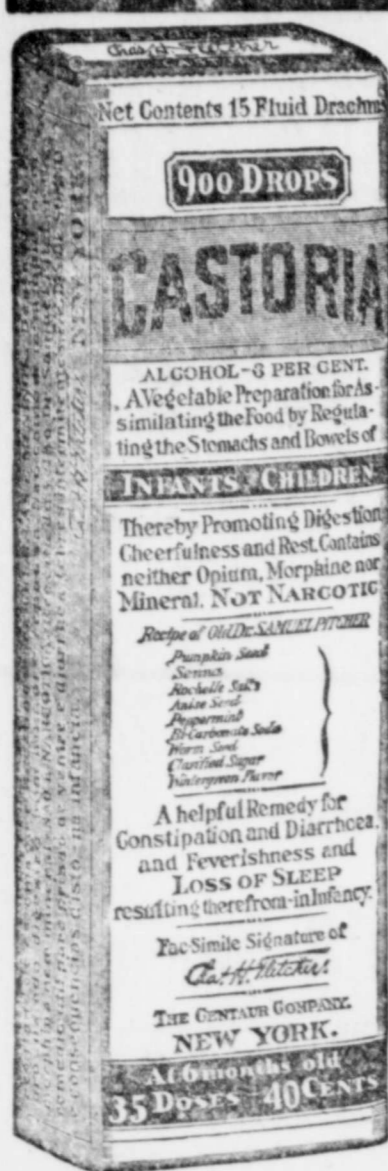

CADIZ has made up its mind to be equal to the opportunities with which the after-war world abounds. We shall hear of Cadiz in many ways, says The Christian Science Monitor. It has taken note of the new determination of the northern ports such as Vigo, Bilbao, and some others, and of Oporto of the Portuguese, to make a big forward movement, and Spain generally being in an advantageous position in the matter of maritime commerce, it conceives a more brilliant future opening out for it in the new world conditions than ever it had dreamed of. Vigo, with the connivance of the Americans, it is understood, is about to make a strong bid for the carrying trade with North America, and as the main port of entry into Europe from the upper half of the American continent.

But Cadiz has had an advantage in the past with regard to the South, and hopes not only to maintain it, but to strengthen it. She has been, in effect, a great receiving and distributing center, dealing with the South American states, and spreading the goods she received over Portugal and all Spain. She has flourished, and she has done well by herself in every way. But with Cadiz as with practically every other place in Spain, there has in modern times been a decline and a recovery. It is believed now that the recovery will be great.

**The New Movements.**

Cadiz starts the new period with a fine new equipment in the matter of her harbor. The new Reina Victoria quay will astonish the commercial men and travelers who go there after a long absence. The San Felipe breakwater has been extended, and there have been dredging and widening operations, so that capacity and accommodation are now much greater than they used to be. Big liners may now berth themselves well, and as soon as they are hitched up they will find the newest electric traveling cranes and all the most up-to-date port appliances in operation.

So Cadiz bids the traders come, and with Vigo, Seville, Bilbao and Barcelona it helps Spain to make a new challenge to the world in maritime matters, and this she most certainly does. No country has such a fine seaboard and one so advantageously situated. The Spaniards have thought of the maritime possibilities of their country before now, but they are thinking of it intensely in the new condition of the world economies. Already far more ships are calling at Cadiz than before the peace—through these mere callers do not amount to much. In the old prewar days the Hamburg-American line established a regular monthly service from there to Pernambuco, Bahia, Rio de Janeiro and Santos; one or two French passenger lines were making regular use of the port, and the English boats did so regularly. The war interfered naturally with most of these services, but now they are being resumed.

**Should Be Approached From Sea.**

In these present days and times are everything and anything. It is all a matter of perspective. She perfect about her a hustling, vernal smart some one other for

particular cities in a certain way and the poorest way of all to approach almost any city is by train. Never go to Cadiz by rail. Better far, if you are in mid-Spain and must use the roads or the tedious ferrocarril, go to Seville or over to Tangier in Africa and make one of those little voyages that are regularly available, in order to come upon Cadiz by way of the sea. It is generally acknowledged that there is no other sea approach in the world that is so beautiful as this.

Cadiz at such times and in such circumstances is a glorious picture in white and blue. She rises up from the sea on a small platform of limestone rock which only a very narrow isthmus holds to the mainland. In a majestic silver beauty the houses with their azoteas, or flat roofs, seem to rise like a fairy city above the deep blue of the sea, their miradores or view towers surmounting them. All are heavily coated with whitewash, frequently renewed.

**Always White and Clean.**

Thus the city is always white, quite smokeless, and is kept spotlessly clean. It glistens in the sun against the blue Andalusian sky, with waters lapping it nearly all around. The poets and the descriptive writers have almost exhausted themselves in their use of fine adjectives to describe its beauty and yet they feel they have failed. Spaniards call it their "tazita de plata," or silver dish; some of them say it is more like a "palacio de plata" beautifully chased, and from another aspect they liken it to a great alabaster ship floating out upon the waters. No terms are too strong in which to speak of Cadiz thus seen from the sea, for she is indeed very beautiful, veritably "a white pearl set in a crown of sapphires and emeralds."

The interior of no city could completely match such an outside view, but yet Cadiz, within, is good and pleasant also, and is always extremely clean. But it is a very practical place, and though it has its cathedral with a spire rising over all, it has little in the way of art—one of the oldest cities of Spain though it be—to attract the visitors who need it for their lingering at any place. It is a place to wonder at, to tarry at for but a little while, and then to leave, knowing it full well to be unforgettable. But in the new days of traveling that are beginning, no person who wanders toward the south of Spain should, through neglect, miss seeing Cadiz from the water. It will live in his memory when he has forgotten many pictures. It will hold its place in his esteem even when he comes face to face with the incomparable Bay of Naples.

**Few Saw Historic Act.**

When the great seal of the French republic was affixed to the peace treaty, thereby validating the signatures of President Poincaré and M. Louis Naul, minister of justice and keeper of the great seal, only a few privileged high officials attended. The seal, somewhat larger in size than a silver dollar, shows on one side the seated figure of the republic with the inscription, "French Republic; Democratic, One and Indivisible." On the other side are the words, "In the Name of the French Republic" surrounded by a wreath of oak leaves encircled by the republican device, "Liberty, Equality, Fraternity." The seal is imprinted by means of a handworked stamping machine, resembling a letter copying press.

**Booming Japanese Commerce.**  
Among recent instances of government help to Japanese commerce is the sending at Singapore and Harbin commercial museums as headquarters of Japanese trade. The museum at Singapore will aid in the trade in the South China Sea. The museum at Harbin will serve Mar

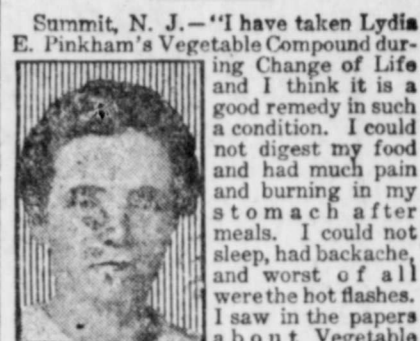

The many friends of the family were deeply grieved last Friday to learn that Charles L. Williams had died early that morning at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Williams.

His death was caused by meningitis following an attack of influenza, his illness covering a period of about ten days.

Funeral services were held in the Presbyterian church at 11 o'clock Saturday morning, conducted by Elder W. W. Brewer of Clarendon, and attended by a large crowd of sorrowing relatives and friends. Interment in Rowe cemetery.

Charles L. Williams was born in Missouri February 16, 1886. He joined his father's family in Hedley in June, 1918, the others having moved to this place some years earlier. He was unmarried. Eighteen months ago he united with the Church of Christ and lived a consecrated, Christian life. He loved home, and was absolutely clean in his habits; never used tobacco, never swore, never spoke ill of any person. These traits are the more remarkable when we consider that much of his life was spent in public works, in various places and among all classes of people. Quiet and unassuming in manner, he was ever attentive to duty, and always about him were these evidences of true manhood which drew friendship and held it.

Surviving him are his parents, three brothers and three sisters, all of whom were present at the funeral except one sister in South Texas and one brother in California who were unable to get here. To the bereaved ones The Informer and all Hedley citizens extend sincere sympathy.

## ROBERT PHELAN

Last Friday night at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Phelan, three miles west of town, the spirit of Robert Phelan took its flight to a better world, after long and patiently endured suffering.

About three years ago Robert underwent an operation for appendicitis, and his decline dates from that event, for although the operation in itself was successful, an abscess developed on his lungs, and it was this that, in spite of his valiant fight, put an end to his earthly career.

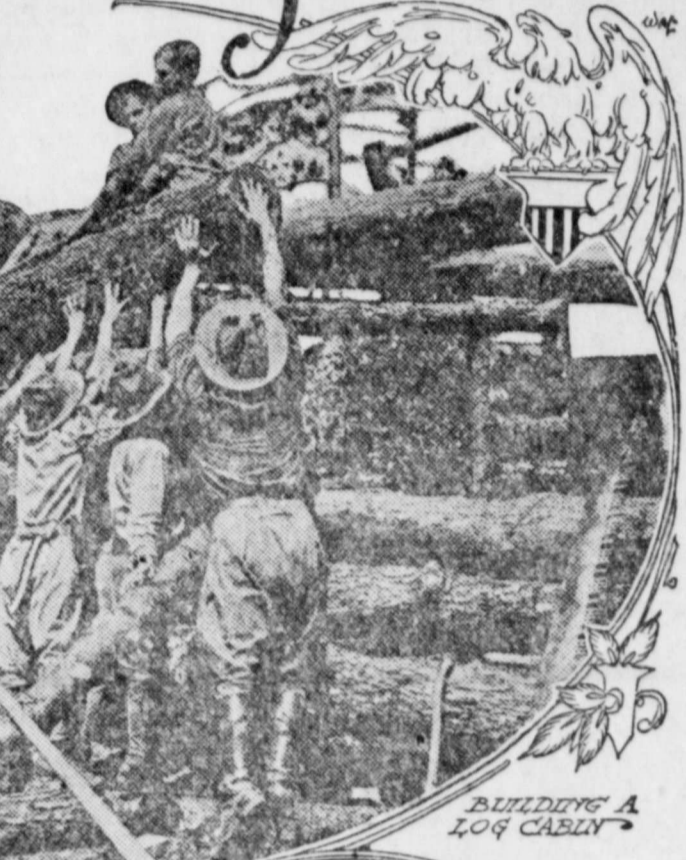
# Trail of the Boy Scout In Deeds

A fitting celebration of their tenth anniversary, 365,470 members of the Boy Scouts of America are urging every citizen and every child in the United States to adopt for one week the boy scout practice of doing a good turn daily for some person or some cause.

What is a good turn? It is an act of unselfish service done with no thought of praise or reward, simply and sincerely rendered for sheer good will's sake. A scout is helpful.

Nearly every individual, institution and organization in this country has become accustomed by this time to seeing khaki-clad boys scouts bustling about, lending a hand here and there and everywhere, wherever and whenever there is something to be done. The latter day version of the adage: "If you want a thing well done, you must do it yourself" seems to be "If you want a thing done well, get the boy scouts to do it."

What scouts have done towards winning the world war and their usefulness generally in times of peace is now fully realized by the American people. No agency called into service by the government in the war's emergency responded with more enthusiasm or with greater efficiency than did the army of almost half a million boys who constitute the Boy Scouts of America.

In the five Liberty loan campaigns, boy scouts, acting always as gleaners after the reapers and working as solicitors only in the last few days of each drive, secured 2,328,308 separate subscriptions amounting to \$352,122,975. Reducing this total to an average for each scout, it means a sale of \$880 worth of bonds a boy.

The treasury department has recognized this service by awarding to scouts 66,914 war service emblems and 28,497 bronze bars, making a total of 95,411 awards to scouts for distinguished service in Liberty loan work.

Soliciting Liberty loan subscriptions was a patriotic service done at definite, stated times. But throughout the war—and they are still hard at it—these boys sold 2,189,417 War Savings stamps to the total amount of \$43,022,044. For exceptional work in the sale of stamps the treasury department has given 23,111 achievement buttons, each button representing sales made in 25 different homes, and 13,231 ace medals for sales totaling \$250.

But it is only a small part of scout war service that can be measured in terms of money. In the soliciting of funds for Liberty loans scouts were only used as "Moppers Up," and while their usefulness and achievements in this respect are things of which scouts are proud, they are proudest of their other work that was more individually, characteristically, scout "Good Turn" service.

There is much that is included in the term scout service, but an analysis of individual good turns as applied to the community or nation reduces it simply to the job to be done next. As a rule there were so many jobs that there was no next—they all had to be done at once, and what is more—they were. In connection with Uncle Sam's loans there was a great deal of publicity for the scouts to spread broadcast. Between local headquarters, scout messengers strengthened the lines of communication; scout messengers helped out the banks and made lighter the work of city and federal officials. Those posters in the windshield of practically every automobile in the land were put there by scouts.

At the war rallies, and in the community work, they were everywhere.

over their city brothers of being able to raise pigs and chickens.

The boys whose gardens supplied more than enough for their own families marketed the rest; those boys who had no gardens of their own gave of their time to farmers and helped them harvest and market their crops.

Then comes the immense help that was given to the Red Cross, particularly in membership drives, and to the library association in collecting books by the carloads to be sent to men overseas. Millions of feet of standing black walnut were located by scouts, and hundreds of carloads of peach pits were collected.

Scout war-service is by means over, and upon armistice day in 1918, the slogan "The war is over, but our work is not" was adopted as the peace cry of scouts, and right now the war risk insurance and treasury departments are asking scouts' help in placing posters and getting citations from employers who are taking back all their former employees who enlisted in the army or navy.

Each separate service was in its own time the most important and boy scouts have achieved a record for a very large share in winning the war. Besides definite war service, scouts were always prepared to jump into every local emergency, and kept up their civic good turns, their individual good turns, and as time permitted their regular scout program.

Helping the police direct street traffic and manage unruly crowds, distributing anti-tuberculosis literature or Red Cross posters, directing strangers, helping somebody fix a tire, restoring somebody's doorbell, finding lost children, dragging small boys out of the water, collecting your old newspapers, helping timid old ladies across the street, removing unsightly signs, building bird houses, planting trees, raising community flags—there is no end to the things scouts find to do with their time and energy and vigorous good will.

The good turn the scout does is done quietly and without ostentation; it is not a matter to be boasted of. You never hear scout boasting of the good turns he does. By that principle will he differ from some men when later he comes into the larger activities of manhood. Lincoln used to say that a certain public individual reminded him of the Mississippi river steambot that had a 6-foot boiler and a 10-foot whistle, and every time they blew the whistle they had to stop the boat.

A boy scout is expected to do at least one good turn daily.

The good turns reported for one scout for the year, the record probably having been kept by some kindly, watchful aunt, said that he got 174 buckets of coal and 129 buckets of water, carried out the ashes 124 times and the dishwasher 125 times, and did other miscellaneous good turns amounting to 1,694 distinct efforts of cheerfulness during the year.

He brought in corn cobs for the fire, went after the washing, fixing up the mail, cleaned up the waste paper, picked up a limb from the sidewalk, cut some tall for a kid's kite, went to town for another many times, picked up glass from the sidewalk, replaced a brick in the pavement, stopped a dog fight, loaned his knife, wound the clock and set the alarm innumerable times, fixed the fire and made his bed, telephoned messages, changed a five-dollar bill, fed the dog and cleaned up some ink, baked the pancakes for breakfast, fried some bacon, put on the coffee, washed the potatoes and fixed the fire, fed the chickens, also flowers, taught a younger boy his letters, picked up needles and pins from the lamp and darned his own sweater, carried some water, and swept off the back of the letters and put up curtains, fixed the door, got the fruit cans for his mother, set a mousetrap, turned the gas off many times and hung pictures, and by his oath to be "helpful at all times." Little by little, the good turns ingrained in his daily life, the occasional gratified moment of his character, the conscientious acknowledgment that these things and things of that power

**DAIRY THE DAIRY**

**BREED HEIFERS FOR JUNIORS**

Animals Are Relatively Easy to Handle and Young Owner Gains Experience in Handling.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Many junior dairy clubs favor the maintenance of bred heifers by their members, because these animals are relatively easy to handle while their young owner gains experience in feeding and caring for the young females before they calve. Subsequently he learns how to handle the calf, which constantly is increasing in value. Where mature cows are distributed among the junior dairy club members more risk is involved, as many of the youngsters are not experienced sufficiently to handle them properly.

The advantage of distributing calves among the next generation of stock breeders, according to specialists, is the low initial cost of the animal and

the fact that its keeping involves less expense and care on the part of the attendant. On the other hand, it requires three years to complete the project. This may be considered undesirable, as interest of the club members will likely become lessened. In both the case of the bred heifer and the calf it is difficult to select the best animals which will prove to be profitable producers, while in the case of the cow, she demonstrates her worth if proper records of production and expenses are kept. The junior dairy club work develops potential breeders who will mature from raisers of a single heifer or calf into full-grown owners of extensive and quality herds.

**LIBERAL FEEDING FOR COWS**

Animals Starting Into Winter in Thin Condition Need Extra Care to Nourish Calves.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Breeding cows that started into the winter in thin condition need extra care and liberal feeding at this time if they are to nourish their calves properly and maintain their own bodies satisfactorily. It is a mistaken idea of economy to starve through the winter a cow that is to drop a calf in the spring. Such practice not only reduces the vitality of the cow but dwarfs the growth of her offspring, because she is not able to nourish it properly.

The cow should be provided with a liberal amount of silage, or legume hay if no silage is available. A protein supplement in the form of velvet beans or cottonseed meal should be provided in addition to two or three pounds of grain. Corn stover or straw may also be used if available at this time of year.

**ASSETS IN MILK PRODUCTION**

Large Flow of Blood Indicates Digestive Organs and Heart Are Functioning Properly.

It is a well established fact that milk is produced from the elements carried to the udder by the blood. It seems reasonable, therefore, that the quantity of milk produced depends largely on the amount of blood which circulates through the udder. It is also self evident that a large flow of blood indicates that the digestive organs are functioning properly, and that the heart is strong. Both of these are very important assets in milk production, and in transmitting vigor to the offspring of the cow.

**DAIRY NOTES**

Fill the churn only half full and you will have better churning results.

Thoroughly cleanse and sterilize the cooler, cans, pails, strainers and other milk utensils.

The cow barn is a dirty place in the winter months unless the proper methods of handling are exercised.

The cow-testing association is apt to start many a bonder cow on a sight-seeing excursion with the return ticket lost.

Good, clean corn stover is especially good and should be fed at the rate of three pounds to 100 pounds live weight.

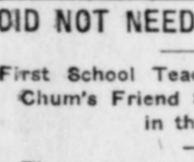
