

Bovina ISD Announces Plans For Kids Meals During Summer

Bovina Independent School District will participate in a summer food service program through the Texas Department of Human Services in June and July.

The program will run concurrently with the summer school program from June 16, 1997 through July 15, 1997 (except July 3 and 4).

Meals will be served from 11:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. at the Bovina School Cafeteria at 500 Halsell

Street. The summer food service program provides free meals to all children age 18 and younger. Adults will be charged \$2.25. No proof of income, registration or meal tickets are required.

People who are eligible to participate in the program must not be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion or political beliefs. Anyone who believes that they have been

discriminated against should write immediately to: Director, Civil Rights Division, MC W-106, Texas Department of Human Services, P.O. Box 149030, Austin, Texas 78714-9030 or the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington D. C. 20250.

Note: Discrimination complaints based on religion or political beliefs must be referred only to the Director, Civil Rights Division, Texas Department of Human Services.

THIS HAS BEEN without a doubt one of the most unusual spring seasons we can recall for the western Texas Panhandle-High Plains, and Ye Editor has spent all but one of the last seasons in his home area. (You may fill in the blank if you wish, but no prize is being offered for being correct!)

In late winter, we had a warm spell. Most of the basketball season was played in spring-like weather. Then-just in time for the track, golf, tennis and other outdoor sports, the weather went to h_____ (There's another blank).

In fact, long about mid-April, when all the fruit trees were blooming, our area was hit with not only a freeze, but one that lasted for most of a 48-hour period. It was bad enough that wheat farmers are still anxious about what kind of effect it may have on their crop.

In late April, the heavens opened up and the area got the most general rainfall it had received in at least 18 months--maybe 18 years. Most areas received at least six inches of moisture. It was enough to do some good in the sub-soil moisture department, which you couldn't say about many "wet spells" in the last few years.

The worst part about the last month or so is that the temperatures have stayed somewhat below normal. The cold, wet spell may turn out to be hurtful to the area's corn and cotton, as it hinders their growth and development. The wet spell may have also delayed planting of these two crops. Farmers are used to having them up and going by this time.

Agricultural observers note, however, that the weeds always manage to take off, regardless of how wet or dry it is. Controlling the weeds may be a problem for farmers this growing season.

Naturally, we're not complaining about the moisture--at least not yet. Those who have lived in these parts for any length of time know that it won't be long until farmers and gardeners will be watching the sky in hopes of seeing a rain-cloud.

Until then, we may just have to "tie a knot and hang on!"

BEN EZZELL was a longtime newspaper publisher at Canadian, in the northern Panhandle. He was a good role-model of many of us "fledgling editors" who came along in the late '50s or early '60s.

Our late friend's daughter, Laurie Brown, is now involved with publishing the Canadian Record, and she also helps the Canadian High School newspaper get their paper together.

Lindsay Ricketts and Kathryn Knight were the writers. They also pondered: "When you choke a Smurf, what color does it turn?", "Why do kamikaze pilots wear helmets?...If you shoot a mime, should you use a silencer?" and "What's another word for thesaurus?"

The one we personally liked was: "Why do they sterilize the needles for lethal injection?"

I guess this just goes to show that even in high schools there are "slow news days." We're glad we saw Laurie's writing quoted. Her dad's verbal creations were watched by his local residents as well as state and federal elected officials.

THE HEARTS OF everyone in the community go out this week to the family of David Murphy. It's always tragic when a family loses a child, regardless of their age. And this particular family had suffered this type of tragedy on two other occasions.

When a loss of this nature strikes in a small community, it seems that it's double-tough, since everyone in a community Bovina's size identifies with everyone else.

We hope that Don, Juanda, Rodney, Darlene and Mattie Murphy know that their friends and neighbors are lifting them up in their prayers.

BHS Coaching Changes Set For 1997-98


During a brief visit last week, Athletic Director Bobby Ortiz announced that some coaching changes have occurred in the Bovina athletic department.



REC Objects To Utility Deregulation Proposal

Texas' electric cooperatives contend that a proposal to deregulate the electric utility industry by 2001 may not be in the best interest of electric cooperative consumers.

The co-ops are concerned that several key elements of the draft bill are not fully understood and they say that more time is needed to review them, according to Mike Williams, president of Texas Electric Cooperatives, the statewide association that represents the 75 distribution cooperatives and 11 generation and transmission cooperatives.

"Dramatic changes are being proposed that will impact how the electric industry in Texas operates. We believe that this proposal needs more time to be fully understood and to allow for thoughtful examination by legislators and the public to assure that these suggested changes are indeed in the public interest," said Williams.

"Unfortunately, this proposal does not necessarily assure lower electric rates or reliable service for our cooperative members."

Electric cooperatives serve approximately three million consumers in 244 of Texas' 254 counties, primarily in rural and suburban areas.

It is not clear that deregulation of other industries has benefitted rural Texans, Williams noted. "However, we continue to support any industry restructuring that benefits all customers of electric cooperatives in Texas."

None of those guys have made millions of dollars writing books about family values, and virtues, and squeaky clean living. Books that many people read and believed.


"Aww, Frank and Kathy Lee are so precious. Did you read their book? They must be so happy with one another."

TDH Issues Alert On Contact Lenses

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has cautioned people not to buy contact lenses from vendors who do not require a prescription. The warning follows a TDH investigation of vendors selling tinted, soft contact lenses at flea markets in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and in Amarillo.

Investigators say the vendors did not require a prescription, used unsanitary handling and storage practices and offered little or no instruction about the proper use and cleaning of the lenses.

Though the vendors were selling primarily non-powered, tinted lenses for cosmetic rather than corrective purposes, state and federal laws require a written prescription from a licensed practitioner before contact lenses of any kind can be sold to consumers.

Health officials say a prescription is needed for proper size and curvature of the contact lenses and indicates that the lenses are appropriate for the wearer.

In Texas, ophthalmologists and optometrists can prescribe and dispense contact lenses. Opticians can dispense them to consumers who have legitimate prescriptions.

Tom Brinck, chief of TDH's medical devices branch, said the same contact lenses were being tried on by many customers at the flea markets despite TDH's obvious concern about disease transmission.

He said permanent eye damage can occur from infections caused by these unsafe handling practices and by improper care and cleaning of the lenses. Cuts
