WHITE HOUSE CAST IN GLOOM Kronprinzessin Cecelie, With Cargo of Gold and Many Passengers, in Safety.

### TURNED BACK IN MIDOCEAN

Captain Feared Capture by Prowling Every message coming out of the air Cruisers of Powers at War-Too Rich a Prize to Be Overlooked-Had to Sail Through Fog Without Lights.

Bar Harbor, Me.-The Kronprinzessin Cecelie of the North German Lloyd line, with a cargo of \$11,000,000 and full list of passengers, arrived safely in the harbor here, having crept in under cover of fog and night, and


