DEATH RIDES DOWN WITH STEEL AND FIRE

AMERICA'S MOST HORRIFYING WEEK END.

TORTURE CHAMBER DEATHS

Helpless Women Leap to Death From Tenth Story With Clothes All Aflame.

New York, March 27 .- No month in many years has closed under a greater cloud of disaster and distressing loss of life and property than March, 1911. Mine disasters large and small have marked every week. The horrors of horrors was reserved to the end of last week

Steamer Disaster-26 Dead. The British Columbia steamer Sehelt, built for passenger service on an inland lake, turned turtle in a furious gale off Berrher Head, Vancouver Island, late Friday and went down with all on hoard, twenty-two passengers and the crew of four men. Thirteen passengers had landed at William Head just before the steamer went out to destruction. Most of the passengers were railroad laborers bound for a Canadian Northern construction camp, but a few were resi dents of Sooke

Railway Wreck-Nine Deaths.

Eight people were killed, one has died since, and more than a dozen injured when the Dixie Flyer on the Atlantic Coast Line, running between Chicago and Jacksonville, Fla., went through a trestle over the Alapaha River, eighteen miles east of Tifton, Ga., early Saturday morning.

The cars plunged nto the river without a moment's warning to the sleeping passengers when an axle on the engine suddenly snapped when midway of the trestle. The locomotive never left the track.

The trestle is about a half mile long, but the river was low and at the point of the accident was not more than fifty yards across.

How the fire started will perhapt never be known. A corner on the eighth floor was its point of origin and the three upper floors only were swept. On the ninth floor fifty bod les were found; sixty-three or more people were crushed to death by jumping and more than thirty clog ged the elevator shafts. The loss to property will not exceed \$100,000.

Four alarms were rung within fit teen minutes. Before the engine respond, before the net could be stretched or the ladden raised five girls had fallen from the eighth and ninth floors so heavily that into the vaults below. 
