

Philadelphia, Dec. 22.—Thirteen known dead, one policeman nine of his firemen were killed and twelve firemen, and more than fifty injured, of whom twen ty-fi^e are still are still in hospitals, is the records of last night's fire at the leather factory of Daniel Friendland in this city. The momentary loss will not exceed \$25,000.
