The arrival Tuesday of two cars of coal, billed to the Cicero Smith Lumber Co., has relieved for a time a condition that was rapidly becoming serious. The local Coal Distribution Committee has charge of affairs and is issuing cards to those in need of fuel, in 500 pound lots. More coal will be needed at once unless the weather moderates.



CARE FOR VACCINATED HOGS

Lack of Proper Attention Has Result ed in Material Losses Which May Be Avoided.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
Improper care of hogs following their immunization against hog cholern, administered in public stock yards and after arrival at their destination, has resulted in losses which may be materially decreased. The following instructions for the prevention of losses are valuable:

"Shipments should be made promptly after immunization, or should be lelayed for not less than ten days. Truck hauls and shipments not exceeding 36 hours in length can be made promptly to advantage.

"Avoid crowding; allow stocker bogs relatively more floor space than fat

"It is important that drinking water be constantly accessible to the hogs, except in severe winter weather. If the car does not contain special water devices, a water trough, protected by slats over its top, should be securely fastened to the floor.

"Little or no feed is necessary dur ing the 24 hours following inoculation but clean water should be accessible. Short-haul shipments need not be fed in transit.

"When hogs arrive at their destina tion they should not be driven over the roads, but hauled from the car to the form in wagons or trucks. Lond and unload gently. Avoid chasing and In summer, unload where there is natural woodland shade or shelter pens; in winter, where there are suit-

"Protection against rain should be provided.

"Do not permit wallows in pasture

"For the first two weeks, if it is in season, allow shipped hogs limited

Permanent reduction in losses from cholera, says the United States department of agriculture, can be expected only when farmers organize in a determined effort consisting principally of self-imposed quarantine, the continnous employment of sanitary measures and the early use of the serum treatnent should the herd become infected or dangerously exposed.






Grooming Increases Cow Comfort and Makes for Clean Milk.

grooming cows is a fundamental safemard against inferior, germ-laden milk. Where cows are groomed daily during their period of close confinement an attendant requires only about two or three minutes a cow to prepare and gloss up the animals as though for a banquet. On the other hand, it is difficult and time-consuming to clean off cows which have been kept without grooming in a dirty stable. The commendable practice is to

groom and clean the cows daily at such a time between the milking periods that there will be abundant opportunity for the dust put into circulation to settle so that it will not contaminate the milk as it is 'rawn from the cows. It is necessary for best results to wipe off the udder and flanks of each cow with a moist. dean cloth just before milking, in or der to remove all the surface dus: and dirt which has escaped the previous clean-up processes. It is recommended that dairymen exercise special care to provide plenty of material so that at all times they may use clean cloths in preparing the cows for milking, as too commonly the wiping cioth, unless carefully handled, becomes a source of contamination. 


