It simply means "You are looking well today and it is nice to see you."

Today's youngsters, as members of the "me first" generation, think manners are simply knowing which fork to use at a fancy dinner party, and since they'll probably never attend one of those anyway, then why bother to learn any manners at all. Actually, manners evolved down through the ages as a way for people to get along with one another and to remove destructive conflict in our every day associations with one another. Showing respect for other people goes a long way toward establishing one's own self-respect.


Last year, a public opinion survey was done on the subject of bad manners. 

Hospital Schedules Screening Clinic

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital will again conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland on November 16 from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Breast cancer affects one in nine women. The key to boosting your chances of winning the battle against cancer are early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a registered nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a

mammography technician. Our mammography machine is certified by the American College of Radiology ensuring a quality film.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier age.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. Ask about funding that is available for free breast screenings.

Co. ASCS Office Gives Deadlines

Crop Insurance Deadlines

The recently-enacted crop reform bill contains important deadlines for those farmers concerned with maintaining eligibility for USDA benefits such as farm program payments, according to Curt Miller of the Parmer County ASCS office.

The new law, signed by President Clinton on October 13, requires producers of insurable crops to take out at least the minimum, catastrophic level of insurance to remain eligible for USDA benefits. While producers of fall-seeded crops have until early next year to sign up for catastrophic coverage and remain eligible for benefits, those who wish "buy-up" coverage on their fall-seeded, insurable crops must do so by October 31. Producers are urged to check with their local private crop insurance agent to determine applicable crops and other options.

"Buy-up" coverage is available only through private crop insurance agents but farmers seeking only catastrophic coverage may sign up within the next few months at either their local ASCS office OR with private agents.

The new law -- the Federal Crop Insurance Reform Act of 1994 -- combines the crop insurance and disaster assistance programs into one program beginning with next year's crop. Its provisions virtually eliminate the possibility of future crop disaster assistance programs.

1994 Disaster Program

For 1994 weather-related disasters the current ASCS crop disaster assistance program will continue much like it has in recent years. The target date for farmers to begin applying at county ASCS offices for partial reimbursement on their 1994 weather-related crop losses is sometime around the first of January 1995.

The 1994 program is similar to those in recent years in which farmers with crop insurance who suffered crop losses greater than 35 percent of normal production (40 percent losses for those without crop insurance) would be eligible for partial reimbursement.

The County Office has no additional information on the forthcoming disaster program at this time. Further information will be released promptly as it becomes

available.

Loan Deficiency Payments

Loan deficiency payments become available anytime the (AWP) Adjusted World Price for cotton or the (PCP) Posted County Price for grains falls below the base loan rate. PCP's for all grains are announced on a daily basis and the AWP for cotton is announced at 3 p.m. each Thursday. As of 10/18/94 no crop has become eligible for payment in Parmer County.

Loan deficiency payments will be made to eligible producers who file a timely request when the AWP or PCP is below the county loan rate for the applicable crop. Producers must retain beneficial interest in the crop. If you crop is contracted the county office needs a copy in order to determine when beneficial interest is lost.

If you lose beneficial interest or are planning on selling the crop as it goes across the scale, a CCC-709 (Direct Loan Deficiency Payment Agreement) must be signed and approved prior to harvesting the crop in order to be eligible for an LDP. A CCC-709 makes the crop eligible for LDP at the rate (including zero) applicable at the time it goes across the scale or is ginned.

1993 Final Deficiency Payment For Corn & Sorghum

The 12-month national weighted average market price has been announced for 1993 corn and sorghum. The national weighted average market price for corn is \$2.50 and sorghum \$2.31. The NL (Not Subject To Limit) deficiency payment rate is zero because the average market price is more than the national loan rate before reduction. Those rates were \$1.99 for corn and \$1.89 for sorghum.

The Emergency Feed Program continues to be available in Parmer County.

SOUTHERN COCONUT CAKE
Dolores Ivy

Cake:
1 yellow cake mix
1/2 cup grated coconut
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
Prepare cake as directed on box, adding coconut and extract to batter. Bake in 2 or 3 layer cake pans, following baking directions on box. Filling between layers:
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
3 eggs, beaten
Juice of 1-1/2 lemons
Grated rind of 1 lemon
Mix all ingredients in double boiler and cook, stirring constantly until thick. Chill. Spread on each layer. Spread Seven Minute Frosting over entire cake.

SEVEN MINUTE FROSTING
2 egg whites, unbeaten
1-1/2 cups sugar
5 tablespoons water
1-1/2 teaspoon light corn syrup
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Combine first four ingredients in double boiler, beating until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water. Beat constantly and cook seven minutes or until frosting will stand in peaks. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Let frosting cool, frost cake.

STEAK MEAL IN ONE
Paula Harman
1 large round steak, 1/2" thick
Flour
Salt
Pepper
1/4 cup oil
2 or 3 medium potatoes
1 medium onion
1-16 ounce can cut green beans, undrained
1-16 ounce can whole kernel corn, drained
1-16 ounce can tomatoes, undrained
Trim fat from steak, cut into serving pieces. Salt and pepper steak, dredge in flour and brown quickly in oil. Slice potatoes and onion over steak, add salt and pepper to taste. Add green beans, corn and tomatoes. Bring to a boil; reduce to simmer. Cover with tight fitting lid and simmer for 30-45 minutes, until meat and potatoes are tender. American cheese
Small Fritos and tortilla chips
Mix El Monterey with 2-1/2 cups water. Heat until it thickens, then set aside. Brown beef and onion; drain. Add soup, chilies and 3/4 of the El Monterey sauce. Simmer 30 minutes. Line a 9"x13" pan with chips. Cover with meat mixture. Cover with grated cheese and remaining El Monterey sauce. Bake at 325 degrees until cheese melts. Makes 8-10 servings.

Jinx Snead
1 pound ground beef
1/2 cup chopped onion
3/4 cup milk
1-8 ounce package cream cheese, cubed
8 ounce noodles, cooked
1-1/2 cups whole kernel corn, drained




