HAIR WHITENED BY FLOOD EXPERIENCE

TEXAN WITH FAMILY ON HOUSETOP HAS THRILLING TRIP DOWN RED RIVER.

Little Rock, Ark., June 5th.—With his house swept into the current of the flooded Red River in the night while he, with his wife and six small children, slept, and all of them carried in their night clothes on a ten-hour trip down the stream sixty miles, followed by a rescue and a long sixty mile walk of the entire destitute family, George H. Darst, a farmer of Bonham Tex., has mental agony enough to account for the fact that his coal black hair changed in that time to a striking gray.

George Darst is a former Christian minister, who lived on a thirty-acre tract near Bonham, Tex. The Red River began to rise about May 1, but the farm, located seven miles away, was not considered in danger. On the night of May 18, Mr. Darst was awakened by the noise of a heavy cloud burst. He arose, and, looking out of the window, saw water in his yard, stepping outside, he found the water already on the top step of the porch and all escape cut off.

Rain fell throughout the night. Finally the house came into the current of the main stream. Shortly before noon they were sighted by a relief boat at the lower edge of Bowie County sixty miles below where they had started and were taken aboard the boat.

On being landed they were provided with clothing to replace the night clothes in which they had spent the night on the roof and were provided with money enough with which to get to Texarkana. Mrs. Darst did not want to ask for help, so at Texarkana they started out on foot to get to Little Rock, carrying the two smaller children. Two nights they spent in the open, fed by farmers en route, until they reached Barham, Ark., near Camden.

There money was raised to provide transportation to Malvern and a collection taken on the train by a sympathizer netted them enough to get Little Rock by rail. Here aid was furnished to carry them all to their destination. Except for their weariness and overwrought nerve the members of the family are in fair health.—Dallas News.

ADDITIONAL BURDEN TO CANDIDATES

The question of state prohibition will be submitted to a vote in the Democratic primaries in July. The expense of submitting this question will be from a third to a half more than if it had been left off. The Terrell election law puts this burden on the candidates. The candidate can not be forced to bear more than his pro-rata share of the expense of the election and in our opinion, under a test, he cannot be forced to expend money on a question that does not bear directly on his election. In order that state prohibition may be fairly submitted, it would be nothing but fair for those mostly interested to raise the proper funds.
