Last Monday, District Court convened. Judge Timmins empaneled the grand jury and set them to work, and after laboring four days they returned one indictment, it being a felony.

The case of the State of Texas vs R. A. Ferguson was called, and defendant's motion to quash the

tered into a recognizance with A. C. Pearson, H. C. Dunn and J. A. Ferguson as sureties.

In the case of the State vs T. P. and H. C. Weatherred, charged with stealing, the venue was changed to Tom Green county. Also the case of C. W. Seunday vs. H. C. Weatherred et al. was sent to Tom Green county.

In the case of H. K. Ray vs. Fire Insurance Co. was tried without a jury, and a judgement given to plaintiff for \$1000.

Whereas, a petition has been presented to this Court, signed by numerous property taxpayers voters of Sterling County, Texas, praying that this Court order an election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of Sterling County, the question of issuing the bonds of said County for the purpose of building and equipping a County jail for said County;

And, whereas, the County Commissioners of the County of Sterling, State of Texas, deems it advisable to issue Bonds of said County for such purposes, as will more fully hereinafter appear.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the Commissioners Court of Sterling County, Texas, that an election be held on the 9th day of April, 1910, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

That the Commissioners Court of Sterling County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said county in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) payable in twenty years after date, with the option of redeeming same at any time after ten years after the date of issue, bearing interest at the rate of 5 percent per annum, payable annually, and to annually thereafter levy, assess and collect a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of erecting a county jail in and for Sterling county, Texas.

Said election shall be held at the following places in said county, viz: In the District Court Room of the Sterling county court house, in Sterling City, in voting precinct No. 1; at Mulberry school house in voting precinct No. 2; at China Valley school house in voting precinct No. 3; at Divide school house voting precinct No. 4; at Kellis school house voting precinct No. 5; at Lantana school house voting precinct No. 6; at Lacy school house, voting precinct No. 7; and at Sterling Creek school house, voting precinct No. 8; and the following named persons are hereby appointed as the Managers of said election, viz: W. C. Fisher and T. J. S. Ray, managers of set No. one, and N. L. Douglas and W. V. Church II of set No. two of voting precinct No. One; G. A. Hodges and G. G. Atsworth managers of said election in precinct No. 2; J. F. Hester and J. B. Bugg managers of said election in precinct No. Three; J. L. Copeland and J. R. Welch managers of said election in precinct No. Four; J. W. Reynolds and W. T. Brown managers of said election in precinct No. Seven; and F. M. Askey and J. R. Cope of said election in precinct No. Eight.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 149, Acts of the Twenty-sixth Legislature, Laws of 1899, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of Sterling county, Texas, shall be allowed to vote at said election; and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue said bonds, shall have printed on their ballots the words, "For the issuance of the Bonds, and the tax;" and those desiring to oppose said proposition shall have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the issuance of the Bonds, and the Tax." The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the Laws of the State of Texas governing general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of Sterling county, Texas, shall serve as proper notice of said election; and the county judge of said county is hereby directed to cause a copy of said notice to be posted up at each of the several places hereinbefore designated for holding said election, at least Twenty days prior to the date of holding said election; and shall further cause a copy of said notice to be published for four consecutive weeks in some newspaper published in Sterling county, Texas—the first of such publications to appear not less than thirty days immediately preceding the date of said election.

different cattlemen in this section have been missing one or two head of stock at intervals, and informed the officers to that effect. Aided by Cattle Inspector Fletcher Treadwell, the sheriff and his deputies have been constantly at work on the case, and the culmination came Monday night:

The first clue developed when hides bearing the brands of Tol Cawley, Murph March and others were offered for sale in San Angelo, and were discovered by Mr. Treadwell. He learned that to those who had disposed of the hides, none of these ranchmen had recently sold cattle. Monday afternoon Sheriff McConnell, Deputy Spears and Inspector Treadwell reached Carlsbad in an automobile, and about dusk he Bartons were arrested. The men, it is alleged, had just butchered a cow which was identified as belonging to Tol Cawley, and hauled the meat and hide in a wagon to the shop, shortly after which they found themselves in the indictment was overruled. After hearing the testimony of nearly a score of witnesses, the court overruled defendant's motion for a change of venue. After consuming two days in trying these motions, both State and Defendant announced ready for trial. Two days were consumed in the trial. With District Attorney, L. H. Brightman, assisted by W. A. Wright and Pat Kellis for the estate, and Lee Upton, of San Angelo, and Jeff D. Ayres, of this place, for the Defendant, it proved to be one of the hottest legal battles ever fought in the county. Every inch of the ground was contested by both the state and defendant, and on Thursday afternoon the case went to the jury, which after being out about two hours, returned a verdict of guilty and assessed his punishment at three years in the penitentiary. Counsel for defendant filed a motion for a new trial, which was overruled. Defendant then gave notice of appeal, and entered in

Upon this the 10th day of February, 1910, came on to be considered a petition signed by W. T. Latham and 47 other freeholders of Sterling County, asking that an election be ordered in accordance with law to determine whether or not hogs shall be permitted to run at large within the bounds of Sterling County; and it appearing that said petition is signed by over fifty freeholders of Sterling County, it is, therefore, ordered by the Court that an election be held on the 9th day of April, 1910, at the usual places in the several election voting precincts in Sterling County, to determine whether or not hogs shall be permitted to run at large within the bounds of Sterling County.

The managers for general elections at the several election precincts are hereby appointed managers for said election. No person shall vote at said election unless he be a freeholder in the County and a qualified voter under the Constitution and law.

All votes shall be by ballot, and voters desiring to prevent hogs from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words, "For the stock law," and voters in favor of allowing hogs to run at large shall place upon their ballots the words, "Against the stock law."

The County Judge shall issue an order for said election and cause public notice thereof to be given for at least thirty days before the day of election by publication of this order therefor in the News-Record, a newspaper published in said Sterling County.

Said election shall be held and conducted and returns thereof made in accordance with the laws regulating general elections in so far as the same are applicable.
