IS BUZZARD A MENACE?

Accused of Spreading Hog Cholera and Anthrax.

For Nearly Three Centuries Work of Bird Has Been Appreciated at Its Full Value in South—Persecution Is Begun.

(By W. L. MATEE.) Turkey buzzards are familiar features of Southern landscapes. Their wonderful soaring flight has been a subject of study by a multitude of observers, and the buzzard is not only the model but also the inspiration of the American-invented airplane.

The turkey buzzard now is threatened with persecution in the land where heretofore it has received the most zealous protection, for the bird has been accused of spreading such diseases of live stock as hog cholera and anthrax.



Obviously, it is unfair to attempt to place the blame for general dissemination of stock diseases on the buzzard. Considering the multitude of ways in which these diseases may be spread, it cannot be doubted that stock diseases would be as widely distributed as now if turkey buzzards were eliminated, as has been proposed.

Attacks in the South by buzzards upon living farm animals indicate that there are too many buzzards there for the best economic interests.

FERTILITY SOLD FROM FARM

Too Common Practice of Producer to Calculate Value of His Crop on the Market Price.

(By C. A. WILLSON, Kentucky Experiment Station.) Nothing else has mitigated so much against the rational relation of live stock to average farm operations as the utter disregard of the fertility sold from the farm when corn and other crops are sold direct and not fed.

Realizing the rather unconscious effect which market values, as ordinarily interpreted, are having, and may have, upon live-stock interests, and hence upon the general agriculture of the state, the station has undertaken a series of experiments with the view of comparing market and farm values of various Tennessee crops.

WHITEWASH GOOD FOR FARM

Submitted by Expert of Okla. Station—Especially Useful on Walls and Fences. Following formula of a white-washing lime, skim milk and admitted by Dr. Charles K. chemist at the Oklahoma station at Stillwater:

One bushel of good quicklime more than 12 gallons of water of the lime and keep the vessel until steam ceases to rise, occasionally to prevent scorching, pour a second mixture containing one pound common salt and zinc sulphate in two gallons of water. Pour this into the lime and stir in two gallons milk. Stir vigorously.

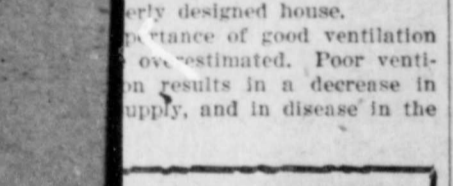

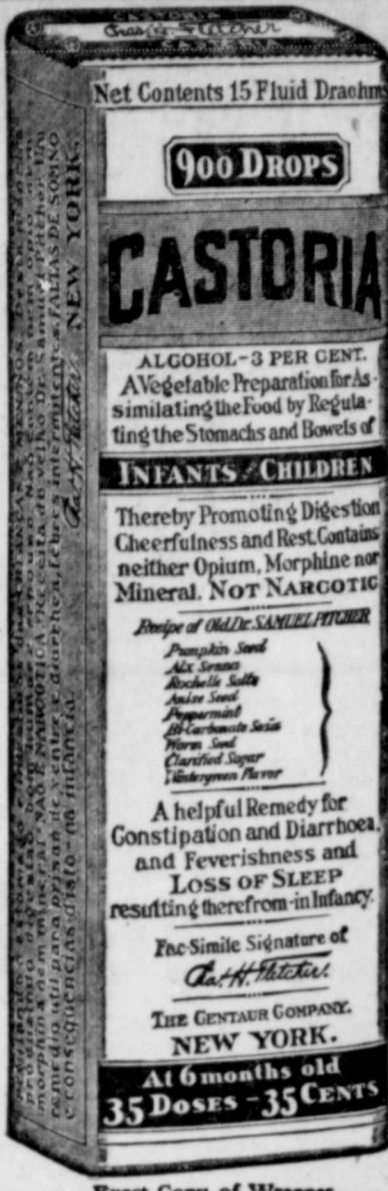
