Statement Issued in Which Hope Is Expressed of Substituting Staple for Foreign Articles.

New Orleans, Jan. 18 .- President W. B. Thompson of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange has forwarded to Secretary Wilson at Washington an urgent request for action by the department on resolutions of the exchange adopted a few days ago, favoring extension of the field for consumption of American cotton. The object is to have the department start a campaign of education as to the inumerable uses to which cotton can be put in place of articles of foreign imports now used in American manufacture. Mr. Thompson says, among other things:

French Fried Steak.

Take a nice cut of round steak one inch thick, cut in pieces any size desired; take a knife and cross bar it on both sides; salt, pepper and flour; fry to a nice brown, drain most, all the fat out of your pan and put your meat back in the pan so it will not rest flat on the bottom. Then almost cover with boiling water, cover tight and let boil slowly until tender. Always replenish with boiling water, and when done have enough water on mest so you will have a nice brown gravy You may add onions chopped fine if desired.

Potato Soup.

Pare and cut into dice three potatoes, cover with water, add a piece of butter and a little onion if liked, and boil until done. Then add a quart of sweet milk. While this heats make a dough by rubbing one tablespoonful of lard into a small cup of flour with a half teaspoonful baking powder in it: add milk to make a stiff dough, roll thin, cut into strips or small squares. drop in when milk comes to a boil, cover and boil ten minutes, season with pepper, salt and a little finely chopped parsley or thyme.

Pumpkin Marmalade.

Take ripe yellow pumpkins, pare and cut them in large pieces; take out the seeds, then weigh, and to each pound of pumpkin take a pound of sugar and an orange or lemon. Grate the pieces of pumpkin on a coarse grater and put in kettle with sugar and juice and grated rind of the lemon. Let it boil slowly, stirring often, until it forms a thick, smooth, marmalade. Put it in glasses and when cold cover with a paper in alcohol and a paper. over that again.

Jumbel-i.

It is a favorite dish in the south. Take a teacup of bacon cut into dice. one large onion sliced, fry together until brown; then add one can of tomatoes and a cup of rice; salt, pepper and a little water; cover and cook slowly until rice is done. The oftener you warm over the better it gets.

Nut Grape Jelly.

Dissolve one-half package of gelatin in half a cup of water, pour same into one pint of boiling grape juice sweetened to taste. When half congealed stir in five cents' worth of shelled walnuts, then pour in mold and set in cool place till fully congealed. Serve with whipped cream





SUCCUTASH AS IT SHOULD BE.

Proper Admixture of the Lima Beans and Corn.

Allow one-third the quantity of lima beans that you do of corn. Put the corn in a colander and let a little bot water run over it for a moment, then cut the corn from the cob, scraping out all the juice possible, but taking care not to get any of the cob. Shell the beans and fill a sterilized can with the corn and beans, working down as compactly as possible until the jar is filled to within an inch of the top. For every quart jar dissolve a teaspoonful to This Famous Remedy. of salt in three-quarters of a pint of lukewarm water, and pour over the vegetables. Adjust the lid of the jar (without the rubber) part way, and set in a boiler of lukewarm water, not allowing the jars to touch each other or the bottom of the boiler. Use a rack for the latter and coils of rope to prevent the jars touching. Have the water in the boiler deep enough to cover the jars three-quarters of their height. Put on the boiler lid and steam three hours. Take out the cans, work down the vegetables and fill up with more boiling salt water, then slowly screw on the lid. Return to the boiler, turn in enough more hot water to completely cover the jars and steam another hour. Take out, screw tighter, if possible, and when cool put in a dark place.

The Home.

Radishes fried with beefsteak have flavor not unlike mushrooms. They should be sliced.

Burning oil is spread by water. To extinguish it throw down flour, sand or earth. The idea is to prevent the oil spreading.

Fried chicken with cream sauce and corn fritters is an old dish, but one that too seldom finds a substantial place in the home.

Finger marks on doors can easily be rubbed off with a piece of clean flannel dipped in paraffin. Afterward wipe over with a clean cloth wrung out of the hot water to take away the smell. To soften hard water, put one ounce of quicklime into four gallons and a half of water. Stir it thoroughly and allow it to settle. Then pour off the clear solution, which will be enough to add to four barrels of hard water.

Fruit, vegetable, coffee and tea stains may be removed from white goods as follows: Heap salt on the spot, rub hard, then rinse in hot water in which a good amount of borax has been dissolved and the stain will disappear immediately.

To Clean Sponges.

Soiled sponges can be quickly freshened by rubbing the juice of a lemon well into them then rinsing several times, first in hot water and then in cold.

Too much care cannot be taken to keep a sponge absolutely fresh, as microbes are apt to congregate otherwise An occasional sunbath is excellent monia water every few weeks should not be omitted.

In using a sponge for a young child. or indeed for anyone, no matter how carefully it is supposed to be washed, it should be run through very hot water before using.

Rye Bread Torta.

Ten ounces of almonds chopped fine 12 eggs, three-quarters of a pound of sugar, 41/2 ounces of citron, cut fine, one teaspoon of ground cloves, one wine glass of red wine. Beat the sugar cloves and rye bread, which has been moistened with the wine, and at last the whites of egg well beaten. This makes two loaf cakes, is delicious and keeps indefinitely.

Care of Waxed Floors.

Never use soap and water on a waxed floor. Waxed floors should be wiped with a perfectly dry cloth and more wax rubbed into them with a woolen cloth or the polishing brushes put on more wax than the floor can abhave not been walked on so much. them perfectly dry before applying more wax.

Kitchen Rug.

A good, inexpensive rug for the kitchen can easily be made from matting that has been used in other rooms of the house. Take the ends which are not worn and double them; then sew them on all sides on the machine. This rug is easily kept clean, is heavy, and when out of use can be rolled up and stood out of the way.

Monkey Faces.

One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, one cup molasses, one cup cold water. two eggs beaten, two teaspoons soda, one teaspoon cinnamon, one teaspoon cloves, five cups flour. Drop from spoon into tins and use raisins on top to form the eyes and nose.

Breakfast Dish.


Brown an onion in bits of bacon. add one pound of chopped beef; stir with a fork; add seasoning and one cup of tomatoes; cover tightly and keep hot for ten minutes; serve on toast.

Dressed Cabbage.

Chop some cabbage very fine, cook in boiling water one-half hour. Drain, then season highly with salt and pepper, one-half cup of milk and one tablespoon of butter. Cook a few minutes and serve.

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



SOME IDEAS WORTH A LITTLE CONSIDERATION.

Easy Method of Keeping Closet Floors Clear of Accumulation of Dirt-Providing Individual Towels for the Family.

Closet Floors-Even fine housekeepers have difficulty in keeping closet

Then watch out for a small, good-shaped wooden box with cover. Tack on a pair of hinges made of strips of leather from an old shoe; tack a tab of leather on to the front edge to lift the cover by and you have a convenient place to hold all the old shoes. A ten-cent can of paint and a ten-cent brush will give the box one coat. New shoes should be on shoetrees and stand in rows on the top shelf. Every closet should be free from clothes and ready for a Friday sweeping every day in the week. There is just one thing that it is well to leave on the floor, and this is a folded piece of woolen blanket or cloth. Many have found this to be the cheapest insurance against moths. It attracts them, traps them and saves the clothing. It should not be shaken out every week.

Towels-One mother of a large family, although she had provided a tape running lengthwise of the hem for each and every towel, and has two books for each member of the family with his or her name neatly printed and pasted above, yet there was occasional friction as to the questionable ownership of a towel. Old or Rancid Butter-Any amount of old butter can be restored by pouring over it boiling water in proportion of one gallon of water to the pound of butter. Let the gallon of water boil down to a quart. Pour both water and butter into a pan of ice-cold water, and when all the butter has hardened, skim it out, work out the water, salt to taste and it is ready to either eat or be used tor cooking.

Marking Laundry-Collars and cuffs go unmarked to the laundry, are missent, lost and the ownership questioned because one does not get around to buy and keep in a convenient place a new pen and a bottle of indelible ink. Now, the initials or full name can readily be lettered just above the back buttonhole in common, ordinary ink, does not run and is highly satisfactory. One way of getting the best of procrastination and at the same time always be sure of having your own collars. Mark the cuffs in the exact middle and the wrong side.

French Fried Steak.

Take a nice cut of round steak one theh thick, cut in pieces any size desired; take a knife and cross bar it on both sides; salt, pepper and flour; fry to a nice brown, drain most all the fat out of your pan and put your meat back in the pan so it will not rest flat on the bottom. Then almost cover with boiling water, cover tight and let boil slowly until tender. Always replenish with boiling water, and when done have enough water on meat so you will have a nice brown gravy. You may add onions chopped fine if

Potato Soup.

Pare and cut into dice three potatoes, cover with water, add a piece of butter and a little onion if liked. and boil until done. Then add a quart of sweet milk. While this heats make a dough by rubbing one tablespoonful of lard into a small cup of flour with a half teaspoonful baking powder in it; add milk to make a stiff dough, roll thin, cut into strips or small squares, drop in when milk comes to a boil, cover and boil ten minutes, season with pepper, salt and a little finely chopped parsley or thyme.

Pumpkin Marmalade.

Take ripe yellow pumpkins, pare, the seeds, then weigh, and to each pound of pumpkin take a pound of sugar and an orange or lemon. Grate the pieces of pumpkin on a coarse grater and put in kettle with sugar and juice and grated rind of the lemon. Let it boil slowly, stirring often, until it forms a thick, smooth, marmalade. Put it in glasses and when cold cover over that again.

Take a teacup of bacon cut into dice, one large onion sliced, fry together antil brown; then add one can of tomatoes and a cup of rice; salt, pepper and a little water; cover and cook slowly until rice is done. Nut Grape Jelly.

Dissolve one-half package of gelatinm half a cup of water, pour same into one pint of boiling grape juice sweetened to taste. When half congealed stir in five cents' worth of shelled watnuts, then pour in mold and set in cool place till fully congealed. Serve with whipped cream




