the RFP documentation, state law requires the sheriff to approve any such contract.)

i Description of the type and amount of liability insurance coverage relative to property, personnel and operational liability.

ïAn overview of various aspects relating to the proposal, including benefits to Garza County, the City of Post and the ipeople/business of Garza County.i County officials may reject any or all proposals and are not bound to accept the lowest bid if the proposal is not considered to be in the best interest of Garza County, according to the RFP.

Additionally, the operator selected will be required to make available to Garza County a maximum of 14 beds in the unit. Cost for the first 10 beds will be \$5 per bed per day, while the remaining beds will carry a cost of \$25 per bed per day, according to the RFP. County inmates placed in these beds must be compatible in classification with other inmates housed in the facility in accordance with state standards.

The management bid will be awarded late next month.

turned to the accident scene in an effort to reconstruct the events. Using vehicle locations marked on the day of the pileup, troopers used vehicles similar in size to those involved and placed them in the marked areas. DPS aircraft from Midland was flown in to take aerial photos.




