Hospital makes pledge

First pizza, now medical care: The emergency room at Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn, Mich., is guaranteeing 30-minute service.

If customers don't see a doctor within that time, they will get an apology and free movie passes.

The guarantee, which will be posted on two billboards and mailed to 60,000 Dearborn-area residents, is the hospital's response to long waits for emergency care.

Oakwood is a full-service teaching hospital that has served Dearborn and surrounding communities for almost 50 years.

Hospital officials said the new guarantee won't compromise quality. Those patients most urgently in need of care will still be seen immediately.

Cheese craving foils burglar

A man was charged with burglarizing the home of a childhood friend after allegedly being linked to the crime by cheese wrappers left on a kitchen counter.

County set to approve jail project Aug. 14

Bailey County Judge Marilyn Cox said Thursday's trip by county and city officials to visit a jail in Winkler County, Texas, left them all impressed and anxious to have a similar facility here.

"Everybody was excited about it, and it will be on our agenda Monday (Aug. 14)," she said.

Making the trip were commissioners C.E. Grant, Jerry Damron and Butch Vandiver; County Clerk Sherri Harrison, a member of the steering committee studying a proposal for a prison in Bailey County; County Sheriff Chance Coberley; City Manager Rick Hanna; and City Police Chief Don Carter.

They were met in Kermit by James Parkey of Corplan, the com-

pany that would build both the jail and the prison, if the prison project becomes reality.

The jail project was offered to Bailey County as a result of Corplan's working with local officials and also the company's impression of the favorable turnout at a public meeting held months ago.

Cox expressed appreciation to the Muleshoe City Council for

bringing Hanna to Muleshoe.

"He was the one who brought us this (prison) project, and he has been there every step of the way," she said.

"It's true that it is the county's project, but without his expertise and knowing who to talk to when, we wouldn't even know there was a project available. I just appreciate so much the council hiring him."

Muleshoe youths build footbridge at wildlife refuge

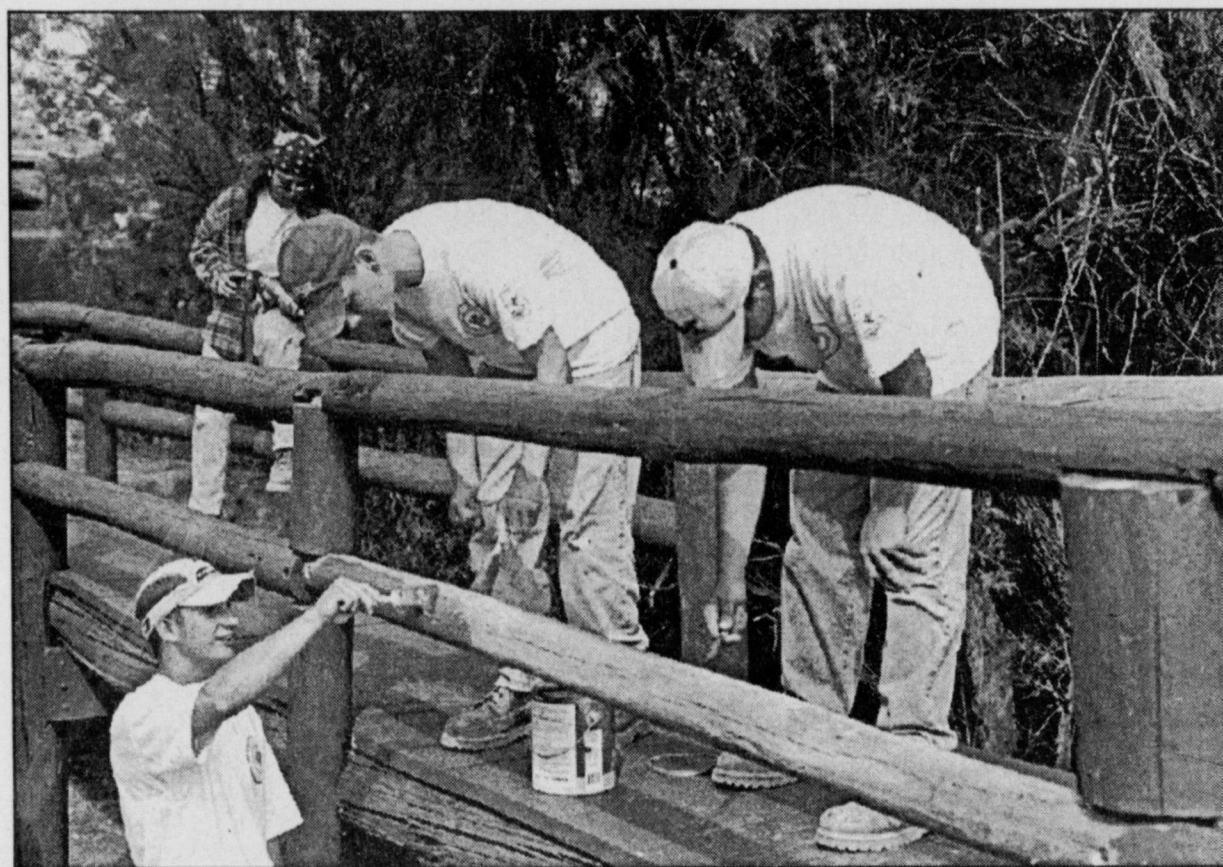

She says life has sometimes been hectic, but still mostly happy, living near Lariat and commuting to work in Muleshoe.

Joy Stancell and her husband, Leamon, still live on the farm where they have lived since their marriage in 1953.

She has been activity director at Muleshoe Area Healthcare Center for more than 20 years — longer than anyone else has served in that capacity.

People who know her say she is not only part of the glue that holds the nursing home together, but that whoever named her Joy certainly picked the right name.

She says it still pleases her to be able to recognize some need of one of the nursing-home residents and then find some way to fill it.

This is a far cry from when she began her job: She had never even visited a nursing home. After a one-week apprenticeship with her predecessor, Nonnie Howard, she was on her own in her new world.

She said one of the first things that impressed her about working there was how the residents tend to be grateful for anything someone does

One of her main aims, she says, is to make the elderly feel good about themselves.

Observing her with residents of the nursing home, it seems obvious from the smiles of the residents that Stancell's efforts are appreciated.

She also said she continues to be amazed at how residents of Muleshoe and surrounding communities turn out as volunteers for the nursing home.

Even in her personal life, she lists interaction with people as being at the top of her list — but in that case, her four children and seven grandchildren take priority.

Those visits come fairly frequently, since the children all live fairly close — Debbie Hensley in Levelland, Wendy Lavo and Jennifer Garza, both of Levelland, and Wayde Stancell of Snyder.

Stancell, who grew up in Lariat as the daughter of the postmistress, is a member of 16th and D Church of Christ.

The residents' affection for her is evident in their smiles when they look at her and in the way they say her name.

In fact, you could say she's the "joy" of their lives.

Armyworms affect war on weevils in Muleshoe area

As had already happened in the Littlefield and Springlake areas, the region's infestation of beet armyworms has changed the tactics of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation in the Muleshoe area.

After discussion with Program Director Charles Allen, zone manager Terry Futch of Muleshoe announced that the new treatment trigger would be set at three trapped weevils per 40-acre field.

The increase will reduce the number of acres being treated with pesticides in order to preserve beneficial insects that prey on the beet armyworm.

The program will continue to make new adjustments as needed, Allen said.

Football tickets on sale Aug. 14

Anyone who holds reserved season tickets for the Muleshoe Mules' 2000 season may pick up their tickets at the school business office, 514 W. Avenue G, beginning Aug. 14. The tickets will remain available until Aug. 25.

Those whose names appear on the chart may pick up their tickets in person, by mail with the ticket holder's personal check, or via a third party if the tickets are purchased with the ticket holder's personal check.

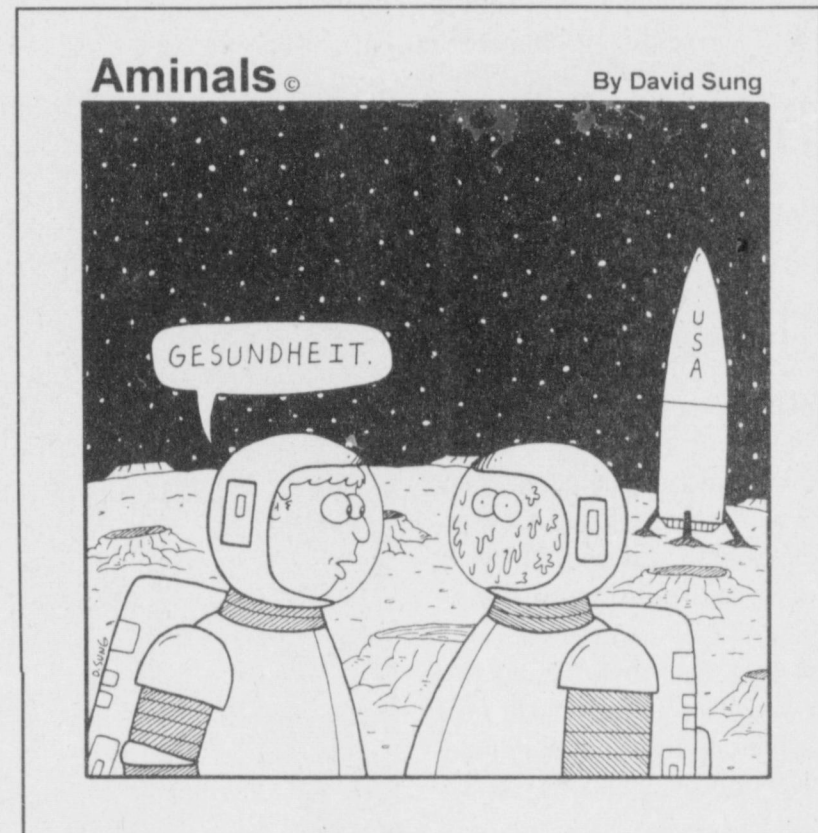

It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value. This notice contains a summary of actual effective and rollback tax rates' calculations. 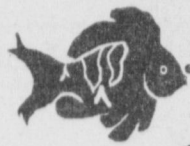

A primary concern of the youth corps staff is safety. The students receive safety equipment such as safety goggles, hard hats or gloves, depending on the project, and are supervised by the project leader.

Clapp said the number of applicants received for similar projects in the past averaged about 30, usually from Morton, Sudan, Three Way and Muleshoe. This year only 15 applications were received, all from the Muleshoe area.

Depending on the funding, four to five names are drawn randomly to participate in the program, for which enrollees must provide their own transportation.

Clapp also commented that he applies every two years to get funding under the program, and this was the first year since 1994 that the refuge proposal had been funded.

The students are paid minimum wage and work an average of 40 hours a week from June

until early August.

The Youth Conservation Corps, which is celebrating its 30th anniversary this summer, is federally funded and allows both young men and women from 15 to 18 years of age to get involved in the development and conservation of the

nation's natural resources.

Any youth interested in future participation may obtain an application from the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge headquarters. The application must be filled out and returned between Jan. 1 and April 15.

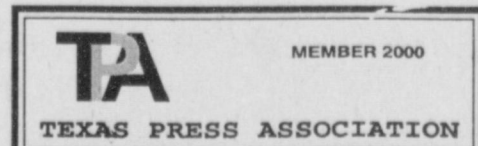

This may be a good year for hummingbirds

Judging from my limited experience of the past week, I'd say this may be the area's best year for hummingbirds in quite a while.

I haven't talked to any of the hard-core hummingbird watchers, and I haven't spent much time checking it out myself, but from events in my own yard I can say that the little guys are pretty plentiful.

Every time I go to move a hose or do anything else in the yard, at least one hummingbird lets me know that the mimosa trees are "their" territory — and they are not interested in sharing, even if I am bigger than them.

The one that has staked out the front yard as his domain is particularly vocal, and will squeak and scold until it sounds as if his little chest could explode. More than once he's had me laughing out loud because he's so tiny and yet so "tough."

You know, if you don't want to mess with filling feeders but would like to do something for hummingbirds (as well as enjoy their antics), it's very simple to plant for them — even if you don't have a yard as such.

The mimosa tree that is so common across our region is a hummingbird favorite, as is the althea or rose of sharon bush (only the single-flowered types,



not the fluffy double-flowered ones). So is the trumpet vine, but be prepared to hoe off suckers if you plant that.

Just about anything that produces a trumpet- or cup-shaped flower with some color in it will do the trick.

Modern hybrids generally don't have much nectar, so even if the flowers attract hummingbirds to your yard, there won't be enough food supply to keep the birds around.

This is one case where species or old-fashioned kinds of plants are definitely better than most new ones.

If you garden mainly on a porch or balcony or other limited space, containers may be your only option. That's OK — some of the best container plants are also some of the best hummingbird magnets.

One of the most dramatic is the coral honeysuckle.

Granted, it needs a fairly big pot in order to make a big showing, but it is dramatically beautiful and loaded with nectar. It's also tough as nails and

won't turn up its toes the first time you neglect it.

Cardinal climber is the little red-flowered relative of morning glories, much grown by our grandmothers but not so common anymore. It's another species that is loaded with nectar; it's an annual, but it re-seeds well enough that you should have new plants in the spring.

Cardinal flower, on the other hand, is the *Lobelia cardinalis* that I often recommend for bog gardens. As a container plant, it's easier to manage in our climate if you use a container with no drain hole. Don't worry when it rains, either — this lobelia can grow with its roots submerged in an inch or so of water all the time.

Almost any salvia is an excellent plant to have, regardless of whether or not you aim to attract hummingbirds. Some of the best for this purpose are the ones known as Texas sage, autumn sage, pineapple sage (beautiful, but not winter-hardy for us, so plant it in a pot that's easily moved indoors for the winter) and several others in the red-to-hot-pink color range.

Also there are some blue-flowered species that work just about as well, notably the one that's becoming known as anise-scented sage. I have always known it as *Salvia guaranitica*, but some of you find that to be

a tongue-twister.

Another of the birds' favorites is monarda or bee balm, in any color but white. This is a plant that some people find difficult because of the dryness of our climate, so growing it in containers with either no drain hole or a drain well up on the side of the pot might be the answer for them. (Having the hole up on the side helps preserve a reservoir of moisture at the bottom.)

The August issue of *Birder's World* magazine (available at newsstands) has a good article on hummingbirds and their favorite plants.

Among its recommendations as container plants are regular old impatiens and petunias, which can both work very well — if you keep in mind what I said earlier when selecting your petunia varieties. That means picking single-flowered ones, rather than the beautiful doubles, and trying to find old-fashioned kinds (which is nearly impossible).

I have cheated with petunias and hung containers of the bright red hybrids to help attract hummers with their color, then put a nectar feeder nearby to keep the birds around.

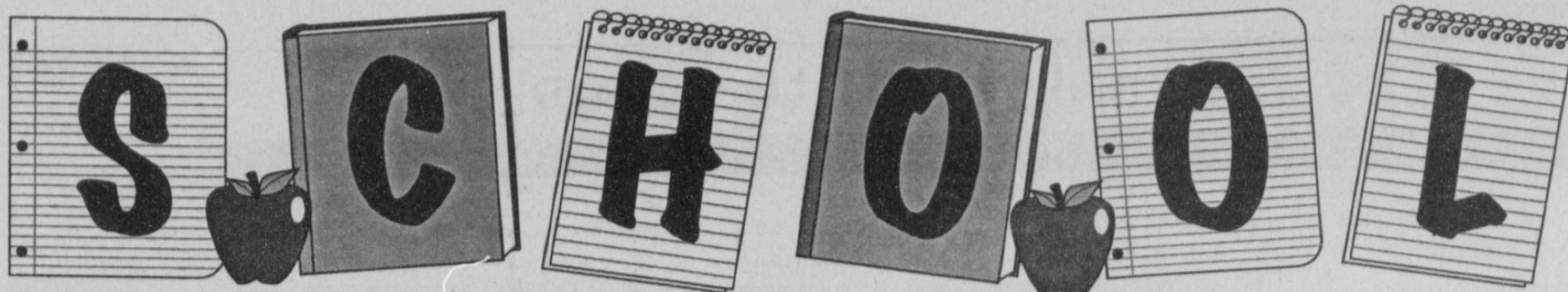

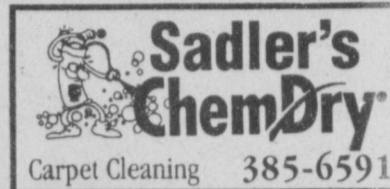

Three Way, Lazbuddie list reduced-meal policies

The Three Way and Lazbuddie school districts have announced their policies regarding free and reduced-rate school meals.

For children of families who receive food stamps or TANF, the application need only include the child's name, the food stamp or TANF case number and the signature of an adult household member.

Any change in food-stamp or TANF status must be reported

to the school district and may affect eligibility.

Applications for foster children need to include the child's name, any income for the personal use of the child, and an adult signature. Eligibility for a foster child is based on the income of the child.

Children in households not receiving food stamps or TANF may be eligible for reduced-price meals.

These applicants need to sup-

ply the children's names, the names of all household members, the income of all household members for the previous month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and the Social Security number of the person signing. If the adult signing the application does not have a Social Security number, they must indicate this by writing in the word "NONE."

School officials will review the applications and decide on

the child's eligibility. Anyone who feels they were turned down unfairly may request a hearing.

In the Three Way district, hearing requests should be sent to Jarrol Layton, Route 2, Box 104, Morton 79346 (telephone 927-5487).

In the Lazbuddie district, hearings should be requested either orally or in writing by contacting the school superintendent at Box 9, Lazbuddie 79053 (telephone 965-2156).

Where Is God?

Where is God? No doubt some of the Israelites wondered. For three hundred years they had been living in Egypt—first, as guests and, later, as slaves—and there was no word from God. Oh, they remembered the words of Joseph before he died: "God will visit you and bring you up out of this land..."

The children of Israel asked that question centuries ago. Millions today join them. It's that question many people ask as they file by an open casket or walk down the hall of a nursing home or turn away from the children's section of a cancer hospital. No easy answers will suffice here. Pain is the solvent that strips all the easy answers away.

Where is God? The answer is almost shouted from the pages of Scripture: God is nearby! And the times we feel least like believing it are the very time we must believe that he is and that, as Peter assures us, "He cares for you."

Where is God? It may help us to realize that just when the Israelites were asking that question most bitterly and feeling most rejected by God, an Israelite mother was placing a little baby boy in a basket and floating him down the Nile. His name was Moses.


God hadn't forgotten the Israelites. He hasn't forgotten us.


