Travis' withdrawal came too late for the district to avoid the election, according to district administrator Tanya Boucher. Travis' along with that of challenger Fred Howell, who also filed to run for the at-large board position.

According to Section 145.094 of the Texas Election Code, a candidate's name can be omitted from the ballot only if the candidate withdraws prior to the deadline for withdrawal.

A candidate who does not file the withdrawal prior to deadline essentially has an "ineffective" withdrawal, Section 145.001 of the code states. "The candidate's name will remain on the ballot, and any votes cast for that candidate must be counted in the regular manner. If the candidate wins, he or she may take office, if still in compliance with eligibility requirements."

Travis did not return a telephone call made to his home Tuesday morning.

Board president Ray Bagby declined to comment on the matter.

A total of three positions are slated to be filled in the May 15 health care district election. Incumbents Bagby and Edna Owens, representing Precincts 2 and 1 respectively, are running unopposed. Deadline to register to vote in the election is today, April 15. Early voting in the election will run April 28 through May 11.

Slower speed limit set for 380...

#### by Wes Burnett

A slower speed limit on U.S. Hwy 380 west of the Post Middle School will be imposed following action last week by the Post City Council. Mayor Archie Gill explained to council members that the current 40 mph is a danger to children walking to and from school along a stretch of U.S. Hwy 380.

The new speed limit will be posted as 30 mph from Avenue R to the posted school zone. The change will take affect after the council follows normal procedures for revising its city ordinance.

The council also authorized city manager Fred Stephens to prepare a plan to expand the landfill operation. This will involve surveying and purchasing additional property.

An agreement was reached with property owner Gene Posey regarding cleaning up accumulated materials at his residence. Posey agreed to complete the cleanup by September 1.

The council approved the termination of a lease with Ivan Line on city-owned land near the landfill. The land will be returned to natural vegetation and allowed to develop natural cover.

Council members expressed support for the city manager to continue administrative efforts to seek additional water supplies in anticipation of continuing decline in the water supply at White River Lake. Currently Post receives 66 percent of its water from White River and 33 percent from Slaton. A resolution expressing opposition to Governor Rick Perry's latest school financing proposal was approved by the council. Council agreed with Mayor Gill's observation that the proposal would hinder the ability of the city to raise appropriate tax to support its basic needs. The May 15 election was formally cancelled, following notification that all candidates for the election were unopposed.





### **Caregiving: Identifying Need**

Caregivers come from all walks of life. Whether you are a paid professional, trained volunteer or a valued friend or family member, you may be charged with the care of another individual. Caring for another person is not an easy task and may be doubly harder when caregiving is a part of other responsibilities.

Caregiving involves meeting one or more of the four major needs one might have in his life: physical, emotional, social and financial. The role a caregiver may play in someone's life may be dramatically different depending on which need or needs must be addressed.

Physical needs may involve things such as nutrition, bathing, shopping and the ability to move around the home or other living space. Emotional needs may include a sense of self-worth or being loved. A care recipient with a debilitating illness may be grieving over losing independence.

An effective caregiver will address the grief issues and find ways to enhance independence. Social interaction is very important for individual well-being. The caregiver may be the only regular contact that a care recipient has.

Financial needs impact many other areas including health, housing and feelings of security. The caregiver's primary responsibility is to make sure that all bases are covered \* that the care recipient is not a danger to himself or others.

Ideally, a person needing assistance with personal care would ask for help. However, this is not always the case. The question then becomes how to tell if someone needs help or even how do I know if I need help.

One of the main concerns should be overall functioning and wellbeing. Ask yourself if this person functions well enough to continue to live unassisted. If you are unsure, think about other things that may affect function and independence such as taking medications on a regular basis.

Functional impairment is judged based on ability to perform Activities of Daily Living (ADLs), such as bathing and toileting, and, to an extent, (IADLs), such as grocery shopping or cleaning house. Caregivers often find that there are many things to be considered when evaluating the capabilities of another person.


Another indicator may be appearance and hygiene \* some things to consider:

- Have teeth been brushed?
- Does the person appear clean?
- Are clothes clean?
- Is clothing appropriate?

Answers to these questions give clues not only about personal care abilities but also interest in self-care. Lack of interest in self-care may be an indicator of depression, which can affect decision-making and could lead to a health crisis.

Finance issues are very much a part of evaluating need for additional care. You must consider whether or not an individual has the ability to make sound financial decisions as well as whether or not he is able to pay bills when they are due. You and your care recipient must also decide if he can afford to live on his current income as well as meet future needs. This will help determine whether the level of care needed to remain at home may be afforded.



Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of his year.

#### Who must file a rendition?

You must file a randition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you ren-der late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rend-tion, you could be hit with a 10 to 60% penalty.

### Are there any advantages to you?

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The oppraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the oppraisal review board.
- record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will a the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong ess, the law still holds you responsible for paying your s on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2003. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2004.

#### What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2004 renditions is April 18. You can get an automatic extansion to May 15 H you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The ohlef appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

> "Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value of their land rather than on market value. This "producti ity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber-not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substanoperty tax eavings

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal of you district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2004 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

#### Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mell.
