



Simple Precautions in Herd Management Will Keep Out Disagreeable Odor in Milk.

Dairymen and creamery men in many states are troubled every spring by garlic or onion flavor in the milk This is due to the cows feeding on garlic or wild onion, one of the first plants to start in the pasture in the spring. The trouble from garlic is not likely to last very long, as this weed is soon cropped off and the grass beomes plentiful enough for the cattle to feed on it in preference to the

Garlie flavor in milk can be removed by heating the milk to 145 degrees F. and forcing air through it at this temperature for 30 to 60 minutes, according to Farmers' Bulletin 608 of the United States department of agriculture. As this method requires a certain amount of equipment, it is much more satisfactory for the average dairyman to keep the odor out of milk by a few simple precautions in herd management.

There are two ways of protecting the milk from garlic flavor. First, prevent the cows from obtaining garlic; and second, manage the herd on garlic pasture, so that there will be the least possible chance of getting the flavor in the milk.

Often the garlic is found only in one patch in the pasture, and this can be temporarily fenced off and pastured with other animals not producing

Where garlic is scattered all over the field it will be impossible to keep the cows away from it, but by removing them to some other field three or four hours before each milking the flavor will be reduced to a minimum. The odor in milk is strongest from cows which have just eaten garlic, and the odor is reduced as the time between the eating of garlic and milking is increased.

In case no garlic-free pasture is available, it would be advisable to drive the cattle to the barnyard three or four hours before milking and feed them on hay and silage. As the sea-

son for garlic trouble is short; this hould not gause much inconvenience. The best plan for avoiding trouble from this weed on the dairy farm is to kill it out completely. This can be done with little trouble, and those interested can obtain information on the subject by writing to the United States department of agriculture for Farmers' Bulletin 610, "Wild Onion, Method of Eradication."



DECLINE IN PRICES OF MEAT

Bureau of Crop Estimates Notes Drop in Amount Paid for Pork, Beef, and Mutton

The advance in the monthly average price of hogs per 100 pounds received by producers, which began with February, 1916, comparison being made with the same month in the preceding year, continued without a break to August, 1919, and the advance was from \$7.07 to \$19.30. Since August, 1919, the fall from month to month was continuous to \$12.66 in December, followed by a rise to \$13.36 in January, 1920, or \$2,33 below the January price in 1919, according to the reports of the bureau of crop estimates. United States department, of agriculture.

The average price of sheep per 100 pounds received by producers throughout the whole year had an upward movement from 1913 to 1918, from \$4.54 to \$10.94, the principal increase being in 1917. The average for 1919. \$9.58, is a drop of \$1.36 from that for 1918, or 12 per cent.

From 1915 to 1918, the average price of beef cattle per pound to producers invariably advanced from year to year in each month and the advance continued from 1918 to 1919 until May. after which month the average price in 1919 fell below that of 1916 in each month, and the average price for January, 1920, was \$8.99, or 66 below that for January, 1919. In the upward movement, the highest monthly average price reached was \$10.84 in May, 1919.

ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF HEDLEY, TEXAS.

CHAPTER VII

An Ordinance Providing Who Shall Be Subject to Street Du ty in the City of Hedley, Texas and Fixing a Penalty for Failing to Perform the Same.

Article 35. Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas: That all male persens living within the corporate limits of the City of Hedley, Texas, between the ages of 21 and 45 years, shall be liable and it is hereby made their duty to work on and repair the public streets within the corporate limits of the chair, 8 or 10 chairs, and other city of Hedley, Texas, under the provisions and regulations of this ordinance, except Ministers ever, bankable note or five per of the Gospel in the active discharge of their ministerial duties. and such others as are ex-

> Article 36. No person shall be compelled to work on the streets who has not been a resident of the city of Hedley for fifteen days immediately preceding the day he is summoned to work on said ssreets.

> Article 37. Any person who is liable to street duty and who has been summoned to do such dut shall have the privilege to ful nish an able bodied substitute t work in his place, which substa tate shall be accepted by th! Marshal if he is capable of per forming a reasonable amount of work, otherwise he shall not bell accepted.

Article 38 Every person liable to work on the streets, by paying the City Marshal of the city of Hedley at any time before the day appointed to work on the streets the sum of one dollar for each day be is summoned to work, shall be exempt from vorking for each day thus paid for, and also exempt from any penalty for failure to work, for the time for which he has so paid

Article 39. It shall be the duty his duties in accordance with the directions of the Marshal, or other person under whom he may be at work; and a day's work within the meaning of this ordinance shall be eight hours efficient service when said service

is voluntarily performed. Article 40. The Marshal of the city of Hedley shall have the power to call out all persons liable to work upon the streets at any time he may deem it necessary, or when ordered by the City Council, and such hands may be called out in detail, or the whole force at any one time, as may be deemed best, or as the City Council may direct, for the better improvement of the public streets.

Article 41. It shall be the duty of the Marshal of the city of Hedley to give three days summons in person or in writing to each person within the city of Hedley liable to street duty in said city, of the time and place when and where such person is required to appear and work on the streets, and the number of days such person will be requir.
