



GROWING WATER LILIES

Fortunate are those having a satural pond or site where one may be easily constructed. Yet a miniaure pond in the garden is within the ety of cabbage. reach of anyone.

In selecting a site, choose one, if day glare, yet having the full benefit of the morning sun.

This should be prepared the fall before in order to be fully decomposed. Lilies open in the morning and close at least partially during the middle of the day, hence the more they are protected from the intense heat the more lasting will be the blossoms.

The soil should be very rich and alled in to a depth of two-thirds. An Ideal soil is made by composting barnyard manure with rich sods of a loamy nature, using in the proportion of one and two-thirds, respectively.

Sprinkle a little sand over the top and fill the tank with water. With a sunny exposure during a part of the day, the plants will grow and bloom

DRAINAGE FOR A FARM

Important Factors to Be Considered in Deciding on Plan.

Tile Drains Usually Give Thorough Drainage and Do Not Interfere With Farming Operations-Depth and Distance to Lay.

In planning a system of drainage for the farm it is necessary to determine first whether open ditches or covered tile drains are to be constructed. Open ditches are generally used when large quantities of surface water are to be removed or where land and labor are cheap. The disadvantages of open ditches include the large amount of land they occupy, their interference with farming operations, and the high cost of keeping the ditches clean and the banks free from weeds. The drains usually give more thorough drainage. They occupy no land surface and do not interfere with farming operations. If properly constructed they are practically permanent and require almost no expenditure for maintenance


The farmer must decide the amount of money he can invest for drainage. Usually it will be best to start with that part of the farm where the profits from drainage will be greatest and to extend the system as more funds are available. This plan of doing a part at a time has the advantage of per mitting the farmer to observe the re sults obtained and in the following work to make any improvements that may be found expedient in the plan. System of Dreinage With Double-Drained Area-Cost of This Is Less Than Shown in Fig. 3.




System of Drainage With a Minimum Area of Double-Drained Land.

LIME IS NEEDED BY GARDEN

Should be Hauled During Winter, Spread Over Plewed Land in

Spring and Harrowed In. Most gardens need lime. A dressing of 1,000 pounds of ground limestone or 20 bushels of burned lime, after it is air-slacked, will be the right quantity for one acre. The lime should be hauled during the winter and spread over the plowed ground in the spring and well harrowed in, says a writer in Baltimore American.

Crimson clover, or rye plowed down when half grown and the soil given a dressing of lime well harrowed in, will rot up the green crop plowed under, sweeten the soil and take the place of stable manure. This system will kill cut and wire worms and cleanse the ground. Macaroni With Kidney Beans .- One cupful macaroni, one pint kidney beans, one-half pint tomato sauce, one teaspoonful salt, one quart water, two tablespoonfuls flour, two tablespoonfuls butter, three-quarters cupful hot milk, one-quarter cupful tomato

Break the macaroni in small pieces and cook in boiling salted water until soft. Drain, pour a cupful of cold water through it. In preparing the tomato sauce, heat the milk to the scalding point and stir into it the creamed butter and flour. Cook five minutes. add the heated strained tomatoes drained macaroni and the cooked beans, with more salt if needed. Heat thoroughly, pour into a vegetable dish and serve. AT THE ENGLISH HOME OF THE WASHINGTON FAMILY



where the farmhouses are quaint. and antiquated, stands Sulgrave Manor, the one-time English home of the Washington family. The manor never really saw George Washington or his father, even his grandfather, but the Washington family possessed and ccupied it during most of the It is still possible to dis-

inguish over the main entrance building the heraldic device of stars stripes which Washington accepted as his coat of arms, and which is commonly regarded as the origin of the American flag.

In the summer of 1911 the suggestion was made by a prominent member of the British Peace committee that the historical property should be purchased and dedicated as a memorial to the peaceful relations existing between the two countries during the past century, the dedication to be one of the features of the international celebrations in 1914. This idea immediately met with popular The British committee acquired the property, and dedicated it to peace between England and the United States.

Charming Old Place.

The manor is a charming piece of old architecture, gray with the rains, frost and sunshine of 300 years. The house stands at the eastern extremity of the village of Sulgrave, in Northamptonshire, and it is approached from the west by a pretty green croft, separated from the almost encircling road by a hedge.

To the right of the gable end of the manor is a low stone wall with a larch gate, facing a small court, partly paved and partly in grass. From the courtyard the house is entered by a handsome old stone doorway, above which a little attic projects from a tiled roof. The fine old Tudor doorway is surmounted by a shield containing the Washington coat of arms, which three centuries have somewhat robbed of its original sharpness, but which is still unmistakable.

What a fortune had that shield of a private English gentleman-to become the most notable blazon of all the world! Strange to think that this little obscure stone coat of arms in a secluded Northamptonshire village should be the original of so much-should still be extant. As strange to think of the contrast between the torpid and monotonous rustic life surrounding it for so many generations with the rush and roar of existence in our great republic.

There is very little doubt that the three stars and the three stripes furnished the idea for the American flag. In the flag, as in the original, the stars signify divine influence guiding the bearer in the right way, while the bars denote one who sets the bar of conscience and religion against Rheumatism is "pain only." The old building is in an excellent state of preservation. The main hall has a fine fireplace and an oak beam ceiling. The ancient oak staircase has very beguiling twisted banisters and a fascinating secret cupboard at the intermediate The drawing room is on the second floor, as was the custom in the days when it was built, and in one of the bedrooms it is said that Queen Elizabeth once slept. The estate surrounding Sulgrave manor con-

sists of about two hundred acres of gently rolling land, substantially all of it in full view of the manor. The ownership carries with it the lordship of the manor, "with the Rights, Royalities, Privileges and Appurtenances thereto belonging,' and is subject to "a fee farm rent of 11s 5d (\$2.84) per annum.

Sulgrave Manor is the place in England most closely associated with the name of Washington, and yet it is true that George Washington him self attached little importance to this fact. In the early days of the American republic, ancestry was despised much more than is now the case. In 1788 George Washington refused to accept the dedication of a book on heraldry because a portion of the community were:

"Clamorously endeavoring to propogate an idea that those whom they wished invidiously to designate by the name 'well-born' were meditating in the first instance to distinguish themselves from their compatriots and to wrest the dearest privileges from the bulk of the people."

But the ability to trace one's ancestors has a greater value in this country today than it had in the days of the first president. Washington knew very little about his own forefathers. When he was asked about them by the Garter King-of-Arms, he said the first of his family in Virginia had come from one of the northern counties in England, possibly Yorkshire or Lancashire, or even farther north. Later there was considerable disputation about the root of the family tree from which he was descended, and it was finally agreed by genealogists that the Washingtons of Sulgrave and Brighton did actually spring from the Washingtons in Warton, Lancashire, a place on the Westmoreland border.

Several generations of Washingtons of Warton are recorded, and one of these was the father of Laurence Washington, mayor of Northampton in 1532 and 1545. He seems to have taken up his residence at Sulgrave, though members of his family continued to remain at Warton for several generations. This Laurence Washington had for mother the daughter of Robert Kytson of Hengrave in Suffolk. This proved a matter of very considerable importance in their history, because it brought them into connection with the Spencers of Althrop and Wormleighton, through the marriage of Sir Thomas Kytson's daughter. Catherine, to Sir John Spencer of Wormleighton, whose grandson, Sir Robert Spencer, was created Baron Spencer of Wormleighton in 1603.

In the process of time the Washingtons of Sulgrave appear to have got into financial difficulties. Laurence Washington entered the wool trade, perhaps induced to do so by the fact that Lord Spencer was one of the great flock-masters of his day. This Laurence acquired considerable riches in the wool trade. In 1539 he became possessed of the Manor of Sulgrave for the sum of three hundred and twenty-one pounds, fourteen shillings, and subsequently he purchased additional

Sundial With Washington Arms.

He had many sons, of whom the oldest was Robert, the ancestor of George Washington. He succeeded his father in 1585, when he was of the age of forty, but he does not seem to have been so prosperous as his father. Yet it appears that he was able to send both his sons, Christopher and William, to Oriel college, Oxford, where they were in 1588, the year of the great armada. Robert's oldest was named Laurence, probably after the mayor of Northampton, and in 1610 Robert, in agreement with his son, agreed to sell Sulgrave to their cousin, Laurence Makeneace, The second Laurence Washington then removed to Brington, near Northampton, his father perkaps going with him, though the latter was buried in the family vault at Sulgrave. Laurence Washington had seventeen children, two of whom rose ington of Packington in 1622 and Sir John Washington of Thrapston in 1623. The old church of

It was in this house that Robert Washington died in 1622, and in the yard, engraved upon a sundial, is found the Washington coat of

In the Church of All Saints, near at hand, where Robert Washington is buried, an inscripton reads

"Here lies interred ye bodies of Elizab Washington, widowe, who changed this life for immortalitie ve 19th day of March, 1622. As also ye body of Robert Washington, Gent., her late hushand second sonne of Robert Washington of Solgrave in ye County of North, Esgr., who depted this life ye 10th of March, 1622, after they lived lovingly together.' Laurence Washington, grandson of the Lau-

rence of Sulgrave, died in 1616, and is also buried

Unfortunately little of the village of Sulgrave as it was in the days of the Washingtons now remains. A disastrous fire in 1675 swept the village, and only a relic may be seen here and there in an ancient house. Most of the streets are set with neat brick houses. Coming toward the Church of All Saints, one might fancy oneself in the business center of some minor New England city, but with rather less of glare and noise, and the community held in a certain abeyance by the presence of the old church.

In dedicating the manor as a memorial to the peaceful relations existing between the two great English-speaking nations during a century, the British committee has created a permanent memorial of permanent interest.

First to Die for Liberty

It would be difficult to say who was the first man killed in the Revolutionary war. The spirit of revolt prevailed and some collisions between the people and British soldiers occurred before the war actually began. The battle of Concord oc curred more than a year before the Declaration of Independence, but there was bloodshed before the battle of Concord. One of the earliest of these collisions was the so-called Boston massacre, March 5, 1770, in which British soldiers fired upon citizens, killing three and wounding eight. The first to fall in this affray was Crispus Attucks, a mulatto. The first man killed in the battle of Con cord, April 19, 1775, was Capt. Isaac Davis of the Massachusetts "minute men." In the battle of Concord the Americans lost 93 killed, wounded and missing, but no complete list of names was pre

HOW ONE CLEVER HOUSEKEEPER UTILIZED CAKE.

Prevented Waste and at the Same Time Furnished Most Delicious Preparations for the Delectation of the Family.

For the holidays I had made a largesized fruit cake and some small fancy cakes of various kinds. In addition to this supply a friend sent in a huge fig layer cake, so it was inevitable there should be a surplus in the tin box.

My economical spirit rebelled at the idea of wasting good cake, so I donned my thinking cap, and the result was several desserts much enjoyed by the family, writes Jeannette Ross in the The remains of the layer cake re-

quired my first attention as it had be-

come quite dry. I softened it with a

little warm milk, just enough to moisten it somewhat; then I poured over grapes and lemon juice, combined with the cake an ice-cold custard made of the yolks of two eggs, one cupful of milk, two large tablespoonfuls of sugar and half a tablespoonful of cornstarch rubbed smooth with a little milk. Judging from the family's clamorous demands for a second helping of this dessert, it met with their approval. I hardly knew how to make use of the small cakes I had left, but a few days later I solved the problem. poured warm milk over them, as I had the layer cake-then put one cake on the bottom of each plate, with three or four upright around it; on the center cake I put half a preserved peach, and covered the whole with sirup from the jar of peaches, then added a meringue, made from one egg and powdered sugar. Mock Cherry Pie. One cupful cranberries seeded (cut across as you would an orange and shake in a colander, seed will fall out) and washed, one cupful sugar, one-half cupful raisins seeded and chopped fine, one heaping tablespoonful flour; mix well, then add one and one-quarter cupfuls boiling water and two teaspoonfuls vanilla: let stand on back of range (not allowed to cook) until you line two pie tins with a light, flaky crust; divide equally fruit and liquid into two pies; bake as mince or berry pies.

Rice Fritters.

Materials-One cupful cold boiled rice, three tablespoonfuls flour, one teaspoonful baking powder, one tablespoonful sugar, one egg, one tablespoonful butter, milk to form a batter. Directions-Place the rice in a bowl, add to it the baking powder and sugar, mix to a light batter with the egg. beaten white and yolk together, the milk and the melted butter. Cook as ordinary fritters on a hot lightly greased griddle, Serve with honey or maple sugar.

Escalloped Carrots.

Prepare three cupfuls of dried carrots, butter a baking dish, place a layer of carrots in the bottom, sprinkle thickly with ground wheat bread crumbs which have been mixed with melted sausage fat and then add a layer of canned tomato pulp, which has been seasoned; continue until the dish is filled, finishing with the crumbs; bake for an hour in a slow

Fruit Toast.

This is good when at pour wits' ends to know what to serve Sunday night. I have my coals good and red in my stove. You can toast these cold days on your furnace if you have one, by using a long wire fork. After bread is brown, butter well and place on any crushed fruit you prefer. I often use apples or oranges.-Boston Globe.


