

Early voting ends today; runoff election is Tuesday

Local residents will return to the polls again next week to decide a trio of Republican Party candidates for the November general election.

Runoff election day is Tuesday. Polling will run from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Early voting in the runoff election concludes today. Early ballots may be cast from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Election Office, 107 E. Kaufman, Rockwall; Heath City Hall, 200 Laurence, Heath; or Royse City City Hall, 305 N. Arch, Royse City.

Three Republican Party races need to be determined within Rockwall County, including the party's candidates for county judge and the two open justices of the peace positions.

Jerry Hogan and Kevin Fowler each are seeking the top county position, while in the race for Precincts 1 and 4 JP, incumbent David Karr is being challenged by Jack James. The incumbent in the JP, Precincts 2 and 3 race, Larry Holloway, is being challenged by Nancy Beaty.

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


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

A May 22, 2010, wedding in Rockwall is planned.


Himmelreich to marry Heffernan in Rockwall

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
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On God's Word

Spiritual Matters...1Corinthians 12-14

It is written, "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I woud not have you ignorant. You know that you were Gentiles, carried away unto these dumb idols, even as you were led. Wherefore I give you to understand, that no man speaking by the spirit of God calls Jesus accursed, and that no man can say that Jesus is the Lord, but by the Holy Ghost" (1Corinthinans 12:1-3). This scripture gives very important information. It starts a new subject. That new subject is about spiritual matters.

In the King James Bible, the word "gifts" is in italics because it was added by the translators. The word "spiritual" comes from an earlier known Greek word that meant "spiritual matters." So it would more accurately read, "Now concerning spiritual matters...I would not have you ignorant." God so lovingly wants His people to understand spiritual matters. Chapters 12 through 14 reveal significant information concerning the spiritual matters of life. God wants His people to know and live by His spirit. He freely gave His word so that we might be able to develop a close and personal relationship with Him as dear children.

Chapter 12 reveals that there is only one spirit and one Lord Jesus Christ. This one spirit includes various gift ministries, services and operations (or workings). We also learn that anybody can profit from the manifestation of holy spirit in nine different ways. God emphasizes that the body of Christ is one, and has many members who are all baptized into one body by one spirit. Each member in the body is uniquely important. From the most honorable to the least honorable member, all are important to God. And He wants each member to see the others in the same way.

In chapter 13, God emphasizes His love toward the whole world. If we have all believing so we could move mountains when God gives the word, and have not the love of God, then we are not walking according to God's will. This beautiful chapter points our undivided attention to God's love.

Chapter 14 teaches us to follow closely after God's love and to covet earnestly spiritual matters, but to prefer that we might prophesy. This chapter distinguishes between speaking in tongues and interpretation of tongues in the context of who is being edified. Speaking in tongues is for the spiritual edification of the individual who is speaking. Interpretation of tongues and prophesy is for the edification of the assembly of believers. We learn from the context that speaking in tongues was commonly understood to be an essential part of the believer's life.

As workmen, let us rightly divide God's words of truth. If God gave us His word in 2Timothy 2:15, then that means He knows we can rightly divide His word. No matter what anybody else says, we have no need to be ashamed of His word. If God gave His word in 1Corinthians 14:15, "I will pray with the spirit..." then every single Christian should diligently search the scriptures to find out what it means, to the end that they are not only praying with their understanding but also with the spirit.

1Corinthians 12-14 sits like a treasure box filled with spiritual knowledge and wisdom. The next series of articles will dive into these spiritual treasures.

On March 15, 2010, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Energy" or "the Company"), filed a Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") filing to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders. This filing is applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division, with the exception of the City of Dallas. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is August 1, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,190,843 residential, 97,756 commercial, and 735 industrial and transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the affected incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$56,826,830, or 6.04% percent, including gas costs, or 14.82% percent, excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code.

Based on the proposed rate design, the typical monthly bill for each customer class within the affected incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below:



It is hard not to be charmed by Angus Gascoigne's English accent. Although a Rockwall resident for 11 years, he has retained a trace of his heritage. While on a diplomacy mission with the Royal Navy in 1989, he met his wife Elizabeth Campbell, who was living in the Caribbean with her young son, Lance, and working as a representative for a suntan lotion com-

Elizabeth was seated at the Captain's Table during a naval cocktail party, and as an officer-in-training, Angus was assigned to act as a host to the guests. The couple kept in touch for the next five years after their initial meeting but only saw each other for a total of 30 days before deciding to marry.

After living in Scotland for two years, they relocated to Rockwall to be near Elizabeth's family after their daughter Jonelle was born. Their son, Jean-Luc, was born six years later. An important turning point in the Gascoigne's life occurred when Frances Campbell, Elizabeth's mother, invited Angus to attend First Presbyterian Church Rockwall.

From that moment, his focus turned toward the ministry. He began by volunteering as a youth group leader in order to spend more time with his stepson. To train for the position, Angus enrolled in a seminar at Perkins School of Theology. On the last day of classes, he experienced something that even now is hard to describe.

"It was like God came up close, reached into my heart, pulled me closer and said, 'I want you to teach my people," Angus remembers. Responding to the call, Angus became a full-time seminary student while continuing to work full-time at his other job. He is currently a Chaplain at Children's Medical Center of Dallas.

Angus and Elizabeth purchased the Taco Casa franchise in Rockwall in October of 2008, planning to use the proceeds to help support their transition from careers in the business world to life in the ministry. 

e next hurdle I discovered in this episode is the so-called justice of the s. An unsigned notice from the Rockwall Municipal Court arrived in the a week or so later. It was a notice requiring a response, but not a signanor any stated code violation cited. I responded with a request for a copy e complaint in order to prepare a proper pleading in the court.

*xt came another unsigned notice, the one with a hearing date, along with by of a "complaint." Who signed the complaint as the "affiant?" One of ourt clerks. The complaint did not cite the code section or the state law I was accused of violating, and it was signed by an accuser who was not e scene. The clerk did not make the arrest, nor witness the arrest.

w that seems a bit odd to me, that Municipal Court clerks complete comits on behalf of the accuser. What kind of justice can be expected when ourt itself acts on behalf of the arresting officer? It is convenient for the ser and the court, that's for sure, but it certainly doesn't give the appear-

ance of a court of justice when the court works to assist the accuser.

I realize that a challenge to the enforcement of these unconstitutional codes would be successful, but at what cost? A Dallas attorney told me a few years ago that "yes, you will prevail in the courts, I can do it, but I'll need \$5,000 now and you'll end up spending up to \$20,000 before it's done."

The cost in money, and the precious time it takes to defend ourselves is the primary reason the courts have turned into money-processing centers. Most people, including me, will pay the fine and look for ways to stay "under the radar" ... because the system is stacked against us.

I know that officer P. Johnson was just doing his "duty" ... and he was courteous and polite. I should not have behaved as I did, and I take this opportunity to publicly apologize to him for my discourteous remarks. I also pray that he, and all law enforcement officers, judges, clerks and others involved in enforcing traffic codes, will take a very close look at their offense against our constitutional rights.

A prayer for deliverance

I pray God will show them that our right of liberty (to go and do as we wish as long as we don't hurt or damage someone or their property) is more important than collecting money for the State of Texas.

Only then will we be truly free.

I respectfully request the courts adhere to common law rules, especially requiring the accuser to sign the complaint, not the court, and that the complaint actually cite the code section allegedly violated. I'll pay the fine, but I can't make a pleading in a court which is a partner with the accuser.

The next time you see our dark blue Dodge Durango with the attractive "Rockwall County News" sign ... you be the judge as to our safe driving practices. You will probably not be the only ones taking a close look at us.

Free people remain free not by remaining silent in the face of tyranny, but by declaring forcefully their rights, even though they may be targeted by those who intend to deny us our liberty.

Our right of travel from one place to another is not a "privilege" as often propagandized. As our ancestors fought against the "British Stamp Act," we must oppose the "State Sticker Tax" ... for the same reasons. Putting tags on mules, horses and wagons was offensive to our ancestors. In the same way, our cars and trucks are no less important for travel than were those mules, horses and wagons of the 18th Century.

Saving the Doctor-Patient Relationship

Now that the Senate version of ObamaCare has become "the law of the as obvious that the officer was serious, as he quizzed me about the land," we need strategies to safeguard the doctor-patient relationship from government intrusion. The most effective approach is for both patients and physicians to opt out of the third party payment system.

> From the patients' perspective, opting out makes sense. Insurance companies will not be allowed to deny care for pre-existing conditions. Thus, even if the individual mandate is not thrown out on constitutional grounds, it will be smarter to pay the penalty, not buy insurance, and put as much money as possible into a health savings account. Prompt excellent medical care can readily be found in the burgeoning free market. Prices should be transparent to facilitate comparison shopping.

> Physicians have an ethical obligation to use their skills and training for the betterment of our patients, and to pass this art to the next generation. For those who choose to remain in practice, opting out of third party payment will be an increasingly attractive option.

Accepting payment directly from the insurer is a relatively recent aberration in the long history of the profession. There was never a crisis in access to doctors' services in the pre-Medicare/Medicaid era. Physician fees were usual, customary, and reasonable. Doctors charged well-heeled patients a bit more and those less well off a bit less. Pro bono care was a part of every practice. There was, and still is, competition between physicians for patients, and this restrained charges. Patients valued the doctors' time and vice verse. Doctors worked exclusively for the patient and were their strong advocates. There was a high degree of trust and medical care was used selectively. Direct third party physician payment changed all of this for the worse.

Initially, doctors "accepted assignment" as a courtesy. Medicare eventually required participating physicians to agree to this. Over the years, it became the norm. This was, in some ways, convenient to patient and physician. But by insulating both from the true costs of care, it led to overutilization and massive increases in health care spending. Payers responded with price controls and attempts to micromanage medical decision-making such as managed care, and its new version, pay-for-performance. Price controls on physicians drove volume increases that resulted in overall spending escalation. Higher volume inevitably impacts quality of care. No "quality improvement" measures can adequately compensate for this.

Widespread opting out of the third party payment system will lead to lower utilization with huge cost savings. There is no more efficient model than direct pay since it eliminates the middleman for the majority of charges. Office costs are dramatically reduced when third party billing is abandoned. By setting their own rates, doctors will be in control of their time and patient volume would decrease. Quality of care would improve, again saving money. The doctor-patient relationship, arguably the essential ingredient to cure and comfort, would be strengthened.

The immediate objection to opting out is that not everyone can afford to pay at time of service. The same argument could be made for dental and legal care (Note the absence of crises in the delivery of cosmetic surgery, dental,

veterinary, and legal care—all outside third party systems). We have simply

become accustomed to having "someone else" pay.

Another frequent objection is that some patients will not go for needed care if they must lay out money. This is easy to assert and impossible to disprove, but should bureaucrats make these decisions? This, plus unsustainable overuse of the system, are the inevitable alternatives.

Universal coverage will complete the move toward centrally-controlled care. Practice will be directed (i.e. rationed) by federal committees using practice guidelines, "pay-for-performance," and the electronic health record. Individualized care and medical confidentiality will slowly disappear. Importantly for the administration and Congress, more citizens will become dependent on government largesse. Doctors and other providers will become government employees, and be subject to its whims.

It is now left to individual physicians and patients to act in their own interests, and to defend the medical profession and doctor-patient relationship from government intrusion, and ultimately, destruction.

It is time to opt out.

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


Over the last five games, Rockwall-Heath has outscored its opponents 68-13, an average margin of 14-3.





He placed third on the floor (18.15), fifth on the rings (18.7) and parallel bars (18.2), sixth on the high bar (16.5) and 10th on the pommel horse (17.1). Bennett finished fourth on the pommel horse (18.4), ninth on the parallel bars (17.6) and 10th on the high bar

(15.1).There still is room for improvement, Sweny said. "We've had

With two wins by a combined score of 24-0, Royse City completed the first half of the District 10-4A softball season in first place with a 7-0 record.

In the bottom of the third, Pille hit a fly ball that hit the top of the fence in left-center field and bounced over for a three-run home run. She had fallen behind no balls, two strikes, but worked the count to 3-2 before her big hit.

RC added another run for a 5-0 lead after three innings, and scored four more runs in the fifth. Mallory Baumann's two-run single was the key hit in that inning. The game ended in the bottom of the sixth when a Lady Bulldog broke from third base after a throw to first, and beat the

throw home. The 10-0 lead meant Royse City had reached the 10-run mercy rule.



Royse City Bulldogs battle but lose to Jackets

For whatever problems Royse City's baseball team has had this season, it has played with the tenacity of - well, Bulldogs - against the two Rockwall ISD teams.

That trend continued Tuesday night at Rockwall, when the game was tied until the Yellowjackets scored three runs in the bottom of the sixth inning and took an 8-6 decision.

Royse City is just 2-6 in District 10-4A and has lost its last five games. RC has lost just 5-2 and 8-6 to Rockwall, a likely playoff team. The Bulldogs also have come closer than any other district opponent to Rockwall-Heath, losing 6-0 to Texas' top-ranked 4A team.

"We've played Rockwall tough, but we just didn't get hits when we needed them. When we left the bases loaded, that was a big opportunity to get runs early," said Royse City head coach Clay Wolfe. "We're just not going to beat them by jumping up on them by two runs. They're good at coming back. I guess they're right; Jacket fight never dies."

RC fell behind 3-0 after one inning but came back to take a 5-3 lead in the fourth inning. The Jackets tied the score in that inning, but couldn't take the lead in the bottom of the fifth inning. With two runners on base and two out, Bulldogs right-hander Scot Lane retired Will Steward to end the threat.

In the sixth, Lane hit a batter and gave up three singles for three Rockwall runs. The Bulldogs came back when Jared Jordan walked and scored on Dylan Funderburk's single in the top of the seventh, but the Jackets' Thomas Anderson pitched out of trouble.

Wolfe pointed to defensive lapses that contributed to the three-run inning. Bulldogs outfielders missed a cutoff man on two throws, and had a problem "being in position," according to the coach, on a ground ball that went for a force out and allowed a run to score.

"We tried to turn two. We're supposed to keep that run from scoring. Those are things we've got to correct from a coaching standpoint. We don't just put them out there and think that they know. I said that run was on the two idiots (coaches) sitting on buckets in the dugout," Wolfe said.

"Scot Lane's ERA is low. We've just got a lot of young guys behind him."

The coach said the young Bulldogs have made progress this season. "Last year, they averaged about three hits in district games. The guys are doing a better job offensively."

Against Rockwall, Royse City cracked eight hits, including a double by Jake Horbacz.

The Bulldogs also had eight hits in their previous loss, 3-1 at Carrollton R.L. Turner Thursday, April 1. Horbacz had another double, and Jacob Owen and Matt Allman each tripled, but the Dawgs had difficulty driving in runners in scoring position. Losing pitcher Funderburk allowed the Lions just four hits.



Defending champs stop Lady Jackets' record run

Rockwall had chances to get back into the game, but defending state champion Richardson Pearce thwarted those efforts and won 3-0 in a girls' soccer regional regional semifinal Friday.

Pearce, which won again Saturday to advance to this weekend's state tournament, had taken a 2-0 lead with goals midway through the first half, held a territorial advantage for most of the game. In the 33rd minute, the Lady Jackets beat Pearce's goalie to a loose ball but a defender moved into place to knock RHS' shot away.

Instead of going into halftime down just 2-1, Rockwall still trailed 2-0. The Lady Mustangs, who have not allowed a goal in their six playoff games this season, put the game away when Maddie Harper scored off a corner kick in the 69th minute.

The Lady Jackets had a corner kick of their own by Jessie Givens in the 77th minute, but the wall was deflected wide left.

The loss ended the best season in RHS girls' soccer history. The Lady Jackets won four playoff games, the last two in shootouts, to advance two rounds deeper into the postseason than they had before. The 2009 team had won twice before losing to Highland Park, like Richardson Pearce a District 21-4A rival

Rockwall head coach Melissa Garcia noted the missed opportunity before halftime, and pointed out how it was similar to play in last year's playoff loss to Highland Park.

"That's where you need to calm down, settle down and finish. That's how we lost to Highland Park (2-1) in the second half. It comes down to experi-

ence and nerves." Pearce's Taylor Matthews had scored the game's first two goals.

The first was on a penalty kick in the 19th minute, following what Garcia said was a hand ball. Matthews shot into the lower right corner of the net to beat RHS goalie Bekah Barton. Five minutes later, Matthews won a battle for the ball despite great effort by the Lady Jackets' Vicky King, dribbled to her right and put a long shot into the upper right corner for a goal.

Garcia wasn't disappointed with her team. "They did great," she said proudly.

"Great" wasn't good enough to beat Pearce.

Garcia said, "They've got everything they need to repeat. They're experienced and talent. All around, they're 100 per cent: depth, talent at every position. Because of that, they've got confidence.
