G. E. BUTLER DEAD

The News of The Death of This Popular Young Man Was A Shock to Our Community.

Last Saturday morning, this community was shocked by the announcement that Guy Butler was dead.

Deceased was 24 years, 1 month and 17 days of age when he died, and was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Butler, whose home is now in Roscoe, and who were at his bedside when he died. His sisters, Mrs. W. F. Lathan, Mrs. Ada Cochran and Miss Era Butler, were also present at his death.

He was buried at the Montvale cemetery, Sunday at 1 o'clock, p. m., with the honors of the Woodmen of The World. Rev. Redmon conducted the funeral services. The funeral procession of vehicles bearing those who knew and loved the boy during his life was more than a half mile long, and quite a number of his friends went on foot in order to pay their last tribute of respect to the beloved dead.

Guy E. Butler was almost raised in this county, having come here when a child and remained until he reached his majority. He was a young man of fine traits of character and of a most lovable disposition, and was a favorite of the whole community. He was one of the esteemed units of the Woodmen of The World, and a cherished member of the local Baraca class.

But when death does come, and touches the heart and stills it forever, and we are made to lay all that is left of that which was life and joy and a living being away in the silent dust, it is then we are made to realize our helpless dependence on God, our Father, and cry to Him for comfort in our affliction and surcease of sorrow.

In this sad hour we join all Sterling City in offering our sincere sympathy to the bereaved parents, sisters and relatives, and mourn with them for their beloved dead.

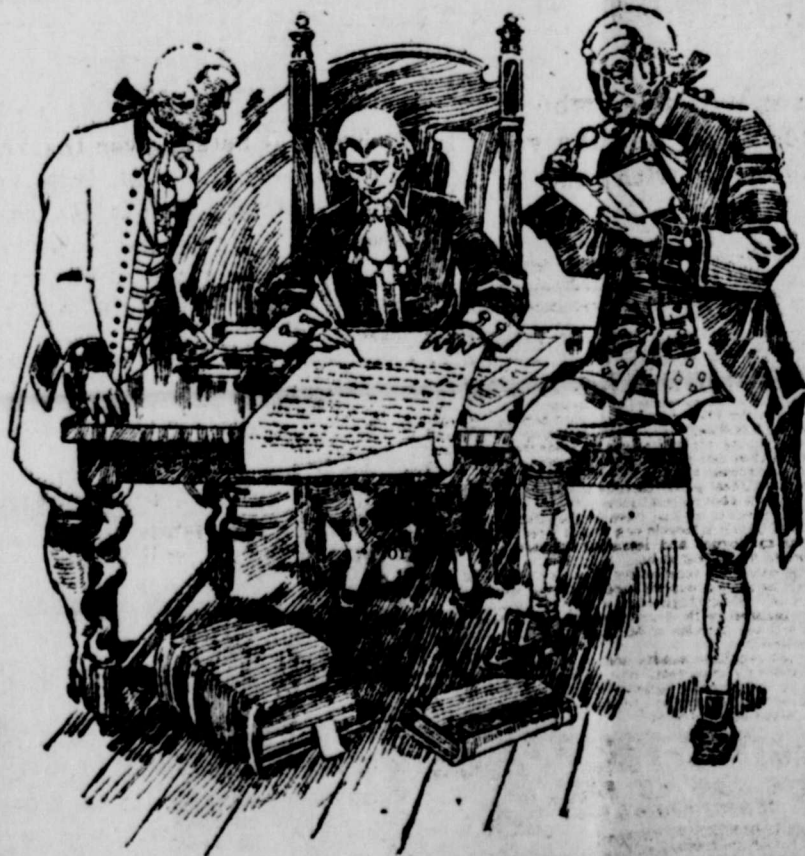

WEALTH OF FARMER GROWS THE FASTEST

RURAL INCREASE 117 PER CENT AGAINST CITY'S 59

121 NEW TOWNS IN TEXAS

During the past decade the value of our property assessed as town and city lots, which includes the lands and buildings within our city limits, has advanced in value from \$189,760,828 in 1900 to \$506,255,233 in 1910, making an increase of \$317,495,410 or 167 per cent, but city property not being rendered at its true value it is likely that its actual increase in value will exceed \$600,000,000. No attempt is made to separate the value of the buildings from the value of the land within our city limits by either the State Comptroller or the Federal Census Bureau and the information is therefore not available.

The Federal Census shows that we have built 121 new cities during the past decade, and our city population has increased from 559,873 in 1900 to 938,104 in 1910, making an increase of 378,233 or 67 per cent. We now have twenty cities with ten thousand population and over, and three cities that approximate 100,000 in population.

The per capita increase in wealth of city population, taking the assessed value of city lots and buildings as a basis, has advanced from \$339 in 1900 to \$540 in 1910, making an increase of \$210 per capita or 59 per cent.

Compare these figures with those of the per capita increase in farm wealth and we find the farmer has made an increase of 117 per cent against an increase of 59 per cent within our cities. These figures prove that we have greater opportunities on the farm for money making than in the city and if our citizenship could fully appreciate the force of this comparison it would turn the tide of our population back to the soil.

Texas has probably suffered less from the rush of its citizenship from the farm to the city than any other State in the Union. While our cities have shown a rapid increase in population our farms have considerably more than held their own. Our cities have been built up by immigration, inter-state and foreign and have drawn very little from the farms.

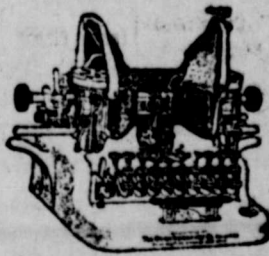

The apple has always played an important part in the history of the human race. The fig is the pioneer of Texas fruits and the numerous races of the tree have explored most every section of the State, but it has more thickly populated the coast country than any other part of Texas. According to the Texas Almanac we have 3,710 acres now in commercial fig orchards on the coast country and the planting of an additional thousand acres is under contract. Galveston County leads in fig culture, having 1,325 acres. The largest fig orchards in the world are located in this county. The farm value of the annual output of one acre of bearing figs averages \$350 and the total value of the annual Texas output approximates \$1,000,000.

WHOLE WORLD THE FIELD

Current Domestic and Foreign News Boiled Down to Readable and Small Space.

The enrollment in the Dallas schools is 12,175.
Fifteen thousand dollar fire loss occurred in Oak Cliff Tuesday.
The Supreme Court is working harder than ever before in its history.
American soldiers will use light sweaters instead of coats in the field.
The National Packing Company has reorganized to comply with anti-trust laws.
North Texas Conference of the Methodist Church is in session at Gainesville.
A hundred thousand dollar company is forming to develop water power on the St. Lawrence river.
The nineteenth reunion of Dallas Consistory, Scottish Rite Masons, is in session this week in that city.
W. H. Simmons, charged with embezzlement of \$25,000 from the First National Bank of Lake Charles, La., is on trial in the United States district court at Shreveport.
Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson, charged with the murder of Alvis Linnell, was arraigned in Boston and pleads not guilty. Trial will take place in January.

The equal franchise society of New York, founded by Mrs. Mackay, is about to start a suffrage reading library on one of the cross streets east of Fifth avenue.
In the majority opinion of the commercial court in the continental rates cases it is held that the long and short haul provisions of the Interstate Commerce Act is constitutional.
John McGuire, fourteen, Archie Clark, thirteen and William Perry, eight, are dead at Rochester, N. Y. The boys threw a nitro-glycerine cartridge into a bonfire they had built.
On Tuesday Archbishop John Farley of New York, and the most Rev. Diomed Falconio, apostolic delegate to Washington, sailed for Rome, where they will be elevated to the college of cardinals.
President Taft is planning to take up the high cost of living in a special message to congress when he transmits the report of the tariff board's investigation of the wool and cotton schedules.
Lilly Marshall and Mrs. Laura Smith fought a duel with knives at Sapulpa, Okla., Monday. Mrs. Smith is dead and the other woman refuses to talk about the matter. Both are Indians and rich land owners.
The New York City authorities said Tuesday the garbage haulers strike was broken and the disappearing piles of refuse confirmed their assertions. Still there were fears that the drivers would not surrender without a final struggle.
Cal Rodgers, the aviator, regained consciousness at Pasadena and announces he will complete his trip in the same machine in which he sustained the fall on Sunday. Sunday, he says, is his hoo-doo day, and therefore he will make no more Sunday flights.

A special train of hotel men in the "See America First" trip arrives in Texas Tuesday to attend the North Texas and Arkansas Hotel Men's convention. To the two states hotel men the visitors proposed an organization to secure legislation protecting hotel keepers from swindling, the object being to secure a law which will enable hotel men to obtain convictions for this kind of fraud, particularly against those passing worthless checks.
State Superintendent Bralley makes an official recommendation to the boards of trustees of all public schools and to presidents of all state normals to suspend work not later than noon, November 29, for the remainder of the week, in order to permit their teachers, without loss of salary, to attend the Twenty-second annual meeting of the Southern Educational Association, to be held at Houston, November 30 to December 2nd.
Although it has been the desire of the navy department to abolish the number of the smaller southern navy yards, it now seems possible a new policy of specialization will result in the continuance of Charleston and other Southern yards. This would be to have each station cover some particular field of naval work or serve as a training station or basis of supplies.
A Bomar Law has been elected as leader of the Unionist party in parliament, succeeding A. J. Balfour, who resigned.
The executive council of the American Federation of Labor now holding its thirty-first annual convention in Atlanta on Tuesday recommended that the Carpenters and Joiners, suspended at the last meeting of the Federation in St. Louis, be reinstated. More than 200,000 Carpenters and Joiners will be affected by the action of the convention's recommendation.

Then He Struck.
A few days ago a second-class stoker was paraded before the commanding officer of the Devonport naval barracks on a charge of insubordination. His insubordination took the form of resistance to being introduced to the swimming bath. Asked what he had to say for himself, the youth replied: "Sir, I've only bin in the navy three days. The first day the doctor drewed six of my teeth. The second day I was vaccinated. And the third day 'e petty officer he says, 'Cum along, we're a-going to drown yer!'"—London Truth.

Teachers to Go Abroad.
American and German-American school-teachers will go abroad next summer in great numbers, and already 3000 reservations have been made on steamers. The trip will be made under the auspices of the National German-American Teachers' association, which is to hold the convention of 1912 in Berlin. Both countries are interested in the convention.
