With the post office two blocks from Main, Avenue A could again offer a better service to motorists circling the post of-

The riding group also participated in the Grand Entry that night at Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.


However, the day was not an easy one, members of the Roping Club report, since truck transportation planned for the horses did not appear as planned in Bovina and trailers had to be quickly provided.




