Bobby Fowler, Rockwall High School FFA adviser, said RHS FFA members and Rockwall County 4-H Clubs had a presence in major shows in Fort Worth and San Antonio and will be well represented in the upcoming Houston Livestock Show before the 57th Annual Rockwall Youth Fair March 24-27.

Every animal shown at a major competition represents months of work and preparation on the part of the presenter.

"Anyone can enter and each person is responsible for their project," Fowler said. "For the major shows, the entry's are done in November through early December."

The validation process gives proof that the exhibitor has been in possession of the animal since the validation date, and the animal has not been presented at a show by any other exhibitor.

The goal of an exhibitor is to place an animal in the auction sale at one of the major shows. The San Antonio Livestock Show provides scholarships to

Rockwall FFA and 4-H Club winning animals. Winners in the marks the first time Rockwall breeding events will often keep FFA youth have participated in their animals and raise their own animals.

RHS FFA and Rockwall County 4-H Clubs have been competitive in the breeding show divisions. Participating in the San Antonio Livestock Show in February were Cale Merritt, Jake Termin, Will Morris and Tanner Howey. This the San Antonio show.

Jake Termin and Will Morris' trip to San Antonio was the completion of a year-long Calf Scramble Project. Both young men participated in the 2009 Calf Scramble catching calves and were awarded \$800 certificates to purchase a breeding animal. Termin placed fifth in the registered Poland China division and Morris placed sixth in the registered Yorkshire division. Cale Merritt placed third in the registered Yorkshire division.

Rockwall will be represented at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in March. The Agriculture Mechanics Show Team will participate in the AG Mech show. Rockwall County 4-H and FFA members also will participate with animal projects.

Between the major show dates, several of the county FFA and 4-H members also compete in jackpot shows around the northeast Texas area. A jackpot show is a one day competition.

Locals unhappy with state of The Shores golf course

According to Rockwall city manager Julie Couch residents concerned about the state of The Shores golf course should look to the first week in March for an indication of progress in resolving the many complaints about the courses' maintenance and appearance.

This month more than 250 people gathered in a public meeting to express concerns to members of the city council.

At the beginning of the meeting the city manager explained the city's involvement with the course as being the landlord on the lease of part of the course. The city leases that land from city of Dallas and, in turn, leases it to course owners, IRI Golf Group.

While the city has no involvement in the golf club membership, its operation or operation of the club's pool, or the homeowner association, it does collect a rent based on percent of revenue with a \$25,000 per year minimum. In 2009, the city collected about \$50,000 in rents.

The city conducts three audits per year, with the most recent in January, after which the city issued a letter of default based on agreements stemming from a 2007 legal settlement requiring owners to adhere to maintenance and irrigation requirements.

According to Couch, the course has until the first week of March to correct items of concern in the default letter. If the concerns are not addressed within the correction period, the city cannot predict what the next course of action may be, she said.

Speakers at the public meeting brought a long list of complaints including the complaint from some residents of other areas of the city and county of depressed property values and tax revenue collections. The situation is "not just hurting the club and its members," real

estate agent Jeff Stone said. Other speakers characterized the club ownership as "lousy" and "the slumlords of the golf world" and called the course "too horrible to consider even playing golf there."

Speakers called the city's efforts at auditing a "play to sidestep the anger of citizens" and accused the city council of "sticking its head in the sand" and "selling the neighborhood down the river."

In response, council members assured residents that the city would stay on the case and keep inspections going and default letters flowing for violations. Council members also promised to keep residents informed and apologized for not holding a public meeting on the matter sooner.

Early voting ends today Early voting in the March 2 primary elections, both Democratic

and Republican parties, ends today.

Voting hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Early ballots may be cast at the Elections Office, 107 E. Kaufman, Rockwall; Royse City Hall, 305 N. Arch, Royse City; or the Heath City Hall, 200 Laurence, Heath, according to Rockwall County election officials.



In its February Board Meeting Rockwall Area Habitat For Humanity (RAHFH) set a goal to build three new homes in 2010 for the first time in its 15 year history where it has never built more than two in any one year. RAHFH President Larry Wells put it simply: "with the increasing need for decent affordable housing brought on by current economic conditions, this is an easy decision, albeit a very challenging one as well".

The first 2010 home, currently under construction in Royse City, expects to be completed in about four weeks. At about that same time the construction of a second home in the vicinity of the main Rockwall Post Office will commence and should be completed by early summer, with a third home planned to be started in the late summer and completed by year end.

While more volunteer labor will be needed, the greatest challenge will be obtaining the necessary funding to purchase building lots and additional construction supplies. RAHFH Treasurer Mike Duvall estimates some \$65,000 will need to be raised within our Rockwall community for this dream to become a reality in 2010 and the entire RAHFH team will be working hard to make that happen. Community Covenant Coordinator George Russell commented that 'Rockwall has a long history of responding in time of need in taking care of its own, and rarely has there been a clearer

need than now'.

How can the Rockwall community help? Three ways: 1) Sign their website to volunteer to help with the construction which takes each Saturday from 8:30 AM to 2:30 PM (and you will receive a mi email each week about construction details on any given Saturday); 2 up to provide food and/or drinks for the construction team on any Saturday; and/or 3) Provide financial support through a tax deductible tion to RAHFH. "How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they are called?" (Romans 10:14-15).

The above scripture is set in the context of Romans 10:9-10, which shows the pre-requisites for salvation. It sets a pre-requisite order that culminates in salvation. The order may be understood better in reverse as follows: God calls the preacher to preach the Gospel, the preacher preaches, people hear the Gospel from the preacher, people believe the Gospel of Jesus Christ which they heard from the preacher, and people call on the name of the Lord Jesus Christ in whom they be-

According to Romans 10:13, to "call upon the name of the Lord" results in salvation. With this in mind, the next verse is understood as follows, "How then shall they call on him [for salvation], in whom they have not believed." To believe is set as a pre-requisite to calling upon the name of the Lord. The requistite of believeing with the heart that God raised Jesus from the dead must be met before anyone can start calling upon the name of the Lord for salvation. Based on Romans 10:9-10 it could be said that the condition of righteousness, or being filled with holy spirit, must be met before people can begin calling upon the name of the Lord for salvation.


Wait a minute! It says in Romans 10:9-10, "if you shall confess with the mouth." How can this be so? Two different phrases are used to describe something that results in salvation. They are "confess with the mouth the Lord Jesus," and "call upon the name of the Lord." God's word is not ambiguous. If God uses two different phrases for something that results in one thing, then the two phrases must refer to the same

We haven't completely established in this study what the two phrases refer to, but we do know a few things about it. It involves the vocal use of the mouth to declare the Lord Jesus. It is calling out to be rescued in the name of our Lord

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calls Jesus accursed. And no man can say that Jesus is the Lord, but by the Holy Ghost." The thing that ties this verse with Romans 10:9-10 is the reference to saying that Jesus is the Lord. In essence, this phrase refers to the same thing as confessing with the mouth the Lord Jesus. The word "confess" in Romans 10:9-10 meant to declare something freely. It can refer to a mental and/or vocal confession. One exception is when it is used with the word "mouth," in which case it would only refer to a vocal declaration.

Both phrases, to speak by the spirit of God and to say that Jesus is the Lord by the Holy Ghost refer to spoken words that are given by the spirit of God. Next week we will look at 1Corinthians 14:1-18 which shines more light on what it means to speak with the spirit of God.



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
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
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

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The Census and the Constitution

The Census Bureau estimates that the life cycle cost of the 2010 Census will be from \$13.7 billion to \$14.5 billion, making it the costliest census in the nation's history. Suppose you suggest to a congressman that given our budget crisis, we could save some money by dispensing with the 2010 census. I guarantee you that he'll say something along the lines that the Constitution mandates a decennial counting of the American people and he would be absolutely right. Article I, Section 2 of our constitution reads: "The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct."

What purpose did the Constitution's framers have in mind ordering an enumeration or count of the American people every 10 years? The purpose of the headcount is to apportion the number of seats in the House of Representatives and derived from that, along with two senators from each state, the number of electors to the Electoral College.

The Census Bureau tells us that this year, it will use a shorter questionnaire, consisting of only 10 questions. From what I see, only one of them serves the constitutional purpose of enumeration — namely, "How many people were living or staying at this house, apartment or mobile home on April 1, 2010?" The Census Bureau's shorter questionnaire claim is deceptive at best.

The American Community Survey, long form, that used to be sent to 1 in 6 households during the decennial count, is now being sent to many people every year. Here's a brief sample of its questions, and I want someone to tell me which question serves the constitutional function of apportioning the number of seats in the U.S. House of Representatives: Does this house, apartment, or mobile home have hot and cold running water, a flush toilet, a bathtub or shower, a sink with a faucet, a refrigerator, a stove? Last month, what was the cost of electricity for this house, apartment, or mobile home? How many times has this person been married?

After each question, the Bureau of the Census provides a statement of how the answer meets a federal need. I would prefer that they provide a statement of how answers to the questions meet the constitutional need as expressed in Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution.

The Census Bureau also asks questions about race, and I want to know what does my race have to do with apportioning the U.S. House of Representatives? If I'm asked about race, I might respond the way I did when filling out a military form upon landing in Inchon, Korea in 1960; I checked off Caucasian. The warrant officer who was checking forms told me that I made a mistake and should have checked off "Negro." I told him that people have the right to self-identify themselves and I'm Caucasian. The warrant officer, trying to cajole me, asked why I would check off Caucasian instead of Negro. I told him that checking off Negro would mean getting the worse job over here. I'm sure the officer changed it after I left.

Americans need to stand up to Washington's intrusion into our private lives. What business of government is the number of times a citizen has been married or what he paid for electricity last month? For those who find such intrusion acceptable, I'd ask them whether they'd also find questions of their sex lives or their marriage fidelity equally acceptable.

What to do? Unless a census taker can show me a constitutional requirement, the only information I plan to give are the number and names of the people in my household. The census taker might say, "It's the law." Thomas Jefferson said, "Whensoever the General Government (Washington) assumes undelegated powers, its acts are unauthoritative, void, and of no force."

Quite the cautionary tale, isn't it?



Fencing of this easement will split our campus in half, preventing our students access from one side of the campus to the other and severely limiting expansion of our facilities. Our property value will be decreased by the placement of the tower in the center of our campus. If the City of Heath owned this property, would the City Council vote to put the water tower on this proposed location?

As a parent yourself, I hope you can imagine that the parents of our students are very upset and have a number of concerns. I requested in written form (by email and standard mail) that the parents of our students be placed on the agenda for the city council meeting on March 2nd. On February 2nd, in our meeting with the city representatives, with attorneys present, we were told the parents had been given a place on the agenda. (To clarify, this request is for the parents who live in Heath to speak, not the Board of the school to speak.) When I emailed Mrs. Dobbs for written confirmation, I was informed the parents had been taken off the agenda. Our parents who live in Heath want to express their concerns directly to their elected officials. They would like to hear the council's reasoning for this decision which will so drastically impact the safety, well being, and daily lives

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If you have a cataract, however, this means that there is a clouding of the lens in your eye. This condition, which can be detected in an eye examination, usually affects older people and comes on slowly. When it causes poor vision, surgery is usually recommended to remove the lens. This loss is compensated by the implantation of a new lens, cataract glasses or contact lenses so you can see clearly again. If you think you may be developing a cataract, have your eyes examined as soon as possible.

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Astigmatism: A vision problem caused by an irregularly shaped cornea. It distorts the focus of light waves entering the eye causing blurred or double vision.

Presbyopia: A condition in which the eye is unable to focus on close objects due to a loss of elasticity in the lens. Usually occurs after the age of 40.


Glaucoma: There are often no symptoms until damage has been done. It is actually a group of diseases characterized by increased pressure within your eye. If left untreated, can cause blindness through permanent damage to the optic nerve.

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A degeneration of the central portion of the retina (macula) which is responsible for straight-on vision used in driving, reading, perceiving colors, and recognizing faces. It is the most common cause of blindness in people over 50 years of age.

Heath Mayor John Ratcliff asks residents to exercise right Rock

by Joanna Matejka

City of Heath mayor John Ratcliff has asked residents to exercise their right to be part of the Texas Department of Transportation public meeting process dealing with the movement of and installation of a signal light at farm-to-market roads 740, 549 and 550.

It seems the preference of TxDOT is to move the intersection about 300 feet to the northeast in order to make the roads meet at a right angle; however, council members and several residents have expressed that they don't think much of that idea.

Property owners and council members have indicated they hope the intersection can remain as near to the current position as possible.

"We don't know if those are TxDOT preferences, regulations under the law," Ratcliff said. "We don't know if what we have are reasons or explanations or excuses, but the process of TxDOT is to take input from the community."

The first chance to take part in that process in person will be at City Hall from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. March 25.

City of McLendon-Chisholm discusses annexation, tax advantages for developers

Members of McLendon-Chisholm City Council returned to the discussion of annexing a 1,200-acre site known as the Koch property at the group's first February meeting.

The council tabled the discussion that had become bogged down in speculation about how the city should provide services to the development and whether the city should attempt to become a provider of water and sewer services.

A pair of Rockwall-Heath High School students garnered recognition at the Family Career Community Leaders of American annual regional meeting conducted recently in Plano.



Walton will represent her school at the state and national meetings.





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
