

## Bike-a-Thon Is Benefit To Children

Estella Ortiz has called on all Bovina residents to join the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital Wheels For Life Bike-A-Thon slated for October 13 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the City Park.

Volunteer workers and riders are needed for this bike-a-thon to raise funds for the world famous research center in its battle against childhood cancer and other catastrophic childhood diseases.

"We're looking for riders and helpers to contribute their time and talent to help children live. We really need lots of riders, since they are the ones who can make this bike-a-thon successful," Ortiz said.

In the Wheels For Life Bike-A-Thon, riders ask sponsors to make a donation based on each mile completed. All riders turning in money will receive a certificate. Those who raise \$30 will get a certificate and a special St. Jude t-shirt. When \$75 is raised, the rider receives a tote bag as well as the certificate and t-shirt.

"The real prize, though, is the pride everyone can take in giving children a chance to live a normal life," Ortiz said.

## Guilty Verdict Is Given To Lumbrera

Diana Lumbrera, 32, was convicted Wednesday by a jury in Garden City, Kansas, for killing her four-year-old son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera, last May 1 at her home in Garden City, where she had lived since 1985.

The jury deliberated just three hours, twenty minutes beginning Tuesday afternoon and continuing Wednesday morning. The verdict was returned at 10:05 a.m. Wednesday.

Ms. Lumbrera wept silently, dabbing at her eyes with a tissue as Judge Stephen Nyswonger polled the 12 jurors for their verdict.

A dozen times the individual responses came back: The defendant was guilty of premeditated murder in the death of her son.

Ms. Lumbrera now faces a possible life sentence at a hearing on either November 16 or December 7. After sentencing, she will be returned to Texas to stand trial for allegedly killing three of her other children and the infant daughter of a cousin.

Ms. Lumbrera could face the death penalty in Texas if convicted of murdering her children to collect on their life insurance policies, said Johnny W. Actkinson, district attorney for Parmer and Bailey Counties.

Actkinson is the prosecutor in all four of the cases already filed, three in Parmer County and one in Bailey. But he said he is unsure whether he will try Ms. Lumbrera for all four deaths, or if he will try to prove a pattern among those killings.

Ms. Lumbrera's Kansas conviction could only be used in the penalty phase of the Texas trials, and not as evidence to gain a conviction, Actkinson said.

"I don't think it (the Kansas conviction) affects our case a great deal. It might have if she had been acquitted," he added.

In Texas, Mrs. Lumbrera is facing charges in connection with the deaths of three of her children, and the death of a cousin's child:

\*Joanna Garza Lumbrera, 3 months, who died Nov. 30, 1976, at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

\*Melissa Garza Lumbrera, 3, died Oct. 2, 1978, in Parmer County Community Hospital.

\*Melinda Ann Garza Lumbrera, 2, died Aug. 17, 1982, in the Lumbrera's Bovina home.

\*Ericka Aleman, 6 weeks, died Oct. 8, 1980, in West Plains Medical Center in Mulshoe.

Other deaths connected with Ms. Lumbrera currently under investigation include:

\*Joselionel Garza, 2½ months, who died Feb. 13, 1978 in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

\*Christopher Daniel Lumbrera, 5½ months, died March 28, 1984, in Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

Prosecutor Ricklin Pierce credited the testimony of Dr. Eva Vachal, pathologist at St. Catherine Hospital, where the boy died, as being the key to the conviction.

Vachal stuck to her autopsy findings that the boy was smothered despite testimony from Dr. William Eckert, expert in forensic pathology from Wichita, that the boy had died of viral infection. The state used two other pathologists to refute Dr. Eckert's testimony, stating there was no evidence in the boy's organs to suggest viral infection.

Members of Ms. Lumbrera's family who attended the trial in Garden City were upset at the verdict.

Defense Attorney Michael Quint plans to appeal.

## Defensive Effort Lauded By Stanley

A super defensive effort by the BHS Mustangs for three quarters went down the tubes when the offense could not click, and Plains' last-half flurry of points capped their 34-2 win here last Friday.

Bovina had held the lead at 2-0 for most of two quarters, after Hector Guevara blocked a Plains punt out of the end zone.

The fired-up Bovina defense held the potent Cowboys scoreless until the last four minutes of the half, when they finally got a TD for a 7-2 halftime lead.

"I was pleased with our effort. For the first three quarters we played as good on defense as a class A team can play. We're getting the basics down, and eventually it'll happen. We're encouraged that the players aren't giving up," said Mustang coach Rock Stanley.

Stanley said there were so many times that Bovina was just six or eight inches from making a big catch or breaking away for a touchdown, which might have turned the game around.

He credited the defensive play of ends Hector Guevara and Angel Porras. Guevara had 15 tackles and Porras 14, outstanding efforts.

Guevara, in addition to his blocked punt, also did a good job returning kickoffs for the Mustangs.

The final score definitely was not indicative of the way the Mustangs played. Stanley pointed out that Bovina defenders had seven or eight sacks on the Plains quarterback. "He won't forget Bovina for awhile," he said.

This week the Mustangs have an open date, and Stanley said the team could use it to get over some nagging injuries.

Following the open date the team gets into district play with a bang by visiting state-ranked Farwell.

"In spite of their ranking, I'm looking forward to playing them. It will be interesting to see how well we do against them," Stanley said.

The date for the spaghetti supper, sponsored by the Bovina Chamber of Commerce has been changed to October 21, instead of October 19.

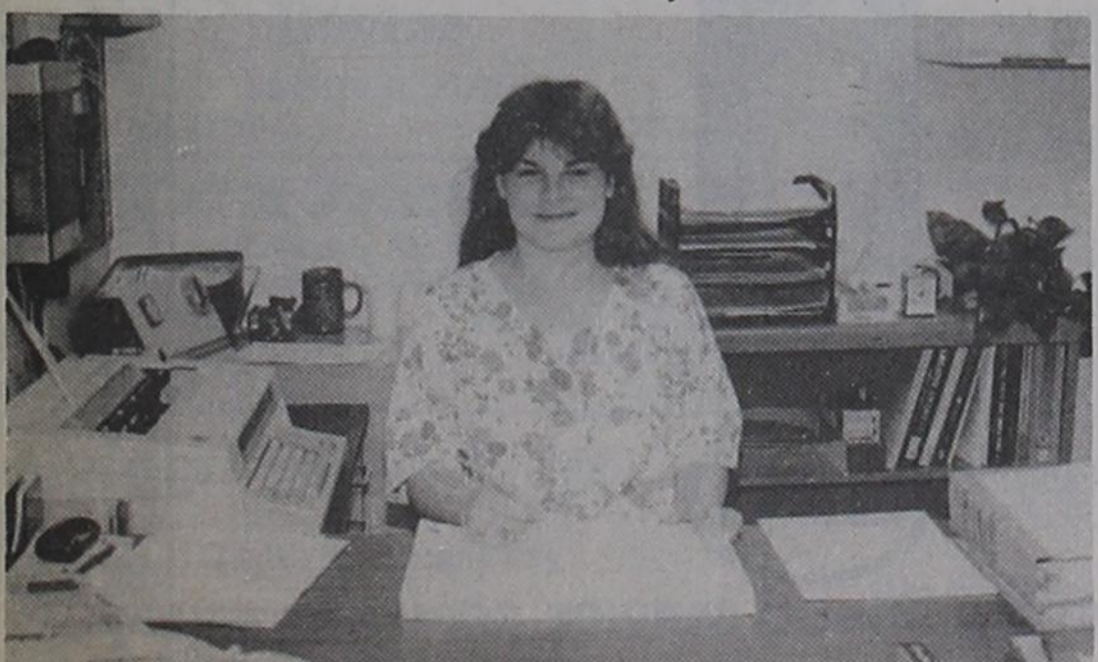
The meal of spaghetti, French bread, salad, cobbler, coffee and tea, will be served from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m.

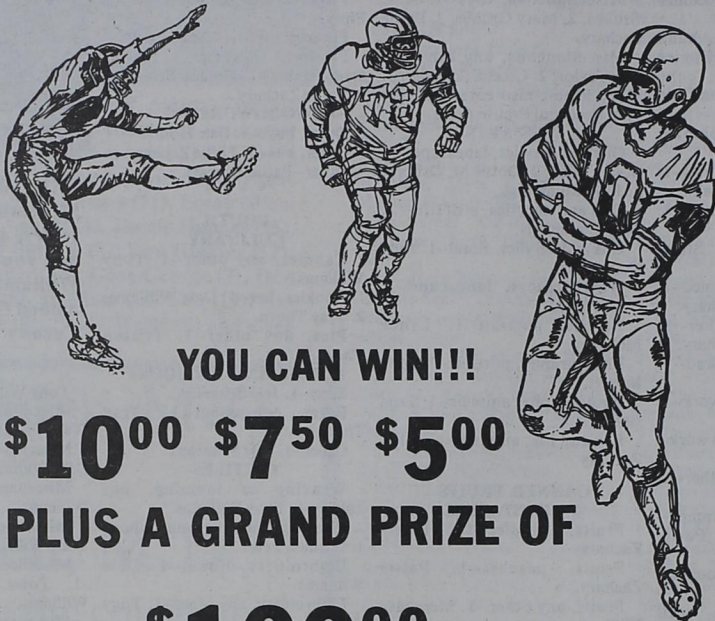
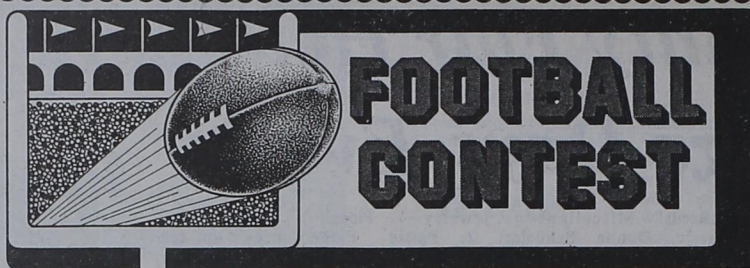
