But having wreaked vengeance for the crime upon the baby of a white man, the crowd then listened to the many cries of "Lets go get Burrell Oates and 'Bubber' Robinson'. These murmurings had been heard through out the whole of the forenoon, and as soon as Brooks' body disappeared a crowd of 600 men started toward the county jail.

Oates has been convicted five times of the murder of Sol Aronoff, which oc curred in Dallas several years ago. Bubber Robinson has been convicted for the killing of Frank Wolford, a white farmer, which occurred over a year ago.

The mob swelled until it numbered about 5,000, surged around the jail, and forced the officers to admit twenty men to search for the negroes. The search ers reported that the prisoners wanted had been spirited away.

Last night was one of the worst ever experienced in the railroad section of the Canadian Rockies, with a heavy storm of rain and sleet and sometimes snow.

All Probably Dead. Of the sixty-two Canadian Pacific

trainmen, trackmen and laborers buried by an avalanche in Rogers Pass on the summit of the Selkirk range of the Rocky Mountains, all are probably dead. Twenty-five white men and thirty-seven Japanese are thought to have perished. The bodies of five only have been recovered.

> Everett, Wash., March 3 .- Twentydeath roll of ninety as the result of the overwhelming by an avalanche of two Great Northern passenger trains at Wellington, Wash., is the latest information obtainable from the scene of the disaster. Communication with Wellington is maintained only by men on snowshoes and the meager details received have been secured in this way.

> Twelve bodies have been removed from the wreckage at the bottom of a gorge 150 feet deep when the last messenger arrived. The railroad section bunkhouse at Wellington has been transformed into a hospital and ten injured are being cared for there. Superintendent O'Neill of the Great Northern made his way to the wreck late yesterday at the head of a party of doctors and nurses. The trip was made on snowshoes.

The nearest telegraph station to the scene is at Scenic Hot Springs, three miles below, down a precipitous bluff that is impassible, covered, as it is, with a deep blanket of snow that may start any moment.

At Burke five are known to be dead and two badly injured, but the list is not thought complete.



SALT AND SMOKED

SIMPLE METHOD OF MAKING FISH APPETIZING.

Broiled Salt Mackerel Requires Care If It Is to Be Sent to the Table in Proper Condition-Grilled Herring.

Broiled Salt Mackerel-Salt mackerel, which is often tasteless and indigestible, may be made in this way both delicious and delicate. For a family of two or four, clean and wash in several cold waters a large No. 1 mackerel; place it in a deep dish or pan, cover it with cold water and let stand over night. If still too salt, the next one may be soaked 24 hours, but too long a soaking will make a mackerel tasteless. When ready to cook the fish rinse it in several waters and wipe dry with a towel; leave the head and tail on, but flatten the fish well, rub melted butter over the two sides and place in a broiler, split side down, over a moderate fire of live coals. Broil six minutes on the split side, then turn and broil from three to six minutes on the skin side. Lay on a warm dish and pour melted butter over it, adding, when ready to serve, a dust of cayenne, a thick sprinkle of chopped parsley and several slices of lemon. Small German potatoes, boiled in their jackets and then freed of skins, make a proper garnish for this

Grilled Smoked Herring-Wash the fish well in cold water and then broil it whole for three minutes on each side. Separate carefully with a fork the meat from the skin and intestines and serve very hot on a bed of thin. hot, buttered toast, with a squeeze of lemon juice and cayenne on the meat. Baked white potatoes go admirably with this dish.

Smoked White Fish-This fish is so delicate that it is scarcely possible to do more than dip it in boiling water. While doing this hold the fish by the tail, strip the skin off instantly and serve in two pieces on a hot dish with drawn butter and chopped parsley. Plattered Salmon.

Pick bones from one can of salmon, spread over the bottom of the platter. Cover this with a layer of rolled crackers. Put a lump of butter the size of an egg on the stove into a pan; when melted stir into this one large tablespoonful of flour until it browns a little; a pinch of salt and enough milk to make moderately thick; when boiled pour over the salmon; have boiled potatoes, hot. cooked in salt water and dice them to the thickness of one inch over the whole; put the platter into the oven and let brown on top and serve or the platter.

Clove Apples.

Clove apples for cold meats, threequarters of a pound of sugar, two cupfuls of water, and boil to a syrup. drop in quarters of apples, pared, and when they are cooked lift out carefully with a fork. When all the fruit has been cooked drop some of the skins in the syrup with one-half dozen cloves. Cook about 20 minutes, remove the skins, but pour the syrup with the cloves over the apples in a jar, and cover up. This is inexpensive and beats all kinds of chutney.

Use for Crusts.

Do not throw away crusts of bread. Keep all the bits that accumulate in an open receptacle in a dry place. Every once in awhile dry in pans in a slow oven. Then put through the finest part of the meat chopper, fill glass jars, and they will be all ready for bread pudding, stuffings for turkey, chicken or lambs, and for covering escalloped dishes. It is preferable to cracker crumbs, and will keep for

Pecan Fritters.

For these three eggs are beaten separately and a cupful of milk added, with a scant teaspoonful of baking powder, a little salt, three teaspoonfuls of sugar, enough flour to make a stiff batter and a cupful of ground pecan meats. Mix, beat till smooth and add the nuts last; drop by spoonfuls into hot fat, brown, roll in powdered sugar and serve with almond

Banana Fritters.

When something especially dainty is desired the banana fritter has no equal. To prepare it make a batter of a cupful of milk, two eggs beaten light, half a teaspoonful of baking powder, a pinch of salt and enough flour to make a stiff paste. Peel the bananas, slice lengthwise and fry in deep fat. Dust with powdered sugar or serve with a sweet sauce.

Nut Hash.

Chop fine boiled potatoes and any other vegetables desired that happen to be on hand. Put them into a buttered frying pan and heat quickly and thoroughly; salt to taste; then just before serving, stir in lightly a large spoonful of nut meal for each person to be served.

Soft Ginger Cakes.

One cup of lard and butter, one cup of molasses (Orleans), one cup of sugar, one tablespoon of soda, one cup of boiling water, one heaping teaspoon of salt, two eggs, five scant cups of flour, two tablespoons of cinnamon and two of ginger.







Skeleton of a Horse





GOOD CURRYCOMB AND BRUSH

Does Work with One Stroke, Saving Much Time-Handle Is Removable at Pleasure.

The object of most inventions is a saving of time or labor or both. The man who succeeds in doing this usually finds a market for his invention, so it would seem that the California man who designed the combination currycomb and brush has made himself solid with the rural vote. This apparatus consists of an ordinary currycomb plate with a projection ex-

Experiments Demonstrate That Field of Corn Will Yield \$33 per Acre

-Use in Fattening.

(BY PROF. D. H. OTIS. UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN.) Of the various feeds which are the most palatable corn silage is without doubt the cheapest and most effective ration. It is a valuable feed for dairy and beef cattle and also for horses. calves and sheep. Many of the leading Wisconsin farmers find that silage can be handled as cheap, if not cheaper, than the corn crop can be handled in the usual manner. Silage furnishes a succulent feed with very little waste and is always ready to use

In combination with alfalfa or clo ver, with a mixture of corn or barley for grain, silage furnishes an espe cially good ration, all grown on the farm and cheaper than mill feeds. The importance of palatability cannot be overestimated, as it increases the amount of feed eaten and, when properly assimilated, the more the animal

eats the larger product it will return. A ton of mixed hay occupies 400 cubic feet of space and eight tons of corn silage can be put in the same amount of room. The ton of mixed hay contains about 960 pounds of digestible dry matter, while eight tons of silage contain 2.560 pounds of dry nomical storage of the corn cron when put up in the form of silage, is worthy of attention where a large

number of animals are fed. The advantages of feeding silage during periods of drought is fully appreclated by those who have tried it. During the latter part of last summer Wisconsin suffered a severe drought and corn silage was fed to the university dairy herd. The flow of milk was never kept up so well during the sumsilage. The summer silo is sure to become a more important factor in

successful dairying. The use of silage for fattening beef cattle has been tested at a number of conducted by the writer it was found that silage fed steers sold at \$4.95 per 100 pounds, while those fed no silage brought only \$4.70 per 100 pounds, a gain of 25 cents in favor of silage fed animals. It was found that for every 100 pounds of gain 471 pounds of silage fed saved 18 pounds of grain and 156 pounds of alfalfa.

In these tests silage was fed in connection with alfalfa hay, corn chop, Kafir corn chop and cottonseed meal The average soil, in unusual seasons, will produce 12 to 15 tons of green corn per acre. Even with a yield of 10 ons per acre there is an income, according to this experiment, of about

\$33 per acre. The financial statement of this ex periment showed that the silage fed steers made a profit of \$4.10 per head, while the same grade of steers fed on the same feed except silage lost \$1.47 per head.





VALUE OF MEAT CHOPPER

Through Its Use the Housekeeper Is Enabled to Utilize Leftovers in Appetizing Manner.

The meat chopper will soon save more than its cost by enabling one to use cheaper cuts of meat and to utilize leftover meats. Raw beef run through it is a pleasant change from plain steak. It should be well seasoned with salt and pepper before little rolls just as they come from the perforated plate of chopper on a very not pan, with a little butter. Stir quickly on a hot plate. To use remnants of roasts, steak or any nice cooked meat, put them through the chopper and mix with equal measure of bread crumbs; season with salt stock you may have or with cream, making a little more moist than you would dressing for poultry. Put it in a skillet or thick pan, cover closely with a plate and bake in the oven til well heated. Twenty minutes half hour is about right. After a few trials, possibly the first time, any one may succeed in making this very nicemeat, especially cooked ham, is to cut it in small pieces, heat lightly and break over it one egg for each person to be served. When the egg begins to set, cut across them and stir carefully, so as to preserve the distinct yellow and white of the eggs. Serve at once.

Kitchen Table.

The ordinary kitchen table is too low for tall people to work on. 




