The elevator is to be 15.000 bushel capacity, or fifteen cars, and will be cribbed and covered with corrugated iron, thus making a structure of the very best type for the business. Fairbanks Morse engines, automatic scales, a grain cleaner, and an automatic dump in the wagon driveway will be the up to date equipment. At an early date, warehouses near the elevator are to be built as a storage for the headed grain. The driveway will be on concrete flooring down the center under the building. Thus there will be no exposure to the grain, thereby and grade.

EUROPEAN CORN BORER IS BIG MENACE TO AMERICA'S LEADING CEREAL CROP

The farmer's life sometimes seems to be just one insect pest after another. Just about the time he has learned how to combat all the insect pests in the United States and leans back to take things easy for a spell somebody manages to import a few new varieties of crop trouble from for eign shores. This time it is the European corn borer that is going to cause the farmer to lose sleep.

The European corn borer probably is the most injurious insect pest that has yet been introduced into this country, according to entomologists of the United States department of agriculture in Farmer's Bulletin 1046. Un less immediate and effective measures are taken to exterminate this pest it seriously threatens the future of America's greatest cereal crop. Already it is known to exist in an area of 500 square miles in Massachusetts and 400 square miles in New York. Its rapid spread to the entire country is possible. It frequently destroys from onefourth to one-half of the corn crop in infested fields in Massachusetts.

## How Borer Injures Corn.

All parts of the corn plant, except the fibrous roots, are tunneled by the larvae or borers. Their most damaging work is done in the stalks and ears, which they partially or totally destroy. They usually enter the upper end of the stalk, near, he base of the tassel, and tunnel upwards for a short distance before tunneling down the stalk. The tassel is so weakened by this damage that it breaks over before maturing. Much pollen is thus lost, and grains fail to form normally on the ears. These broken tassels, with outpourings of sawdust-like material at the breaks, are sure signs that the European corn borer is getting in its deadly work.

Many times the borers enter near the junction of the leaf and stalk. Any small hole with sawdust-like material coming out of it indicates the presence of borers. Several borers frequently work in one stalk, reducing it to a mere shell. The nutriment to the developing ear is cut off by this injury. The stalk is weakened, and eventually breaks.

Some of the borers leave the stalk and enter the ears through the husk and also through the stem and cob. Here they feed upon the immature grain and tunnel the cob. The injury to the ears and stalks is further increased by a soft rot which often follows the work of the borers and reduces the interior of infested plants to a decaying, putrid mass with an obnoxious odor.

Two Generations Each Year. There are two generations of the European corn borer each year. They are continuously damaging the corn

in infested fields from before tasseling time until winter stops their activities. They remain as nearly fullgrown borers within their tunnels throughout the winter and resume feeding in the spring. The chief danger to the nation's

corn crop lies in the possibility of borer-infested plants being transported into sections where the borer does not already exist. To prevent this all plant quarantine laws must be strictly enforced with regard to plants likely to be infested.

Quarantine measures must be supplemented by careful clean-up operations in infested areas. Destroy all plant material likely to harbor borers. Burning Most Effective. In infested areas burning has proved in rush times.

the most effective means of destroying the borers. Burn all of the previous year's cornstalks, corn stubble, crop is just as bad as weeds. Keep the rempants, stalks of garden plants, plants thinned.

Under the most favorable circumstances the burning of infested plants will require considerable labor and expense, but it must be remembered that the insect seriously threatens the corn-growing industry of America, and that radical and effective measures must be adopted to control it.

CONTROL SHEEP-KILLING DOG

Secretary of Agriculture Asks Twenty Governors to Urge Laws Protecting Sheep.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The enactment of more adequate state laws to control sheep-killing dogs is urged by Secretary Houston in a letter just sent to the governors of 20 states. The secretary points out that, although there has been a gratifying increase in the number of sheep in the United States in the past year, there is room for further expansion of the industry. Farmers, he says, are discouraged in many instances from keeping sheep on account of the danger of damage by dogs. The letters were sent to the governors of Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maryland, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin, where state legislatures are now in session. Following is the letter:

"I understand that many states now have under consideration the matter of legislation to encourage the larger development of the sheep industry by removing or controlling the dog menace During the past year, as you perhaps know, there has been a gratifying increase in the number of sheep in the United States. There is undoubtedly room in many sections of the country for further expansion along this line, especially in the settled farming areas. The field representatives of this department, however, generally report that farmers are discouraged in many instances from keeping sheep on account of the danger of damage by

I am, therefore, taking the liberty to bring the matter to your attention, with the hope that you will look into the situation and make such recommendations as may seem wise to the legislature of the state. May I not, in this connection, call your attention to the carefully drawn and apparently well-enforced laws of several states, notably those of New York and Pennsylvania, which are set forth in the bulletin (Farmers' Bulletin 935) inclosed herewith."

## USE FEED TROUGHS FOR PIGS

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# SOME OBLIGATIONS PECUL-

It goes without argument that parenthood imposes obligations not shared by others, and the Holy Scriptures place special obligations on Christian parents. The religion of Christ has accomplished mighty little for those persons who "follow the multitude to do evil," live lives of selfishness and ease, and put forth no efforts to make the world better. The professions of all such are but 'a sounding brass, or a clanging cymbal" in the ears of those with whom they have to do. Certainly such is terribly true of all those Christian parents who fail to provide for the highest welfare of their own children; for Inspiration emphat ically says that "If any provide not for his own, and specially his own house, he has denied the faith, and is worse than an infi del." I Timothy 5:8. "IS WORSE THAN AN INFIDEL!" Mark the expression, and ponder well its meaning, for the God of all the earth said it!

In these strong and meaningful words are imposed upon Christian parents obligations which invite the curse of God unless they are faithfully and consistently performed. And these duties and obligations in clude much more than providing food and raiment for the physical needs. The most blatant intidel readily recognizes such needs, and willingly supplies them. Even the wild beasts seeks to proteet their young, and to supply their natural necessities. Certainly parents who have received divine cleansing, and who have been called with a holy calling, ere expected to do much more for their own offspring. The scripture quoted above certainly teaches as much, and human reason approves it well. 

Presumably almost everybody has heard of the Hope diamond and of the long history of mystery, misfortune, shattered hopes, blasted fortunes and violent deaths which is declared to center about the famous gem. Suffice it to say that the Hope diamond is a sapphire-blue stone of 441/4 ka; ats; that it made its appearance in France in 1668; that it is believed by the superstitious to have the "evil eye;" that its published history, which is probably largely imaginary, would seem to bear out its evil influence on the fortunes of its many

The "\$200,000,000 baby" was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Beal McLean. He was expected to inherit a vast fortune from his grandfathers, John R. McLean, the owner of several newspapers, and Thomas F. Walsh, a millionaire mine operator of Colorado. He slept in a gold cradle, the gift of King Leopold of Belgium, a partner with Walsh in the famous Camp Bird gold mine in the San Juan district of Colorado. go. He had a half dozen automobiles of his own. From the moment of his birth Vinson was famous as the most carefully guarded baby on earth. A small army of guards, detectives and attendants and a corps of doctors and nurses watched over him 24 hours in the day. When he was an infant he took his airings in a baby buggy which was a veritable steel cage locked by special padlocks.

This was one of the precautions against kidnapers. Then came a moment when the vigilance of his attendants was relaxed. Slipping away, the boy started across the street. A "flivver" bearing a West Virginia license and containing three women came along and ran him down in front of his home!

It was in 1668 that Jean Baptiste Tavernier, a French traveler, appeared in Paris with a diamond of marvelous size and coloring. Some said it had been stolen from its place among the ornaments of a Hindu idol. More insisted it had been taken from the palace of the Grand Moguls of Delhi. Wherever it came from, the story places it immediately afterward in the possession of Louis XIV, who placed it among the crown jewels of France and permitted it to be worn by Mme. de Montespan.

Thus the diamond is launched upon a career of 411 fortune and disaster and tragedy.

, It was not long, so runs the story, after Traver-'nier sold it to Louis XIV for 2,500,000 francs and a barony, that Travernier was torn to pieces by wild dogs while he was on a hunting expedition.

Mme. de Montespan's fall is part of history. She was supplanted soon by Mme. de Maintenon. At this time the diamond weighed 671/2 karats. The story says that in the rough it was of 112 karats, and that the king sent it to an Amsterdam jeweler to be cut and polished.

Along with other court jewels the diamond descended upon the death of Louis XIV to Louis XV. Tradition permits several of his favorites to have worn it, and so the lives of all of these are supposed to have ended in tragedy, failure or worse. Louis XVI came into possession of the stone in course of time, and through him it went to Marie Antoinette, who wore it, extending the same privilege to her friend, Princess de Lamballe. Genuine history records that Marie Antoinette died on the guillotine, and that the princess was torn to pieces by a French mob and her head carried about upon a pike.

The stone was lost sight of about 1792. Then, after a span of 38 years the stone reappeared in 1830. In the meantime the story writers again reduced its size to 44 karats. Wherever the gem was in those years of mystery, stories are numerous today that it still was performing its mission of blighting lives and fortunes.

One of these accounts attributes to Daniel Eliason, a jeweler of London, who got the stone in 1830, a story that after it was supposedly stolen from the royal treasures of France by a Paris mob the gem was sold to an Amsterdam Jeweler, William Fals, who recut the stone to its present dimensions. The story goes that Hendrik, a son of William Fals, stole the jewel from his parent, who died a ruined man. Then this record disposes of Hendrik by suicide, after which the stone got into possession of one Francis Beau-Heu, to whom the story ascribes a death by starvation. It was this man who sold the stone to Eliasea.

From Eliason it passed into the ownership of Henry T. Hope, a banker of London, and acquired the name under which it now is known. The price is stated to be \$65,000. It is not clear that Hope suffered aroutly through his possession

found that he suffered financial reverses and other personal misfortunes.

Hope is credited with having given the diamond to his daughter at the time she married the sixth duke of Newcastle in 1861. But apparently it was the fiction mongers and not she who bequeathed the gem to her son, Lord Francis Hope, that it might get sensationally into the life of May Yohe, the American actress.

This part of the story is mere fiction. It is true that May Yoke married Lord Francis Hope. It is true that she eloped with Capt. Putnam Bradlee Strong, son of a former mayor of New York. Lord Francis obtained a divorce, and the wife married Captain Strong, only to be divorced a second time.

But May Yohe, although she has been quoted as saying that she wore the Hope diamond only twice and that her troubles were due to its malign influence, probably never even saw the stone. Certainly Lord Francis never had possession of it. So, when the story goes on to say that he sold it for \$168,000 to Joseph Frankel, a New York jeweler, the statement is untrue.

It is true that Frankel had the gem in New York. Where and from whom Frankel acquired the stone never has been made clear, but the stone went back to Paris and into the possession of Jacques Colet, who bought it from Frankel. Colet has been reported as having killed himself after losing his mind.

Before that tragedy, however, the diamond is reputed to have passed into the ownership of Prince Ivan Kanitowski, and the legend promptly disposes of the prince at the hands of a mob of Russian revolutionists. Thence the story skips to the murder of lille. Ladue, to whom the Russian prince had loaned the diamond. A jealous admirer is charged with this murder.

Next in the legend of the jewel is listed Simon Moncharides, of whose identity there appears to be uncertainty. But the legend sends him riding close enough to a precipice to be thrown over and killed. Just before his death Moncharides is credited with having sold the diamond to Selim Habib, a Persian, who acted as agent for the Sultan Abdul Hamid.

One version of the next chapter is that Habib was drowned in a wreck and the diamond lost. The publication of this was later explained as a ruse to throw thieves off the trail. This version takes the stone to Constantinople, where it cuts a wide swath in violence, misfortune and death and finally brings about the end of Abdul Hamid.

Be all that as it may, it appears that instead of having drowned with the gem in the shipwreck, Habib got back to Paris with it. It was sold at auction for \$80,000 June 24, 1909.

The gem then passed into possession of P. C. Cartier, and the Cartier firm brought it to this country. In January, 1911, announcement was made that the stone had been sold to the McLean family and that the purchase price was \$180,000. Mrs. McLean wore the stone at least once in public, according to the newspapers.

An authoritative article by T. Edgar Willson in the Jewelers' Circular Weekly about the time of the McLean purchase states that the "evil eye" reputation of the Hope diamond dates from the blication of a sensational article in 1901, when

Frankel brought the stone to New York. Willson says the authentic story of the stone begins with 1830, when Eliason sold it to Hope. He traces it through the Hope heirs to its sale at auction to Frankel in London in 1901. Habib bought it in Paris and it was sold at auction in Paris when the Habib collection was disposed of in 1909. It is believed, though it has never been proved, that the present stone was cut from the 671/2-karat blue diamond that formed a part of the stolen French regalia. No mention of ill luck having befallen Eliason, Hope or the

Are the McLeans superstitious about the beautiful gem? Nobody seems to know definitely. But one of the stories about the stone since it has been in their possession seems to indicate that its evil reputation had its effect upon them.

Anyway, as the story goes, there was some hitch about the payment of the purchase price of the stone. It evidently was not because of lack of money. There was a law suit. In the course of the controversy stories were printed to show that Mr. McLean harbored a feeling of timidity because of the wil history attributed to the stone, and that he stipulated that the jewel should be taken back by the Cartier firm in the event that any tragedy occurred in the McLean family within six months. Whether that story is true is not clear, but eventually formal announcement was made by attorneys connected with the suit over the purchase price that a compromise had been effected.



MILK AND CREAM DEFINITION

Standards to Be Used for Enforcement of Food and Drugs Act Published in Circular.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Definitions and standards for milk and cream adopted by the joint committee on definitions and standards and approved by both the Association of American Dairy, Food and Drug Officials and the Association of Official Agricultural Chemists, to be used as a guide for the enforcement of the food and drugs act, have been published by the United States department of agriculture in a circular, "Food Inspec-

tion Decision 178." Milk is defined as the whole, fresh, clean, lacteal secretion obtained by the complete milking of one or more healthy cows, properly fed and kept, excluding that obtained within 15 days before and five after calving, or such longer period as may be necessary to render the milk practically colustrum

Pasturized milk is milk that has been subjected to a temperature not lower than 145 degrees Fahrenheit for not less than 30 minutes. Unless it is bottled hot, it is promptly cooled to 50 degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

Skimmed milk is milk from which substantially all of the milk fat has been removed. Buttermilk is the product that re-


mains when fat is removed from milk or cream, sweet or sour, in the proc-Cream, sweet cream, is that portion

of milk, rich in milk fat, which rises to the surface of milk on standing, or is separated from it by centrifugal force. It is fresh and clean It contains not less than 18 per cent of milk fat and not more than 2-10 per cent of acid-reacting substances calculated in terms of lactic acid.

Whipping cream is cream which contains not less than 30 per cent of milk fat.

Homogenized milk or homogenized cream is milk or cream that has been mechanically treated in such a manner as to alter its physical properties with particular reference to the condition and appearance of the fat globules.


The composition of the milk produced by different breeds of dairy cows varies so greatly, say the food officials, that it is not practicable to fix a standard which is applicable in all localities in the United States and its territories. It is therefore, left to the state and municipal authorities to adopt such standards as their local production conditions may warrant.


