In 1910, a majority of the citizens of Sterling county subscribed a bonus of \$42,000.00 for the building of the railroad from San Angelo to Sterling City. The railroad people carried out their part of the contract to the letter. When the bonus money came due, nearly every man who put his name to the subscription list promptly paid, but there were some who, through misfortune, could not pay. It was found that there was a balance of \$2,642 that could not be collected from those who had subscribed, and it was necessary to assess and collect this amount from those who had guaranteed its payment.

The assessments were made out by the railroad bonus committee and placed in the hands of Jeff D. Ayres for collection. Mr. Ayres proceeded to collect \$2,000 of the \$2,642, and send it to Joseph Spence, the Santa Fe's local attorney, at San Angelo. In his remittance letter, Mr. Ayres stated the facts in the case and begged that his people be allowed a little more time in which to raise the balance of \$642. Mr. Spence sent Mr. Ayres' letter along with the money to A. C. Torbett, at Galveston, to be credited on the Sterling County railroad bonus. Mr. Torbett passed the letter to F. G. Pettibone, M. E. Wilson and E. P. Ripley, head men of the Santa Fe. Imagine Mr. Ayres' surprise, one day this week, when a letter came, inclosing the \$2,000 which he had

Texas has 5,000 factories.

gas engines in Texas factories. We  
also have 3,454 electric, 1 water  
motor and 31 water wheels supply-  
ing power.

Less than 2 per cent of the fac-  
tory wage earners of Texas are un-  
der 16 years of age.

To operate Texas factories one  
year requires a million tons of coal,  
two hundred thousand cords of wood,  
three and one-half million barrels  
of oil and a hundred million cubic  
feet of gas.

Only 3,882 women work in the  
Texas factories.

The prevailing hours of labor in  
Texas factories are 54 per week.
