care Troops Are Driven From Their Positions Along the Werezycs River.

Vienna, via London.-The Russians pere in general retreat Monday morning along their entire front, after having been forced out of their positions on the Werezyes river, a short dist nce to the west of Lemberg.

German Official Report.

Berlin, via London.-The armies uner Gen. von Mackensen are continung their advance upon Lemberg, the Calician capital, after capturing Groek, and have taken Russian trenches, one after another, along a front of alnost 24 miles to the northwest of the ity, where the Muscovites are making a desperate stand, according to a talement issued at the headquarters of the German army staff. The comnunication follows.

Eastern Theatre.

"Russian attacks against our lines bout Szawle and Augustowo were esten off.

"Our advance in small divisions reulted in the capture of advanced posiions of the enemy near Budtbrzysieki and Zalesie, east of the Przasnysz Myszniec road.

Southeastern Theatre.

"South of the Pilica, troops under General von Woyrich have taken sev eral advanced enemy positions during the last few days.

"The armies under General von Mackensen have taken the Grodek poition. German troops and the corps of Field Marshal von Arz attacked strongly intrenched enemy lines. After stubborn fighting enemy trenches, one behind the other, almost along the entire front extending over a distance of 24 miles north of Janow (11 miles northwest of Lemberg), Risputa and thely and southeast of man rusta (32 miles northwest of Lemberg). had been stormed. mand of the Galician campaign. BATTLESHIP ARIZONA LAUNCHED

With Sister Ship Pennsylvania Are Largest Superdreadnoughts Afloat. New York.—The new battleship Ari-

ona was successfully launched at the Brooklyn navy yard here Saturday. The Arizona shares with her sister thip, the Pennsylvania, the honor of being the world's largest battleships. GERMANS FORCED BACK IN FRANCE

VIGOROUS COUNTER ATTACKS REPULSED BY FRENCH HEAVY ARTILLERY FIRE.

STEINBRUCK IS CAPTURED

French Report Sharp Advances, Both on Their Own and Enemy's Territory, in Two Days' Battle.

Paris .- An official communication by the war office describes intense activity along the French front, the allied forces delivering powerful attacks and the Germans counter-attacking furiously. To the north of Arras the French have carried several lines. of German trenches and are making marked progress toward Souchez. Heavy losses on both sides are reported. The text says:

"We have realized important progress, almost all of which has been maintained, notwithstanding the furious counter-attacks of the enemy. is especially in the north part of the sector that we have progressed, carry ing several lines of trenches on both sides of the road from Aix Houlette to Souchez. We made advances toward Souchez, in the directions northwest, southeast, west and east, in an uninterrupted fashion

Gains Near Souchez. "Farther to south we have taken

part of the park of the Chateau de Carleul, captured the cemetery of Souchez (Hill 119). To the worth, t the east and to the south of Neuville we took by assault the enemy's first line and at certain points the second line. The units engaged fought at the point of the bayonet and with grenades under a violent artillery fire.

"Our infantry, having attacked with shells, was obliged to make front during the night of Wednesday-Thursday against violent and repeated counterand repulsed them along the entire front.

Eleven German Divisions. "The Germans brought into the en-

gagement eleven divisions, which suffered extremely heavy losses. The morale of our troops is perfect. The number of prisoners taken by us exceeds 600, including more than 20 Steinbruck is Captured.

We have taken Althenhof (Althor), a suburb of Metzeral, then Steinbruck. and we are continuing our progress on both banks of the Fecht river. The Germans have set fire to Metzeral. "The number of prisoners who have

fallen into our hands has reached 500, of whom ten are officers and 28 noacommissioned officers. To the war material already reported may be added three bomb throwers, three machine guns, some field telephones and apparatus for the emission of asphyxlating gases.

"An enemy aeroplane has been brought down by one of our machines in Alsace. The two German aviators were killed.'

DEFIANT NOTE FROM MEXICO.

Pressure or Threats From U. S. Would Be Resisted, Chazaro Says.

Washington.-The United States government was informed Friday in a note from Francisco Lagos Chazaro, president of the Villa-Zapata convention at Mexico City, that if President Wilson's recent statement warning Mexican factions to compose their differences should signify "pressure or threat," the conventionist govern- 300 marines previously arranged for ment "still harboring the conscience of its sacrifices, will maintain the dignity of the Mexican people."

The communication, transmitted by the Brazilian minister at Mexico City, states, however, that the convention continues "to conjecture that the general idea of the government of the United States is to help us in a friendly way to bring to an end our fratricidal struggle, which would be for the greatest good of the country."

DEMANDS SURRENDER OF CITY OF MEXICO

CARRANZA COMMANDER THUS REPLIES TO REQUEST FOR ARMISTICE.

GIVE IMMUNITY FOR SUPPORT

All Who Adhere to Cause of First Chief Will Not Be Molested. Gonzales Promises.

Mexico City.-General Pablo Gonzales has replied to the convention government's note asking for an arn. istice in order that terms for a reunion might be arranged, by demanding the unconditional surrender of the capital. The note of Gen. Gonzales promises immunity to all persons who adhere to the cause of Gen. Carranza.

Carranza Declines Overtures.

Washington.-General Carranza has declined for the present at least to accept overtures for peace in Mexico by the Villa-Zapata faction.

The latest was transmitted through the medium of the United States without comment. A few days ago the convention assembled in Mexico City over which Francisco Lagos Chazaro presided formally presented to the Brazilian minister as the representative of the American government for transmission to Gen. Carranza through diplomatic channels a proposal for a 30-day armistice, during which arrangements could be made for establishing a provisional government. It was suggested that both sides should maintain a military status quo and that the armistice be extended from time to time while the parleys continued. The plan included the holding of a popular election to be supervised by the factions in control of various sections of the country.

The greater part of the troops and crew is said to have been drowned. Mudros is a port on the island of Lemnos, off the entrance of the Dardanelles.

> British Steamship Sunk by Submarine London. - The British steamer Strathnairn was torpedoed off the Scilly islands and sank. Twenty-two members of the crew, including the captain, were drowned. The crew was composed of nine Englishmen and 24 Chinamen, and of these only one Englishman and ten of the Chinamen were saved. The torpedo struck the steamer amidships and blew up one of her boilers. The Straithnairn, which was a vessel of 4,336 tons, was bound from Cardiff for Archangel.



In Germany they already have such organizations. They are generally called the "landwirthschaftsrath" or agricultural council. Some students of the problem of rural organization are strongly of the opinion that such an agricultural council is necessary before much can be done for the bettering of rural credit or the marketing of farm produce. There is no object, for example, in having more capital in a farming neighborhood unless the farmers know without any guess-work just how to use that capital so as to increase the production and the profit of their farms. If all the leading farmers of a neighborhood would lay their heads together and talk over the situation and study the opportunities for new investment, they would be less likely to make mistakes than if they work secretly, as separate individuals.

The latter item should be lifted of the backs of the farmer of this nation and this can be done by Congress directing its appropriations to ports that are free where vessels can tie up to a wharf and discharge her cargo free of any fee or charge.

A free port is progress. It takes out the unnecessary link in the chain of transactions in commerce which has for centuries laid a heavy hand upon commerce. MOST ABLE MEN NOT LARGE

World's Geniuses as a Rule Have Been Only Medium or Even Less in Size.

We are inclined to look up to the physically big man, not only literally but there is always a certain presumption in his favor that he must be correspondingly strong mentally, says a writer in Popular Mechanics. People make room for him; they attach more importance usually to what he says than to the same words uttered by an undersized man. We unconsciously picture in our minds the bayonet charge and storming of the trenches as the work of large men. The boy dreams of having a football physique and little sister worships her big brother.

Other abilities being equal, the large man has a positive advantage over the small man. And yet many, if not the majority of the great men of the world have been only of medium build and not a few were even undersized.

A certain large city in this country had for years made it a rule not to employ in its fire department any but large men. The result was a small army of athletes which never failed to cause a positive thrill whenever they went on parade. They distinctly represented the day of physi-

For some years past the inventive mind has been busy, and very successfully, to produce apparatus which never tires, and calculated to transfer to a great extent the hard work from muscle to machine. The evidences of this evolution may be seen in even small towns everywhere, and now the fire engine drawn by volunteers and worked with hand brakes must be looked for in museums of strange mechanics of the past.
