

1 Cent Per Ton Per Mile. Railroad transportation saves 42 cents per ton per mile as compared with public highways, and illustrates the economy of improved methods of transportation. As a producer the farmer who hauls a bale of cotton twenty miles to the railroad gets the same price as the farmer who hauls it one mile, and as a consumer the farm-er who haus his goods twenty miles from the railroad to the farm buys them at the same price as the farmer




