Ancient Entrance to the Old Mamo

MAY HAVE LED FROM THAT HISTORIC BUILDING TO THE SAN ANTONIA RIVER.

San Antonia, Tex., Feb. 3.-What right be the entrance to the tunnel er tunnels which legends say leg from the Alamo to the missious and uncovered Saturday afternoon near the southeast corner of the sight of the old fort building. Several stones, the soil had at one time been excavated from that point was evident when tests were made with a crowbar. There was only the slightest resistance when the workman sunk the bar several feet.

The ancient tunpels leading from the Alamo have furnished much food for discussion. One of the tunnels is said to lead from the Alamo to the chain of missions and in recent years when excavations were ma le for the buildings south of the Alamo evidences of the tunnel were brought to light. Another tunnel is said to lead to the San Aptonio river and into the bend between the Crockett and Navarro street bridges. Those persons who have made a close perusal of the historical data concerning the garly days believe the latter tunnel was to have been used only in an emergency when the water supply within the fort failed.

CUNNEL WAS GUARDED The entrance to the tunnel was found within what had been the extreme east room of the south wing of the fort building which originally was erected in an L shape. That the tunnel entrance was well guarded is evidenced by the old iron gratings still remaining in the windows of this room. Also, it was but a few steps from the only entrance leading from the interior of

It is expected when the exc va ions really get under way the disclosures will be of great interest. It is not probable that some valuable records or other things might have been placed in the tunnel for safe keeping. Several days ago it was intimated that if the tunnel leading toward the river is still fairly well preserved, an effort will be made to inspect it.





Such deep plowing is usually best accomplished by gradually increasing the depth, although there is no great damage done on ordinary soils by going down deeply at once.

There are certain types of plows on the market which have a tendency to thoroughly mix the soil from the bottom and the top of the furrow slice. Such plows can be used with safety to plow as deep as desired and do it at once, observing the precaution given above, viz., plowing a considerable period prior to the planting of crops.

Plowing is best done when the soil contains a degree of moisture which is just right to cause it to pulverize well when thrown out by the plow. If plowed in this condition deep plowing works no serious injury on the soil; in fact, it usually works a benefit. Deep plowing when the soil is very dry and lumpy unless followed by propitious rains, usually works injury.


