LAUGHS AT GREENLAND COLD

In His Primitive Abode, Eskimo Dwells in Comfort Through the Monotonous Arctic Winter.

The Eskimo of Greenland, no matter what his station in life may be, always has both a summer and winter home. DAIRY FACTS

RAISE MORE PUREBRED COWS

Increase of 249 Per Cent in Bull Association Herds Shown by Records for 1919.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Purebred cows in bull association herds have increased 249 per cent since 1918, according to the bull association directory recently compiled by the United States department of agriculture. The records for 1918 show that the number of cows owned by members of bull associations was 10,248, of which 597, or 5.5 per cent, were purebreds; while the records for 1919 show the total number of cows was 18,244, of which 2,086, or 11.43 per cent, were purebreds.

Comparing only those associations which reported in both 1918 and 1919, it is found that in 1918 there were 450 purebreds, and in 1919, 1,601 purebreds, or an increase of 118 per cent. That the bull association is proving a great help to the small breeder is evidenced by the fact that the number of associations has increased from

44 in 1918 to 78 in 1919. The bull association guarantees the farmer the continued use of a good purebred bull at a cost that is within his reach, and the farmer has not been slow to realize its value. If the present rate of improvement is maintained it is certain that the future will show a steady replacement of the grades by purebreds, and that this will take place both by natural increase and by purchase until the members of bull associations will have practically all purebred cows in their herds. Without a bull association few of these smaller breeders would have found it possible to get into the raising of purebreds.

PROFITABLE FEED FOR COWS

"June Pasture" Suggests Ideal Condition for Production of Milk and Butterfat.

The profitable feeding of dairy cows consists of supplying them with plenty of well-balanced, palatable feed, in surroundings which afford them health and comfort. Nature gives the dairyman a model in feeds in the month of June and this is recognized to such an extent that the very words, "June pasture," suggests the ideal condition for producing milk and butterfat of the highest quality and in greatest abundance. The dairyman should, therefore, endeavor to extend all these ideal conditions throughout as much of the year as possible, and will succeed just as far as he recognizes and applies the factors which go to make up the ideal conditions.

RECORDS OF BIG ADVANTAGE

Tell Dairyman Whether He Is Running Behind With Cows and Where Profit Is Being Lost.

Nine times out of ten the man who is sure he is running behind in dairying does not know whether he is or not—no accounts, no careful reckoning up of the cost of production. What shall the man who is in that fix do? Sell out? Not a bit of it! Turn over a new leaf. Keep account of everything that enters into the cost of production. Improve methods of marketing, and see if you are not really making good on the dairy end of your farming operations. The chances are you will think more of the cows, and if you do you will take better care of them and they will do better for you.

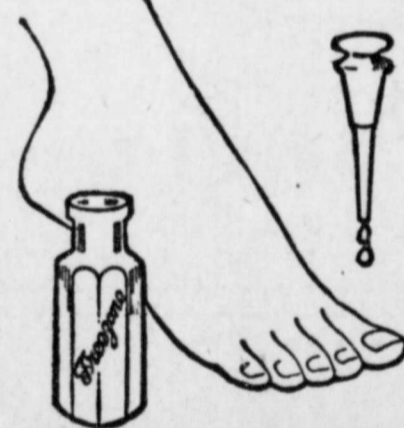

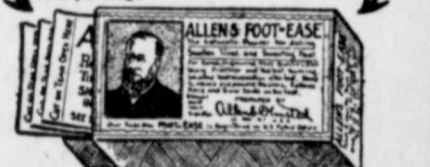

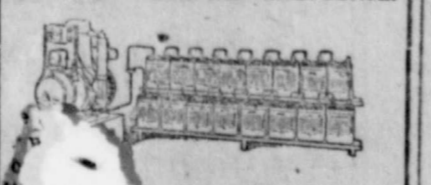

PUBLIC HIGHWAYS

TRUCKS AIDING ROAD PLANS

Long Island Cited as Example of Prosperity Maintained by Efficient Highway System.

(By WINDSOR T. WHITE, Chairman Motor Truck Committee, National Automobile Chamber of Commerce.)

Motor highway transportation has grown to such vast importance in the past few years and has so well demonstrated its value and efficiency that it has won official public recognition in many of our states. But this activity can develop in a sound economic way only as good roads programs are developed. While there are examples where motor transportation has succeeded when run in territories that have undeveloped roads, they, in comparison with the thousands of motortruck routes, are practically negligible.

One of our greatest wastes in the handling of the prime necessity, food, occurs in our present transportation methods. (Hundreds of millions of dollars are annually wasted because the present method of transportation adapted to our present road system, is so costly that it does not pay to move this food from the farm to an area of consumption.)

It is said that New York state has 18,400 miles of surface highways and 79,398 miles of unimproved rural roads. While the state has a much higher percentage of improved roads than is common for the United States, they do not benefit the farmer as much as could be desired.

Long Island is one of the most prosperous agricultural areas in New York state. It is not exceptionally fertile; in fact, it may be said that it is fertile because man has made it so. There are many areas in the state that are naturally more productive than Long Island, but which are far less prosperous. If you could take a trip over the island you would know the reason why the island farmers are famous for their product and financial independence. A well-planned, well-constructed, and finely maintained system of roads is the greatest asset the island has. Every evening one can see hundreds of motortrucks, from two to five ton capacity, rolling over these roads, bound for the New York market. Here is no 50 nor 40, nor even 30 per cent waste. While in other ru-

...in districts the farmer drives a floundering team through a sea of mud or well-nigh impassable snowdrifts or chokes with the dust raised by his team if the road is dry, the Long Island farmer carries a greater load, makes about four times the speed, and is more comfortable in driving his motortruck over the good highways.

SAMPLES OF ROAD MATERIAL

Tests Made by Laboratory of Bureau of Public Roads Show Increase Over Preceding Year.

Laboratory devoted to the examination and classification of building rocks, main bureau of public roads, states department of agriculture examined 686 samples of material the past year, according to the bureau. This represents a considerable increase over the 500 samples examined in 1917. Of the samples examined, 41 were classified as follows:

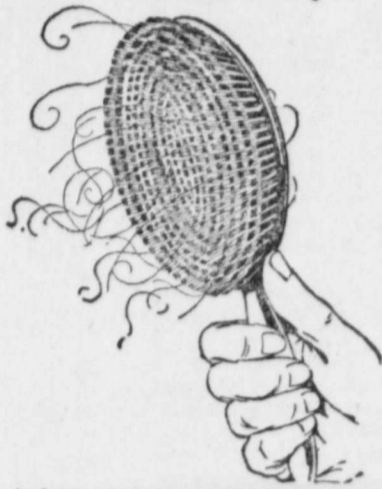


