
The game pitting the fathers and coaches against the Lakemonsters was added last week, according to a news release issued by the RCHF.



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Midway through the competition, Rose submitted a fish to win that prize. Upon weigh-in and inspection, tournament officials discovered a one-pound lead weight in the belly of the fish, according to the news release.

The incident was investigated by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens, and the case was filed as a felony by the DA's office.

"We took this case very seriously," said Kenda Culpepper, Rockwall County criminal district attorney. "As far as we were concerned, the case was about a \$55,000 bass boat, not a 10pound fish."

In the news release, Alex Imgrund, lead prosecutor, said the facts of the case had garnered interest from sources as far away as Ontario, Canada.

"Cheating is cheating, and the fishing community, nor this office, will tolerate it," Imgrund said in the release.

"It's neat to experience the event with my patients who are cancer survivors. Walking side-by-side, sharing tears and laughter together; the experience gives me hope and helps me be more adamant about encouraging preventative care," she said.

The objectives of Relay are threefold: to raise money to find a cure for the disease, to honor those who have experienced cancer, and to empower people to become proactive in the fight against cancer.

"Relay For Life has a unique role of serving as educator for prevention and screening. In fact, one of my patients, a 53-year-old woman, is one of my best spokespersons for early screening," the doctor said. "She had been reluctant to get a colonoscopy, putting it off for three years. When she underwent the procedure, we found a cancerous tumor that we were able to remove completely before it spread.

"In medicine, it can feel like you're not making a difference," Smithers said. "But Relay For Life makes it personal. You can put the names and faces to the disease."

This year the Relay is personal for Smithers, as her niece, Michaela Richmond, who is in remission from leukemia, is participating in the event.

"She is an amazing, brave, little girl, a fifth grader at Nebbie

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

by Timothy W. Burnett **Spiritual Matters...1Corinthians 12:3** by Timothy W. Burnett

One of the most difficult subjects to address is the spiritual matters found in 1Corinthians 12-14. They refer to things that are foreign to many Christians. Even biblical scholars do not agree on the basic spiritual wisdom found in these chapters. Yet here they sit, like a treasure box filled with gems that can transform even the most down-trodden people into victorious children of God.

Raise your hand if you want to learn how to walk and talk as children of God. Don't know about you, but this author's hand is flying up real fast! If we intend to learn the walk and the talk, we must trust God's word where it says, "Now concerning spiritual [matters], brethren, I would not have you ignorant" (1Corinthians 12:1). God does not want His people to be in want of knowledge concerning spiritual matters.

We begin with 1Corinthians 12:3 where it says, "Wherefore I give you to understand, that no man speaking by the spirit of God calls Jesus accursed. And that no man can say that Jesus is the Lord, but by the holy ghost." What does it mean to "speak by the spirit of God" and to say something by the holy ghost? This is a reasonable question which can be answered by simply allowing god's word to interpret itself.

1Corinthians 12:3 does not completely define what it means to "speak by the spirit of God." In order to rightly divide this scripture we must find





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how it is interpreted in the context of where it is used again. Chapters 12 and 13 only use this phrase in verse 3 of chapter 12. The first place that uses similar language is found in 1Corinthians 14:15, "What is it then? I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also. I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also." This verse distinguishes between praying with the spirit and praying with the understanding. We have a pretty good idea what it means to pray with our understanding. But what does it mean to pray with the spirit? An examination of chapter 14 will show that praying with the spirit is talking about speaking in tongues. In general, chapter 14 distinguishes between speaking in tongues and the interpretation of tongues.

We start with verse 2, "For he that speaks in an unknown tongue speaks not unto men, but unto God. For no man understands; howbeit in the spirit he speaks mysteries." And again in verse 4, "He that speaks in an unknown tongue edifies himself. But he that prophesies edifies the church." Verses 6-13 contrast between speaking in tongues and the interpretation of tongues in the context of who is edified. Then we come to verses 14-15 where it says, "For if I pray in an unknown tongue, my spirit prays, but my understanding is unfruitful...I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding ... "

When we reverently allow God's word to interpret itself, we see that to pray with the understanding can only refer to speaking with our own language, and the phrase "pray with the spirit" can only refer to speaking in tongues.

Now we can go back to 1Corinthians 12:3 with a better understanding of what it is talking about. No man speaking by the spirit of God, which is speaking in tongues, curses our Lord Jesus Christ. And furthermore, nobody can truly say that Jesus is the Lord, but by speaking in tongues. Do we use the name of our Lord Jesus in prayer often? Yes we do. But it is also available to freely and truly declare our "Lord Jesus" by the spirit of God.



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
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

All three generations of our family had been there through the years to watch Rockwall High School compete in football playoffs and as recently as last year to cheer on the Rockwall Heath High School Hawks.



Moreover, big companies can always grapple with new taxes and regulations more easily than smaller companies can. So taxes and regulations have a way of concentrating industries by diminishing competition. ObamaCare is a classic government-backed cartel.

At any rate, those are not the taxes I am not referring to when I say we should brace ourselves. The taxes I mean are the implicit taxes that ObamaCare will impose on most productive people. What's an implicit tax?

Everyone knows what a tax is. It's a government decree that individuals or businesses pay a sum of money or face penalties ranging from fines to imprisonment. Taxes are levied on all sorts of things, including incomes and the sale of products and services. The essence of a tax, then, is the payment of money under duress created by politicians.

Once we understand this, we can see that the state is able to tax us indirectly as well as directly. For example, when government imposes a tariff on foreign goods, this tax is not formally imposed on consumers. But if the tariff leads to higher prices for the foreign goods and their domestic counterparts (which is usually the purpose), consumers end up paying the tax in those higher prices. The formal target is irrelevant. It's a tax on consumers.

Government can tax us even more indirectly. The pending cap-and-trade

proposal, by charging companies for permits to emit carbon dioxide, will raise the price of energy and products embodying that energy. The difference between prices with and without cap-and-trade is a tax because the higher payment is the result of a government decree. It doesn't matter that Congress passed no formal tax.

Now we can see how ObamaCare will tax much of the middle class. Under the new law, everyone will have to buy government-defined medical coverage or have it bought for him by his employer, reducing cash wages. Thus, anyone who would not have bought insurance or would have bought a lessexpensive policy will pay an implicit tax.

But that's not all. When government subsidizes demand, as ObamaCare will, prices rise. So under ObamaCare, everyone paying his own way will pay more for medical services (and insurance) than otherwise. That difference is a tax because it results from a government decree.

Thus, ObamaCare is a massive tax increase on the middle class. How soon can it be repealed?

While the vast majority of Texans met the so-called "tax deadline" on April 15, we pose a serious question to consider: What is the lawful definition of income?

The United States Tax Code does not address this question. The code (more than 900 pages in fine print) does not define the word "income." It does refer to "gross income" and other uses of the word "income," making an assumption that "everyone knows what income is." Webster's Dictionary definition is not the lawful definition.

In order to determine the lawful definition of "income," it is important to understand the U.S. constitutional limits placed on legislators. Words used in the constitution itself can not be defined by Congress (or its statutes), only the federal courts can define words used in the U.S. constitution.

The 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution authorizes an "income tax," therefore, Congress can not define the word "income." That's why the Internal Revenue Code does not define the word "income." Congress does not have the authority to define terms of a constitutional amendment.

"Congress cannot by any definition (of income in this case) it may adopt, conclude the matter, since it cannot by legislation alter the Constitution, from which alone it derives its power to legislate, and within whose limitations alone that power can be lawfully expressed." Eisner v. Macomber, 252 U.S. 189

The courts, however, have provided the answer.

For several years after the so-called ratification of the 16th Amendment, several challenges to the new income tax laws made their way through the courts.

We will cite those important cases at the end of this article, for those of you interested in researching this issue for yourself.

In summary, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that "income" is defined as the same as that used in the Corporation Tax Act of 1909.

After examining dictionaries in common use (Bouv. L. D.; Standard Dict.; Webster's Internat. Dict.; Century Dict.), we find little to add to the succinct definition adopted in two cases arising under the Corporation Tax Act of 1909 (Stratton's Independence v. Howbert, 231 U.S. 399, 415, 34 S. Sup. Ct. 136, 140 [58 L. Ed. 285]; Doyle v. Mitchell Bros. Co., 247 U.S. 179, 185, 38 S. Sup. Ct. 467, 469 [62 L. Ed. 1054]), 'Income may be defined as the gain derived from capital, from labor, or from both combined,' provided it be understood to include profit gained through a sale or conversion of capital assets, to which it was applied in the Doyle Case, 247 U.S. 183, 185, 38 S. Sup. Ct. 467, 469 (62 L. Ed. 1054). Eisner v. Macomber, 252 U.S. 189 In simple terms ... "income" is the same as "gain," or "profit." So, in order to determine your "income," you first have to determine if you have a "gain" or "profit" in either your personal or business life. Accountants understand how to determine whether or not you have an annual "profit" or "gain." Your wages are not "profit" or "gain."

There are activities which do in fact meet the definition of "income," they are clearly defined in the Corporation Tax Act of 1909. The courts have also upheld the taxation of increases in value on stocks, bonds and sale of real property.

Residents who have been looking forward to the Kingsbridge Tennis Center/Country Club developers pitched to City of McLendon-Chisholm in a special meeting this year will just go on waiting -- maybe until next March.

Members of the McLendon-Chisholm City Council heard from representatives of the Sterling One development company at this week's meeting and learned the company's financing arrangements are moving more slowly than they had hoped.

According to Sterling One repre-

sentative Russell Phillips, the company hopes to break ground in June. When the project was first pitched to council members for zoning changes, it was hoped the center would be opening by June 1.

To help the deal go through, council members acted unanimously with two members absent to approve zoning changes allowing for the building of the center, an office complex and a reduction in the originally proposed density for the second phase of the Kingsbridge community.

The project was given a recommendation without reservation from the city planning and zoning board

and was lauded by community members who attended the public hearing last year.

Council members approved a change in the planned density of the remainder of the residential development from the initial 2-acre lot size to an average 1.3-acre lot size, which is in line with the first phase of the development.

Concept drawings of the tennis center façade show a glass-fronted building set back by trees.

The final project would be a 25acre tennis center/country club with multi-purpose event facilities and a restaurant/bar.



Music for the ground breaking event was provided by Jeff Hardy of TexasHeat Entertainment



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


