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

## Scrambled Eggs and Sardines.

In Texas we raised 18,780,000 bushels, which is approximately five bushels



An examination of the wheat acre age planted in Texas each year for past three years shows an irreguand volcanic condition. In 1908 we harvested 924,000 acres, in 1909 there were 555:000 acres harvested, and in 1910 we harvested 1,252.000 acres, indicating sudden and rapid changes in

Our wheat crop ranks third in value of Texas' agricultural products and has a farm value of \$18.404.000. We produced fifteen bushels per acre and the farm value was \$14.70 per acre.

## Dealing With The Horn Fly

paid a forfeit that must have made At this time of year, people who milk cows are grievously pestered the old man rejoice. by the horn flies. The continuous switching of the tail, lifting of the EPWORTH LEACUE feet and general fly fighting movements of the cow make milking an unpleasant job.

The writer has tried various schemes to overcame this unpleasant feature of milking, and after many experiments has adopted the following: He procured a common tin spray pump at the drugstore for 50 cents. The reservoir was filled Rev. J. T. Redmon. with kerosene. On a swarm of flies Scripture readings: a spray is shot from the pump and they fall to the ground like blackbirds from the fire of a shotgun, and then milking can go on in peace.
