PLEASING CONDITIONS FOLLOW LACOSTE'S CAPTURE.

CIRCULAR GIVEN TO OFFICIALS

President Writes All Citizens Are Now Pursuing Vocations Without Danger.

Havana: The Cuban Government is greatly pleased with conditions in Oriente Province, especially the news of the capture of Eugenio Lacoste, who, although almost a helpless paralytic, commanded a column, and was regarded by the Government as one of the principal guiding spirits of the insurrection. He surrendered unconditionally to Major Costillo in the Guantanamo district his column be-

President Gomez has issued a circular to the authorities in all parts of the island announcing that the revolutionary movement has so notably diminished, complete tranquility prevailing in all the provinces except Oriente-that all citizens are now pursuing their vocations without danger. The circular added that the authorities now had sufficient forces to suppress any disorders.

MANY LIVES LOST IN FLOOD.

Cloudburst in Guanajuato, Mexico, Causes Great Damage.

Guanajuato, Mexico: A cloudburst here Sunday flooded the city to a

depth of several feet. The loss of life and property was large, but its amount can not yet be estimated as many bodies were carried several miles down the valley and probably will not be recovered for several days.

The Porfirio Diaz drainage tunnel saved the town from a greater disaster. The fall of rain was greater than in 1905, when over 200 lives were fost and damage estimated at \$250,-000 done to property.

The city is in a narrow gorge with many American mining properties in the surrounding hills. The Guanajuate River. At the junction point, the water reached its greatest depth. After the flood in 1905, a tunnel over a mile long was cut through the mountain to prevent a recurrence of the disaster. The tunnel proved to be too small to carry all the water, and the lower part of the town suffered.

28 KILLED IN MISSOURI STORM.

Path is Half Mile Wide and Five Miles In Length.

Kansas City, Mo .: Twenty-eight people are known to have been killed and many injured by a storm that passed over Central West Missouri late Saturday, demolishing buildings, tearing down wires and leaving the smaller towns and country homes completely wrecked.

From meager reports that have been received it is said that the storm that struck Kansas City late Saturday. causing the death of two people and doing damage amounting to many thousands of dollars, swept to the south through Bates County, where it left a trial of death and destruction. The path of the storm was half a mile wide and five miles long. Between Merwin and Orain nineteen people were killed.

Automobile Falls Into Creek.

McKinney, Tex.-Friday morning about 6 o'clock Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Brooks and little daughter, Mabel and niece, little Miss Hale of Dallas, and Robert Procter, all from Paris, in an auto plunged into East Fork Creek, about two miles north of McKinney. The auto fell about twenty-five feet. None of the occupants were injured. They were en route to Dallas to visit relatives.

Rebels Receive Ammunition.

El Paso, Tex.-Two machine guns and two mortars with several cases of ammunition for both, were brough to Juarez on the Mexican Central train About thirty rebels came in charge of the guns. The guns and ammunition were unloaded at Juarez and taken to the Cuartel. Col. Pascuel Orozco said the guns would be against attack by Maderistas, if such should happen, and would be kept with the garrison in Juarez.

Cordova, Alaska: The relief tug Rendoda's report from Karluk that there was no sign of life on the mainland this side of Shelikof Strait in the vicinity of the mountain virtually confirm the fears that the mainland village, with a total population roughly estimated at 200, perished in the disaster. All efforts have failed to obtain news from the Government station at Afkogna, on the island of the same name, which lies just north of Kodiak Island.

The Delicious Strawberry Can Easily Be Preserved So It Will Retain Its Flavor.

The season of the delicious strawerry is not very long and it behooves the housewife to be familiar with methods of preserving so that the berries may best retain their flavor. Strawberries make the most delicate

of preserves. Use pound for pound of fruit and sugar. Select the largest. most perfect berries; put in deep dishes; sprinkle over the sugar and shake the dishes so it may reach all the berries; leave 12 hours, or longer if more convenient; drain off the juice carefully and boil until it is like jelly, then put in the berries, a few at a time (not pour them in a mass), and let simmer 15 minutes. Skim them out carefully, put in pint cans or jelly cups, and fill with the syrup. When cold cover with melted paraffin and tie up jam .- Farm and Home.

STUFFED PICKLED PEPPERS

Delicious Relish That Will Sharpen the Appetite and Will Repay Cook for Her Work.

Cut a slit in the side of large, sweet green peppers, and scoop out all of the seeds carefully. Make a strong brine and put the peppers to soak in it for 24 hours, changing the brine twice. For a filling chop cabbage, green tomatoes, onions, small-cucumbers, and a few strips of horse radish. Have equal proportions of all the vegetables and mix with them thoroughly an ounce of celery and mustard seed each, and half an ounce of curry powder. Rub the inside of the peppers, after being well drained with a mixed spice, composed of ground cinnamon, cloves and allspice. Then fill with the chopped mixture. Sew up the opening, put the peppers in a stone jar, and cover with good strong spiced vinegar. Have the vinegar boiling hot.

Two kinds of curtains at a window are not by any means a necessity, but in almost all cases sheh an arrange ment is extremely attractive, says the Ladies' Home Journal. Baste frequently with the tomatoes and serve all together on the one platter. Do not bake in an iron pan on account of the acid tomatoes, but use an agate or aluminum roaster.

MIDSUMMER SNOWSTORM AFFLICTS COLORADO

Denver, Colo., June 17.—Reports from the mountain districts in Colorado today told of the worst midsummer snowstorm ever experienced in this region. In the plains districts of the eastern and western slopes rain has fallen almost continuously since midnight Sunday, extending well into New Mexico. The racord snowfall of fourteen inches was reported from Breckenridge, Colo., with lighter falls at Cripple Creek, Aspen, Leadville and Central City. The snow melted rapidly and floods are threatened in all mountain streams.

THE RAIN.

Last Sunday night a good rain fell here. On Monday night clouds began to gather in the north, and about eight o'clock a fierce gale came up out of the northeast and continued for two hours. Then rain it would have sounded more eubegan falling and continued at intervals during the night. The total rainfall here during the two nights was five-eights of an inch, Reports from Iolanthe and vicinity say a total of three inches fell there during Monday night. The rain, although light in some places, was general all over the county. Watervalley, Carlsbad and San Angelo were visited by good rains. The thermometer dropped from 107 to 50 degrees from Monday noon to Tuesday at sunup.



The greatest physical triumph of the human race is building railroads. They are the most powerful single influence in modern civilzation today and are the greatest colonizers the world has

We have fourteen thousand miles of railroads in Texas, which are sufficient to reach across the United States five times. We have the largest railroad mileage of any state in the Union, but we rank fortieth in mileage per arm.

The Texas Welfare Commission is investigating the railroad industry. R. C. Duff of Houston is chairman of the sub-committee on Railroads and Railroad Securities.

Transportation

In discussing the cost of transporation the Texas Commercial Secrearies' Association says that, as a ule, the producer pays the freight to he factory or market and the con-sumer pays the freight from the factory to the point of consumption. Public Highways.

We have 121,500 m'les of public hickways in Tenes with only 2,000 miles classed as improved public roads. The average cost of hauling freight over the public highways of Texas is 43 cents per ton per mile.





CULTURE OF ALFALFA

Careful Leveling and Smoothing of Land Necessary.

Either Irrigation or Sufficient Length of Time and Attention Given to Conservation of Moisture Should Be Practiced.

Sowing alfalfa in the sod or on sod and seldom results favorably. Alfalfa seed has become scarce and expensive and should never be wasted or thrown away in a poor seed bed. New land should be cultivated in some other crop at least one year before it is seeded to alfalfa. The seed bed should be moist and well packed. On this account it is advisable to plow in Where irrigation is practiced too much care cannot be given. The careful leveling and smoothing of land which is to be seeded to alfalfa is nec-

essary. The crop is to remain on the soil for from two to ten or more years. and avoiding future expense of difficult irrigating will pay many times

It is well to level the ground care fully and then try it by giving a flood irrigation before the seed is planted. If there are holes or bumps which are difficult to irrigate, go on again with a scraper, land grader or home-made leveler. Either irrigation or sufficient length of time and attention given to conservation of moisture should always be practiced before planting alfalfa seed, writes B. C. 


