EIGHT LIVES ARE LOST

VESSEL GOES DOWN IN RIVER FORTY MILES BELOW NEW

SEVERAL NARROWLY ESCAPE

The Accident Occurred at an Early Hour and Those who Perished Were Asleep.

New Orleans, April 26.-Eight people were lost and seven others on mammoth hen egg, which balances the board experienced thrilling escapes from death when the towboat Eagle of the Louisiana Petroleum Company went down early Sunday in the Mis- lissa, making several trips daily. sissippi River about forty miles south of New Orleans.

The occurrence was one of overwhelming suddenness. Without seeming reason the boat began to dip and take water and in an instant was going down, and within half an hour it sank. Without opportunity to give warning to their companions all survivors on deck found themselves thrown into the swift current of the deep channel. They succeeded in catching hold of boards, washing from the boat, and managed to stay afloat until they were rescued.
