ONCE AGAIN, our nation has been reminded about the price our national leaders must pay in order that we remain a free country, which allows for the rights of the individual.

Unfortunately for President Reagan, this freedom of movement, access, etc., also allowed one John W. Hinkley the freedom to make an attempted assassination.

We wish it were possible for our nation to rid itself of the disease of terrorism, including assassination attempts on our national leaders.

One asks, "Shouldn't the president wear a bullet-proof vest at all times?" But this would not protect him from the would-be assassins, who would find a way to achieve their end.

One partial solution might be to make a public example of the individual convicted of an assassination, or even an attempt—someone suggested a public hanging or a guillotine, with national television bringing all the gory details to the rest of the country.

But the "poor wretch" was probably psychologically unfit, and was not responsible for his actions, the legalistic community might argue.

Perhaps so, but it just might make some other misfit of society think twice (with whatever quantity of brain cells they have working) before committing a similar crime. If they were aware that "Hey, they might do the same thing to me, if I shoot the president," we might have fewer people taking pot-shots at our leaders.

Of course, shooting the president isn't a new sickness. It goes back to at least 1865, so before you condemn our country for falling into the pit when it comes to moral character, you need to realize that this sort of thing has been going on for at least 125 years, and probably will be a threat as long as there is a single human being who resists authority.

THE POOR TV reporters had a time of it on Monday, trying to get the news out concerning the shooting of President Reagan, and get their facts right, at the same time.

It's the first time we've ever known of ABC's Frank Reynolds "losing his cool," and he did it twice in one afternoon. "For God's sake—let's get it right," Frank finally admonished his staff, after realizing that the network's reporting of press secretary Jim Baker's death was in error.

And as for NBC reporter Chris Wallace, we hope he never applies to us for a news job, because we have a piece of video tape he might find embarrassing.

On one remote report, Wallace told those watching NBC's coverage of the presidential shooting that (1) the president was undergoing open heart surgery, (he did not) and that (2) the bullet missed Reagan's heart by only an inch (it actually missed by several inches), and (3) Reagan was receiving several transfusions, due to having internal bleeding (which he did not).

Wallace admitted during his report that his sources were not official spokesmen; yet the possibilities that he had brought up were very disturbing, when Americans were grasping for information concerning the event.

CBS' Dan Rather was handed a note concerning the possible open-heart surgery, but he refused to read it on the air, realizing that it was unfounded.

We gained a new respect for Rather, the new CBS anchorman. He learned his lesson well under Walter Cronkite. Don't know where Chris Wallace studied his journalism, but we'll take his reports with a grain of salt after this.

## Farmers Are To Receive Yield Notices

Notice of 1981 grain and cotton program yields were mailed to farm operators on March 26, 1981. Farmers are reminded that the final date for proving feed grain or wheat yields is 15 days after the date of mailing shown on the yield notice. This would be April 10.

The base years for proving 1981 yields are 1978, 1979 and 1980. Acceptable production evidence must be furnished for each farm in which the operator had an interest in all years. Also, a timely acreage report must have been filed for the commodity for each of the base years.

Production evidence must show the commodity, buyer, or storer, year of production and farm on which produced. Producers are always encouraged to report production for each of their farms each year.

A farm's 1981 actual yield will be considered zero if the crop acreage is not reported by the final certification date or production data is not timely furnished.

Producers must report small grain acreages by May 15, 1981 to be eligible for disaster protection and deficiency payments. Wheat and barley are covered by disaster protection, and the first requirement to insure this protection is to file an accurate and timely acreage report.

Wheat and barley that fail because of disaster must be reported and it must be appraised by ASCS personnel before it is destroyed or put to any other use. For wheat or barley to be eligible for low yield payment, it should not have been grazed after about May 15. This is generally thought to be a reasonable "take-off" date. That is, if a normal wheat or barley crop is to be expected.

May 31, 1981 is the final date to place 1980 crop corn, grain sorghum or cotton under CCC loan.

For further farm program(s) information, the public is invited to contact their local ASCS office.

## Commissioners Have Routine Business

Mostly routine business was conducted at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court on Monday, March 23.

Money matters took up the first portion of the meeting. The court voted to invest \$820,500 from the Permanent School Fund in certificates of deposit for a two-year period. Also, \$100,000 in general fund money was invested in a certificate of deposit for 90 days, and \$25,000 from the general fund was invested for a 60-day period.

Boarding bills on four Parmer County children were approved.

Names of three people were approved to be added to the county's Child Welfare Board. They are Don Spring and Mrs. Tom Caldwell of Bovina, and Mrs. John Blackwell of Friona.

Approval was granted for installation of a new two-way radio in Highway Department maintenance foreman Weldon Moody's car. The radio was bought to provide contact between Parmer and Bailey counties.

A doctor bill was approved for payment for an indigent child who had been taken to the hospital in Friona by a Texas Department of Human Resources case worker.

The court approved the quarterly payments on the county's quarterly share of the budget for the County Tax Appraisal office. Motion was passed to make the payment, in the amount of \$1,874.14.

Payment of annual dues to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, in the amount of \$420.36 was approved.

The contract between the county and Friona State Bank as the county depository had been approved by the state comptroller's office, so the bid was officially accepted on motion by Archie Tarter, for a period of two years.

County Agent Seth Ralston reported on a meeting in Bovina on March 24 for formation of a rifle club.

Payments were approved for seven Soil Conservation Service projects as follows: Joe Douglas, \$70; James Haseloff, \$70; Bill Martin, \$35; Richard Haseloff, \$122.50; Ed Nichols, \$87.50; Henry Bass, \$105; Jerry Engelking, \$35.

Since the Commissioners Court is to appear in District Court on April 13, which is a regular meeting day, it was agreed to hold the first April meeting of the court on Friday, April 10, instead of Monday, the 13th.

A hearing was conducted for use of the county's revenue sharing funds and as no one appeared to speak on the subject, a motion was passed to split the funds equally for use in maintaining the county's roads.

A special meeting of the court was called for March 30, so that a transfer of funds from the Right-of-Way fund to the Farm-to-Market fund could be made on the necessary date.

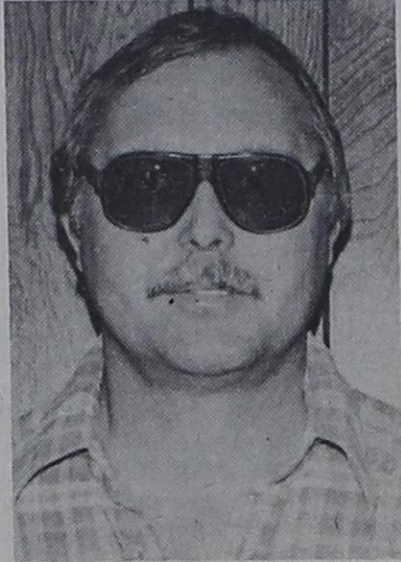

He and his wife, Carol, have three

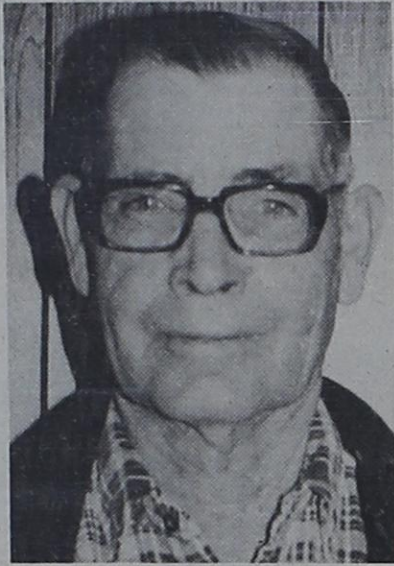
## Dudley Hughes

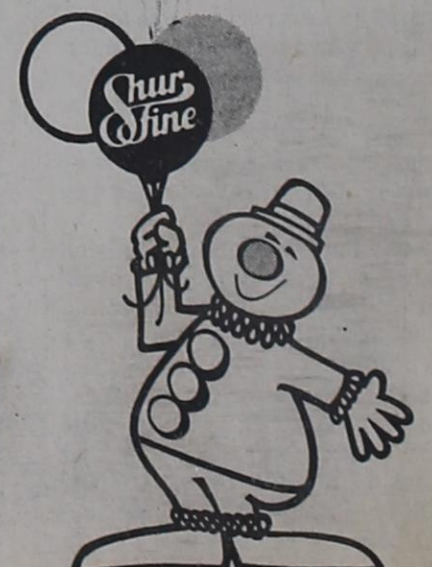

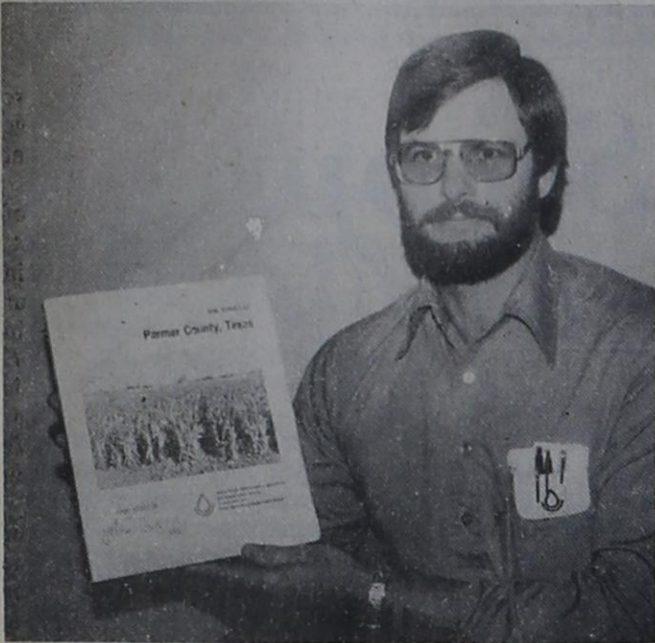

**Free Soil Survey Book Is Available**

A book has been compiled which should be a great aid to farmers planning to purchase, or rent a piece of property, with which they are not familiar.

"The Soil Survey of Parmer County" will give farmers all the information they need, in regard to virtually every farm in the county.

"Anyone who makes management decisions connected with the soil should have a copy of this book," says John Copeland, District Conservativist for the Soil Conservation Service.

It is stated that farmers, ranchers, sportsmen, community planners, builders, teachers, and newcomers to Parmer County all can find helpful and interesting information in the soil survey.

The survey contains aerial photographs of the entire county, distinguishing the different types of soils. Also included is a description of these soils. Information on use and management of soils, formation and classification, and general nature of the county, is included.

The book is free for the asking, and is available at the Soil Conservation District Office in Friona.

Other publications of vital interest to farmers are also available from the Soil Conservation Service, Copeland pointed out. "We have a small supply of pamphlets on pump plant efficiency, on how to calculate the cost of pumping water with natural gas," the conservativist said.

Other pamphlets are available dealing with windbreaks, conservation tillage, and the Ogalalla Aquifer, all at no charge.

If you need conservation planning assistance, or would like to pick up a soil survey, contact the Soil Conservation Service at 1306 West Ninth Street in Friona, Phone 247-2220.

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## Fillies Capture Second In Meet

The Bovina Flying Fillies made an impressive showing last Saturday to capture second place behind Friona, but ahead of third place Muleshoe, and the Vega, Hart, and Lazbuddie track teams.

Paced by three first place finishes, three seconds, three thirds, two fourths, and one sixth, the Fillies managed to score a whopping 107 points.

Kathy Williams scored a double victory this week by winning the 800 meter dash in a time of 2:41.73 and the 1600 meter run in a time of 6:12.5. The other first place finish came in the last event of the day, the 1600 meter relay. Rande Cupit led off the relay and established a sizeable lead before handing off to Lynnette Bentley who ran a super leg before passing the baton off to Gail Turner. She in turn widened the margin between the other teams before making a final hand-off to Miss Williams who anchored in the winning time of 4:32.09.

The 800 meter relay team of Miss Cupit, Stacey Whitecotton, Fonda Griffin and Susan Fancher raced to a second place finish in 1:59.72, about a second behind the winning Friona relay team.

Miss Bentley placed second and third in her specialties, the triple jump and long jump. She jumped

32'5" in the triple jump and 14'11" in the long jump to capture a silver and bronze medal, respectively.

In the shot put, Connie Shelby heaved for a second place effort of 31 feet. Vicki Shepherd also competed in the shot for a fourth place toss of 28'3 1/2". In the other weight event, Rebecca Hodnett let her discus fly for a sixth place effort of 68'5".

The quarter mile duo of Miss Griffin and Miss Turner turned in some dazzling time for the windy conditions to finish third and fourth respectively in the times of 66.78 and 69.27.

Miss Fancher sprinted to a third place finish in a solid 100 meter field to capture the bronze medal in a time of 14.24.

The Fillies will be in Farwell, Saturday for the district meet. Preliminaries starting at 9 a.m. and finals at 1:30 p.m.

In the boys division of the meet, the Mustangs finished with 5 points, in an extremely tough field of area boy's teams.

Jon Riddle raced to a fourth place finish in the 400 meter dash in a time of 56.4.

Edward Chisom placed sixth in the shot put with an effort of 40'11 1/2".

The Mustangs will take part Saturday in the Springlake-Earth meet, preliminaries beginning at 9 a.m.

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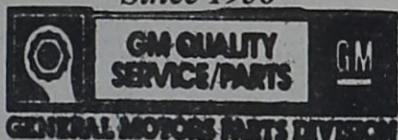

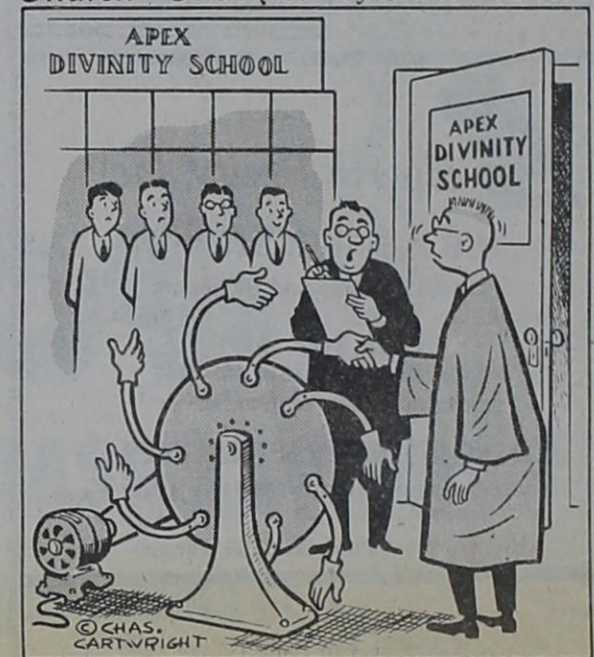

**FRUIT SURPRISE**  
2 pkg. strawberry gelatin  
2 cups hot water  
1 pkg. (large) frozen strawberries  
1 can (large) crushed pineapple  
3 bananas mashed  
1 carton sour cream  
1 cup chopped pecans

Dissolve gelatin in hot water, add frozen strawberries and stir until thawed. Add pineapple and bananas. Pour half the mixture into salad mold and congeal. Mix sour cream and nuts; spread over layer of congealed salad. Add remaining fruit mixture. Chill until firm.

**FESTIVE CAKE**  
1 cup shortening  
5 eggs  
1 cup self-rising flour  
2 cups sugar  
1 cup milk  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
Cream shortening, gradually add sugar, beating until light and fluffy and sugar is dissolved. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine

Combine sugar and milk, bring to a boil. Add coconut and marshmallows, boil over medium heat 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla.

**CHOCOLATE FROSTING**  
2 cups sugar  
¼ cup margarine  
1 cup evaporated milk  
2½ Tablespoons Cocoa  
Combine all ingredients; cook over medium heat to softball stage, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Beat until thick enough to spread. Use on outside of cake.

**PICKLED OKRA**

Wash okra and dry very good. Pack okra into jars with one button of garlic, 1 small hot pepper and 1 teaspoon dill seed. Small okra are best to use. Make a brine of 2 quarts of vinegar, 2 quarts of water and 1 cup of salt. Heat to boiling. Pour over okra in jars and seal. Let set for 6 weeks. Makes 14 pints.

"I feel it is everyone's duty to help in school affairs," Rhodes says.

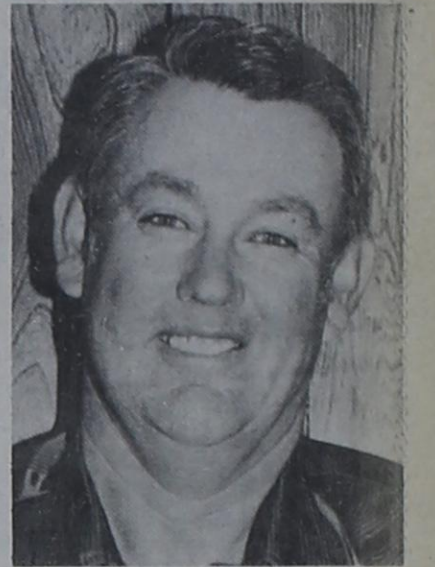
### Herb Howell

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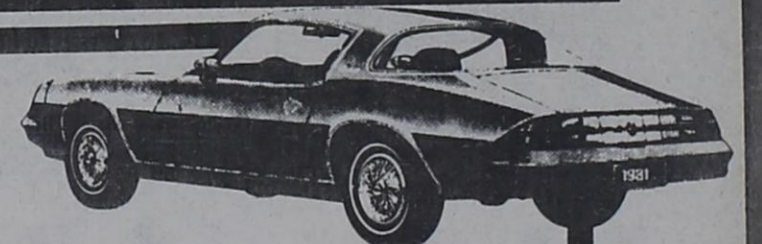


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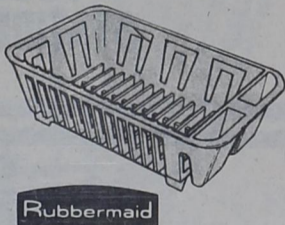
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
