RAILROAD PRESIDENTS

Summons Presidents of Roads Af fected by Threatened Tie-Up of White House.

Washington, D. C.-President Wilson Thursday laid his plan for avert ng the threatened railway strike before the employes' committee of 640, and having found the managers' committee adamantine to his propos al that they accept the eight-hour day, he appealed to the railroad presidents and asked them to come to the White House for a conference.

There is every indication that if the railroad presidents sustain their managers President Wilson will appeal finally to the financial powers which control the roads, for it is his purpose to deal with the ultimate authority before he gives up.

The conference between the railroad presidents and the managers' committee developed further indications that the managers were to be backed up by their chiefs in the attitude they had adopted toward the president's proposals. 'We have gone over the situation

thoroughly," said one of the presidents as he left the conference. and we agree thoroughly in every particular with what the committee has done.'

President Wilson's Plan. The president's plan, which is expected to be formally accepted by the employes' committee proposes:

An eight-hour day as the basis for computing wages. Regular pay at the eight-hour day

rate for overtime. To refer all other collateral issues to a small commission to be created by congress on which the employes, the railroads and the public would be represented.





Special metal holders are made for them, giving them a solid background, which prevents the spoon from being pushed through the paper.

The metal dispensing tube holds 150 of the cups, which are placed in the tube point upward. When needed, a metal holder is placed on the cups, top downward. By turning the cupholder to the right the metal tongue is made to clasp the creased paper, and cup and holder can then be removed together from the machine.-Illustrated

LIFE'S GOLDEN AGE WHY WOMEN

Years of Childhood and of Youth the Most Precious That Are Given to Mankind.

"Get thee a teacher" was a favorite maxim of an ancient Palestinia teacher. Rabbi Joshua, the son of Perachiah, a contemporary of the Roman Emperor Hadrian It is a splendid text for modern people, as it was for the ancients.

"Get thee a teacher." seer's advice to the young. The years of childhood and of youth are the years when knowledge finds a responsive soil. It then implants itself securely in the mind, safe against uprooting. The mind of a child has been compared by another ancient seer to paper that has never been written upon before and which therefore retains clearly whatever is inscribed thereon, whereas the mind of older people is likened to paper that has been written upon many times and therefore carries only blurred impressions. That is good psychology as well as good ethics. Let not the young be encouraged merely to nibble at knowledge and make it a side issue to amusement or idleness. Do not allow your sons and daughters to neglect their school tasks for trivial reasons. Youth is the golden age of learning-there is none like it.

Weakness of the Self-Made. "Get thee a teacher." This is the seer's advice likewise to the old. It should have particular weight with people who have had to go into the battle of life with an incomplete education. It is of supreme importance that their intellectual and spiritual culture shall keep pace with their increased economic resources. I have great admiration for the self-made man. He has had to overcome serious handicaps and has succeeded nevertheless, but the trouble with the self-made man often is, as it has been said, that he adores his maker. He sometimes trusts too much to his own powers and fails to give the proper espect to people whose refinement and sensitiveness and quick conscience have deterred them from allowing themselves to win success with the tools of brute force or refined cruelty, too often the instruments of the suc-

Others That May Heed. "Get thee a teacher" is advice that should be taken to heart likewise by older people who have had a good education in their youth but who are apt to discontinue their interest in knowledge owing to the press of business and the lure of the pleasure chase. With these and other distractions confronting the person of maturer years the tendency is strong to abandon learning and culture altogether. To prevent such a lapse into a life of fatted ease it is a wise precaution to have someone frequent the household who brings with him the message of learning and the atmosphere of cul-

"Get thee a teacher." Secure a master not only of knowledge but also of character. Put yourself under the influence of a high class personality. Choose for your guide one who can impart to you more than knowledge one who can elevate your soul as well as inform your mind. The best test of the worth of a teacher is that those who study under him are not satisfled to be merely his pupils, but long to become also his disciples. That teacher only is well equipped who can lead you to a fuller understanding of nature, a more intimate relationship with humankind and a closer communion with the Divine,-Rabbi Ephraim Frisch.


Two Cardinal Points Are Cleanliness and Complete Sterilization-Just How These May Be Most Easily Attained.

There seems to be a belief by the general public that there is something mysterious in the commercial cunning process. The great secret of this process is a careful observance of two things-cleanliness and complete sterilization.

Fruits and vegetables can be "put up" in glass jars or tin cans at home much cheaper than they can be purchased in the form of commercially canned goods, and the flavor, texture and general quality of the homemade product can be made superior to the product of the average factory, writes B. Shaw, recognized expert of South Carolina.

Minute forms of life which we call bacteria are present everywhere in untold numbers. The air we breathe, the water we drink, and the food we eat are teeming with them. These bacteria are practically the cause of the "spolling" or fermenting of the various fruits and vegetables.

The reproduction of bacteria, which is very rapid, is brought about by one of two processes. The bacterium either divides itself into two

parts, making two bacteria where one existed before, or else reproduces itself by means of spores.

Spores may be compared with the seed of an ordinary plant. These spores present the chief difficulty in canning the products of the orchard and garden.

All forms of bacteria are killed by complete sterilization. This is nothing more than enclosing the products to be sterilized in jars or cans that can be sealed air-tight, and submitting them to heat of sufficient degree, for a time long enough, to destroy the bacteria that cause the raw material to spoil.

Sterilization is readily accomplished by the use of boiling water, and there are three different ways in which this can be done. While the parent bacteria can be killed at the temperature of boiling water, their spores retain their vitality for a long time even at that temperature.

Smaller factories, and the different home canning outfits usually make use of the "open-kettle" process. Here the cans are submerged in boiling water and kept at that temperature for

The third process, known as fractional sterilization, is that of keeping cans or jars in boiling water for a specified time upon each of two or three consecutive days.

The process of boiling upon consecu tive days is the safest method, and is much to be preferred in home canning. The first day's boiling kills practically all the bacteria, but does not kill all all of the spores.

As soon as the jars or cans cool, these spores develop, and a new lot of bacteria begin their destructive work on the contents.

The second day's boiling kills this new lot of bacteria before they have had time to produce spores. Boiling the third day is not always
