#### Homecoming Parade, Coronation Friday Grid Battle November 7 --By DOLPH MOTEN

Unofficial weather observers are predicting that the forthcoming will be a hard winter. The three most-mentionedreasons that they think this winter will be cold are:

1. It's about time for a bad winter. It's been a few years since we've had a rough one. Last year was especially mild.

2. This year's freeze was earlier than usual; possibly indicating that this winter, which will probably be rough, is getting an early start and indicating what is to come.

3. Cattle are putting on more and longer winter coats of hair than usual.

How scientific those reasons are, you can decide for yourself. But it seems to us that the people we talk with are getting semi-prepared for a worsethan-average winter.

Strangely enough, the first freeze, which was Saturday, didn't cause a lot of complaining from farmers. They were surprisingly content, as best we could determine, with the early first freeze date. For the most part, they figured their grain sorghum had reached maturity and the freeze would aid in making it dry and thereby allow them to harvest earlier.

Cotton farmers are usually the ones most upset by an early freeze, However, they, too, figured this year's cotton crop was about as ready as one ever is for a freeze.

Nobody does anything about the weather anyway, you understand, but it's good when people are content with what the weather does.

In this issue of The Blade appears an "application for voter registration certificate." The VR certificate will be issued after the application is completed and submitted to the office of Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor-collector.

This certificate will be equivalent to the old poll tax receipt. The primary difference being that the new deal won't cost \$1.75 per person as did the now-outlawed poll tax.

Eventhough there's no "charge" for the VR certificate, it will still be necessary to fill out and submit the application, according to our understanding. Voting isn't autohave a poll tax in Texas. Voter registration is necessary so poll lists may be made, etc.

Your old poll tax receipt, the last one you paid for, is dated 1965. It makes you a qualified voter for 1966 elections, from Feb. 1, 1966 to Jan. 31, 1967. So, the new voter registration certificate you'll get will make you eligible to vote in elections from Feb. 1, 1967 to Jan. 31, 1968. (All this sounds kinda confusing and also like something that J. D. "Champ" Stevens might argue with us about.)

If you'll complete the form in this week's Blade and mail it to Moseley at Farwell, you'll get your VR certificate . . . if you're qualified to vote in Texas and Parmer County.

## TB Tests Offered All School Pupils

Tuberculin tests will be offered all students in Bovina Schools this year on Nov. 7, Mrs. Katherine Lockhart, school nurse, said this week.

First grade and seventh grade students are required by law to have the tests, she said, but the skin test is being offered all students. Letters will be sent to parents explaining the testing. For a student to receive the test, the parent must sign the letter and return it to Mrs. Lockhart.

Tests will be given at school.

Mrs. Lockhart said that the ultimate goal is "to eradicate tuberculosis in Texas, not just to control it."

A member of the State Health Department will be present to narrate the film and answer questions.

Mrs. Lockhart pointed out that if a child has a positive reaction to the test, this does not mean that the child has tuberculosis. It means only that the child is carrying the germ and may only have come in contact with a person having tuberculosis. Those having a positive reaction, however, should have a chest X-ray.





Know The Truth By Lavern Stewart

The Bible was designed so that the ordinary man could read it with understanding. ## Schools Use New Cards

A new type report card will be handed to students in all grades, 1-12, of Bovina Schools this year, according to Otis Spears, superintendent.

These do not have to be signed and returned to school, so parents will be responsible for whether or not they see the progress reports of their children, officials say.

Report cards this year are a disposable or "tear-away" type, come padded six for each student, with carbons between each. At the end of the first six weeks, the grades are recorded on all six, but only the top copy sent home. Grades are added to the card in the same manner the second six weeks, etc., with the previous six weeks grades appearing also. The last copy, which is cardboard, is to be kept by the parents.

Officials stated that records of the students' grades are on file in the principals' offices and may be referred to by parents at any time they wish to see them.

The Texas Education Agency is probably the most unpopular department in the state set-up right now. It laid one of its biggest eggs recently -- which will no doubt hatch, knowing the persistency of that body which regulates education in Texas.

The latest TEA recommendation to the Texas Legislature, in case you haven't heard, is to increase school systems to 13 grades, lengthen the school year to 10 months and lengthen the school day to seven hours.

Not a school student, teacher or administrator has been caught jumping up and down saying "Goody, goody."

Supt. Otis Spears says that this comes at a time when teachers are extremely difficult to obtain for 12 grades, when classrooms are full and running over, and then, too -- it certainly will cost

According to October issue of Texas Outlook, TSTA magazine, "Texas schools opened this fall lacking hundreds of qualified

Adding a kindergarten is a good idea, but if 80 or 90 more children are added, that will require three more teachers and three more classrooms, which Bovina and umpteen other schools

The other two ideas are "for the birds." Little effort is extended by students the last few weeks of school in the spring already. And proof has long been established that a student's attention can be kept just "so long," Adding another hour to the school day won't increase the child's ability to listen.

Also noteworthy is the fact that California has just abandoned a "four cornered" year, in which students attended school for 56 days in each of four periods, year, around. It didn't work out -no one was willing to attend during the summer months -- and has been thrown out as another experimental failure.

If there are no howls of pain now, there will be after legislation is passed and taxes are being raised all over the place -to cover the salary raises that are inevitable for approximately 320 additional working hours per teacher, per year.

In Bovina that would represent over 11,000 working hours for

Something good may come from the study being conducted by Bovina and Parmer County for the future growth and development of this area, either domestic or commercial.
