130 Passengers and 86 of Crew Are Rescued From the Gothland.

The telegram describing the victory was received by Cole Orneals, the Juarez commander, and by Lazro De La Garza, Villa's agent here. It was signed by Gen. Orestes Pereyra, commander at Torreon, and read:

"I have the honor to communicate to you that Tuesday at 6 p. m. the important city of Zacatecas was captured by the forces of the division of the north. We took many prisoners and captured a large quantity of ammunition and arms. There were large sses on our side.

"Gen. Trinidad Rodriguez was seriously wounded and Gen. Maclovio Herrera was slightly wounded."

## SUES TO DISSOLVE ASS'N HUNTING WILDCATS IN MAINE WOODS

How a Game Warden Was Saved From at Least a Bad Clawing.

### HUNTER'S FINE SHOT

Shoots the Animal Between the Ever With Revolver as the Beast Was in the Air Springing Toward His Com-

Bangor, Me .- The life of Game War den E. S. Hodgkins was saved recently in the woods near here by the quick-Ryer, proprietor of a set of sporting camps at Hound Brook lake. The two men had been hunting wildcats with dogs and had killed two of the animals. They were standing under a tree when Mr. Ryer chanced to look

upward Perched on a branch, directly above the game warden, was another cat, as over his glittering teeth, and the look mal gave a start and leaped full for Warden Hodgkins, still unconscious of his danger. Ryer, shouting a hasty cry of warning, whipped his 38 caliber revolver from his holster and fired while the cat was in the air. The bullet struck the animal between the eyes

and he dropped on the snow, dead. "It was the closest call I ever had and I never want another like it," Warden Hodgkins said in telling of the affair.

While Warden Hodgkins was snowshoeing through a swamp between Forest and Eaton last winter he found the carcasses of two deer, nearly devoured by wildcats. He hastened to Forest, where he told William Ryer. who has hunted the animals for 51 years in Nova Scotia and who has

English hound is twelve years old and the scars on her head and body show she has been in many a hard-fought battle.

With these three dogs Warden Hodgkins and Mr. Ryer started out in pursuit of the cats. When they arrived at the place where the deer had been killed they found the fresh tracks of four large animals. The dogs soon started them, two of the dogs going in one direction and the little English hound going in another. Hodgkins followed the small dog and soon came upon her and a large wildcat. The dog was circling around the beast and Warden Hodgkins killed the cat with one shot from his revolver.

In the meantime Mr. Ryer had a similar experience with the other dogs and another cat. After he had killed his animal he and Warden Hodgkins returned to the place where the deer had been killed. 

appetizing With "Filling" of Stiff On ange Marmalade-Nut-Drop Confections Popular With Everybody-Clover Biscuits.

Light, flaky, biscuits, temptingly browned, always receive a smiling welcome at the table. But have you ever tried any variations of your standard recipe? I have experimented and have concocted some goodies that disappear like cake, writes a contributor to the Woman's World. They are delicious not only for the home meal but for lunches. And the housekeeper finds them just the thing to serve with chocolate as light appetizing refreshments to guests. Orange two-story biscuits are my

own idea. To make them, sift together two cupfuls of bread flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, half a teaspoonful salt and a tablesponful of sugar. Beat one entire egg and add two-thirds of a cupful of sweet milk for wetting the dough. No shortening is used. Knead the dough lightly and roll thinner than biscuits are usually made. Cut the rounds with a cookie cutter or the open end of a pound baking powder can. From half of the rounds remove the centers with a smaller cutter. Spread the whole rounds with melted butter, lay one of the dough rings on each and fill the centers with stiff orange mar-

malade before baking. Nut-drop biscuits were my next successful trial at making "goodies." For them, sift together a pint of flour, half a teaspoonful of salt and two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Rub in a generous tablespoonful of butter and stir to the consistency of a thick batter, using sweet milk to moisten. Add half a cupful of chopped nuts and drop the dough with a spoon upon a greased baking sheet, leaving an inch between "drops" for swelling.

Sandwich biscuits require four cupfuls of flour, four tablespoonfuls of baking powder, a teasponful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of meat drippings, their manners-are, in fact, the most half a cupful of milk, and water to complete the wetting to the ordinary biscuit consistency. Roll the dough thin, like pie crust, cut, spread half the rounds with butter, add a filling of seasoned, finely ground, cooked

ham, then lay on the covers and bake. Clover biscuits are dainty mouth-Use any standard recipe for regular biscuit dough. Cut into rounds an inch in diameter. (I use the center of my round loaf cake pan, inverted, as a cutter.) Place the tiny rounds in threes in greased gem cake pans and glaze the tops with egg yolk mixed with a little water. When baked, the group of three from each mold will come out in trefoil shape.

Some brands of flour absorb more moisture than others, so the amount of milk or water used for biscuits is not absolute. Roll an inch thick, cut in large rounds, cut two gashes at right angles across the top of each, and moisten the tops with milk before baking. Some cooks like to fill the cross cuts with sugar.

Appetizing Steak.

To make the steak take three pounds of bottom round steak six onions (medium size), one cupful of diced turnips, one cupful of tomato uice, two cupfuls of green peas, one teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper. Cut the steak in pleces suitable for serving, dip in flour and brown well in drippings. Add the onions, turnips, tomato juice and seasonings and barely cover with boiling water. Simmer until tender (about 21/2 hours), replenishing the water if ssary, and serve garnished with

Put the bananas and apricots through a sieve. Cook the sugar and water together to make a thin sirup (ten minutes). Add the juice, pulp, and freeza. Very inexpensive and good.




