E.PLOSION IN MINE

NO CAUSE FOR ACCIDENT IN WYOMING COAL SHAFT.

HELMET MEN GO TO RESCUE

Federal Crew Rushed to Scene and with Special Equipment Good Work Is Done.

Kemmerer, Wyo.-The cause of the dust explosion in mine No. 4 of the Kemmerer Coal Company Sunday, which caused the death of five men and the injury of eighteen others, has not yet been determined.

Nine of the more seriously injured were removed to a hospital at Rock Springs, Wyo. The explosion occurred in what is

known as the "second north" entry, 100 feet from the main slope and 1,000 feet from the surface. The force of the explosion was confined closely and only those were injured. Miners in other por-

tions of the mine made their way to the surface safely. Fans Remain in Operation. The fans remained in operation

and the after-damp soon was cleared from the entries. As soon as the alarm was given

rescue crews were summoned from

other mines and the United States mine rescue car stationed several miles away was rushed to the scene. Led by helmet men, rescue volunteers made their way with little difficulty and began the removal of the injured. A thorough search of the workings was made today and all the 112 men in the mine when the explosion took place are accounted for.

State Mine Inspector George Blaker, in charge of district No. 1, reached Kemmerer and immediately began an examination of the mine to determine the cause of the explosion.






