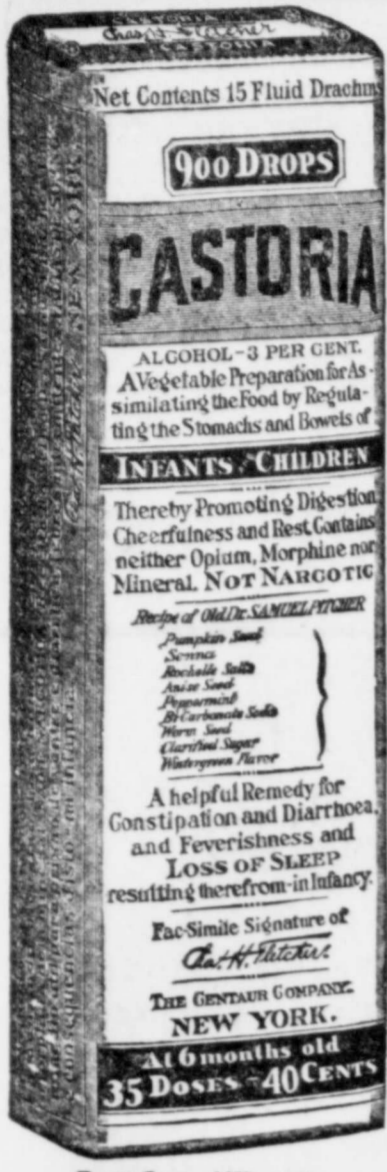

## TWO EXTREMES IN ATTRACTIVE SUITS



FROM the very plain tailored suits of wool to the handsomely embroidered sport suit of silk is quite a "far piece," but the interval is filled with suits that gradually progress from the plain model to its smart rival. Street clothes nowadays have a considerable flavor of sports styles, although there remains, and probably always will remain, the trim, strictly tailored, business-like utility suit that holds the allegiance of American women. This they must have, others they may have, and, if circumstances allow, several in varying styles they do have. One of them will be as simple and, we hope, as well tailored as the mannish suit pictured, another as definitely a sports style as the suit at the right, and others formal or sportish.

Blue serge, it almost goes without saying, is used for the first suit. Its plain skirt has a little flare and is made with box plaits down the front and back. It doesn't take long to describe this very simple affair but it is worth while adding that it is perfectly fitted and tailored.

The clever and unusual coat has slashes at each side in its skirt rounded at the bottom and is bound with braid. A group of three tucks or cords, stitched in the material and running parallel with the edge of the coat reveals a difficult piece of work done with precision. A panel at the back is simulated by a cord or cord stitched in the material that extends downward from the shoulders and terminates in a rounded end. There are plain coat sleeves and a small collar.

A heavy fiber silk makes the sport suit and a square-necked, one-piece dress takes the place of a blouse and skirt to be worn under the coat. The bodice is extended to form a short yoke for the skirt, which is stitched on to it. In this suit it is the skirt that claims most attention for it is heavily embroidered in wool yarn. In the sweater coat a narrow shawl collar diminishes in width on its downward way to the hem, where it terminates. The very wide hem turns up on the right side providing place for deep pockets and the coat has no decoration other than four pearl buttons that finish off the long sleeves. The narrow belt is made of the goods.

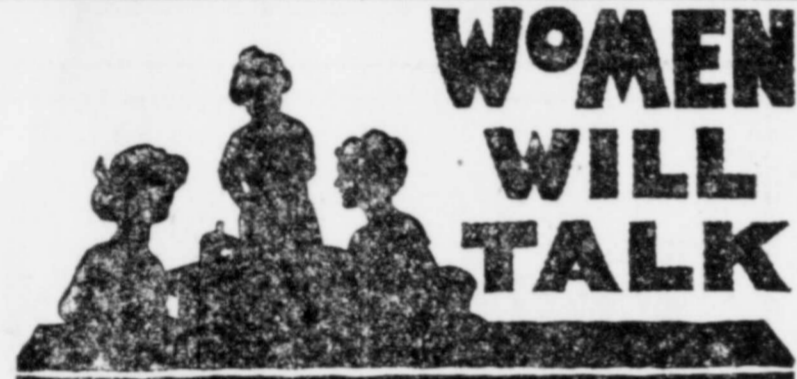

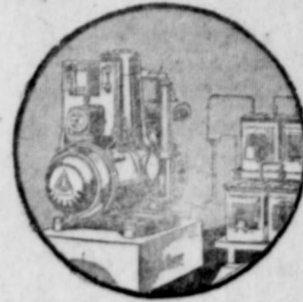
## Sheriff's Notice of Election

building of concrete material within said district and to determine whether the Commissioners' Court of this county shall be authorized to levy, assess and collect annually while said bonds or any of them are outstanding, a tax upon all taxable property within said district sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County, and who are resident property tax payers in said district, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the bonds;" and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the bonds."

A. O. Hefner has been appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall select two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding the same, and he shall within five days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the Commissioners' Court of this county as is required by law for holding a general election.

Said election was ordered by the County Judge of this county by order made on the 24th day

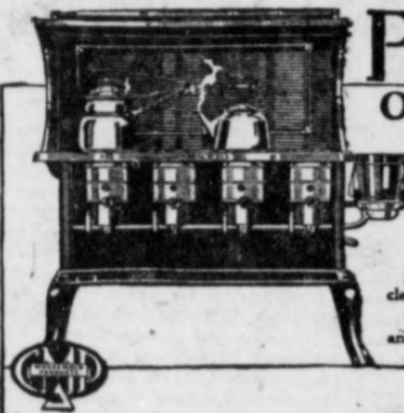

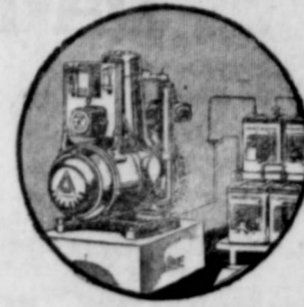

An illustration of the important service which inspectors of perishable food, representing the bureau of markets, United States department of agriculture, are able to render exporters, is found in the work recently done in connection with the shipment abroad of 4,000,000 pounds of butter. This butter was destined for one of the European countries, but because previous uninspected shipments had not come up to specifications, the exporting house, to protect itself against further complaints, requested United States government inspection. This insured delivery of butter of the quality called for in its contracts. The bureau of markets' inspectors were called on to certify the grade of the butter which was held in Minneapolis, Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia and New York warehouses. These are the points at which butter inspectors are regularly stationed.

The inspections were made as requested, and such lots as did not come up to the stipulated score were withheld, while the rest was started on its way. From this incident it appears that federal inspection certificates are proving of value to exporters, since they guarantee that the shipments concerned fully meet specific requirements—an important factor in promoting foreign trade relations.



Likewise, the industry as a whole benefits from federal inspection because through it the produce obtains favorable standing in foreign markets.

#### COWS REPAY GENEROUS FEED

Animals Take Raw Materials and Work Them Over into Milk—Dispose of Shirkers.

The cow must be regarded as a sort of living machine. She takes the raw materials given her in the form of feed and works them over into milk. If the supply of proper materials is small, the output will be small. The cow that will not repay generous feeding should be disposed of and one bought that will. There are, of course, certain inbred characteristics or natural qualities which even liberal feeding cannot overcome.

#### BALANCED RATION FOR COWS

New York Farmers Feed Oats, Gluten, Bran and Cottonseed Meal in Combination.

A balanced ration for dairy cows, used largely by New York farmers who feed silage, hay and some corn fodder for roughage, consists of 200 pounds ground oats, 200 pounds gluten, 100 pounds bran and 100 pounds cottonseed meal. Considering nutritive value it is about the cheapest ration a farmer can buy.

Should Be Done Early in Morning and Less Than Three Times a Week in Summer.

### Last Carver of Totems



William Shelton Carving His "Life Work."

THIS unusual photograph shows one of the last—possibly the last—of the carvers of totem poles. He is William Shelton, head of the Indian reservation school at Tulalip, Wash. The making of totem poles is an art and few nowadays are the men who can carve them. What a totem pole looks like when completed and set up is shown in the side picture.

Shelton regards this enormous totem pole as his life work. He has already put in 3,000 hours on it. It will set forth the family history of the Snohomish tribe of western Washington. When set in place it will be 6 feet in diameter and will rise 84 feet. Upon completion of this life work Shelton intends to devote the rest of his days to informing the world of the true inwardness of totem poles. It is a large undertaking.

What is a totem? Well, it would take a Philadelphia lawyer to figure it out and then he'd have hard work to make the average man understand the true inwardness of totemism, totem and totem pole.

Totemism, the anthropologists say, is common to primitive man in many parts of the world, but is far from being universal. It is found among the American Indians, but there are tribes which show no trace of it. The Eskimos know nothing of it. Certain African savages have it. The Australians have it.

A totem is a class of material objects which a savage regards with superstitious respect, believing that there exists between him and every member of the class an intimate and altogether special relation. The connection between a man and his totem is mutually beneficial; the totem protects the man and the man shows his respect for the totem in various ways. If his totem is an animal he may show this respect either by refusing to kill and eat it or by making it his favorite diet.

Early explorers found the American Indian communities, independent of their local distribution into tribes, bands and villages, composed of several distinct clans. Each clan had its emblem, consisting of the figure of some bird, beast or reptile, as for example, the clans of the wolf, deer, otter and hawk. In the language of the Algonquins these emblems are known as totems. Members of the same clan were prohibited from intermarriage; a man could take a wife from any clan but his own. To different totems attached different degrees of rank and dignity; those of the bear, tortoise and wolf were among the first in honor. Members of the same clan, though they might dwell far apart and speak different dialects, were yet bound by the closest ties of fraternity. This kind of totem was found in at least three varieties: the clan totem, common to a whole clan and passing by inheritance from generation to generation; the sex totem, common either to all the males or to all the females in a tribe, to the exclusion in either case of the other sex; the individual totem, belonging to an individual and not passing to his descendants.

As to the totem pole, it is hard to say what it is. There is one thing however, which it is not; it is not a fetish or an idol or a thing to be worshipped. The totem pole of one man may be simply his individual totem. A second totem pole may also bear the clan totem of the owner. Then a chief or a rich man may have an elaborate totem pole consisting "all his crests" and all the stories connected with them. So that a very large and elaborate totem pole may be possessed by one of the own.

ments in Alaska, created in large part with the view of preserving some very fine examples of these curious relics of bygone days.

Sitka National monument was created in 1910. It is about a mile from Sitka and contains 57 acres. It contains 18 totem poles, the highest of which rises 60 feet. These totem poles are carved from red cedar and when the paint wears off the unprotected wood cracks badly. These totem poles have recently been given two coats of paint by the National park service in six colors. Where the carvings were broken or decayed they were replaced. This monument is a picturesque place and from it there is a panoramic view of beauty and interest as the scene of the massacre of Russian fur hunters by Indians in the early days when all this region was owned by Russia.

Old Kansas National monument was created in 1916. It contains 38 acres and within its bounds are an abandoned Indian village, numerous remarkable totem poles and other objects of historical interest.

#### WAR AND FUTURE OF ART

Fresh Creative Force May Reasonably Be Hoped for, Is Conclusion of Noted Writer.

As for the action of the world's great war upon the world's great art, it is a theme too vast for easy handling, writes Agnes Repplier in Art and Life, New York. It was said in the spring of 1915 that the Quartier Latin had ceased to produce, having nothing which breathless humanity could pause to look at. Death took its toll of artists and month after month saw the blighting of hope, as men died with their work undone.

Mr. Pennell, an acute, but not a sanguine observer, says plainly that new inspiration—as a result of the conflict—is not to be hoped for. Yet if national fervor was fed by the simplicities of art, by the cartoon, the verses of the trench, the "half articulate songs" that set the soldier's blood tingling, it is reasonable to believe that the high tide of human passion will not ebb before impregnating a lethargic world with fresh creative force.

Rodin, brooding over the darkest hour and minimizing no peril or calamity, spoke with heroic assurance of the future: "Our young soldiers and our old cathedrals fall that there may flourish again a youth, pure, ardent, healthy, hostile to materialism, keen for spirituality; and that a renewed and sublime art may spring from the soil washed and fertilized by blood."

#### Milk Consumption.

As it is estimated that only 2.9 of the milk produced in this country is used in making condensed milk, the industry can not have any considerable effect upon the milk industry of the cities. According to figures given for last year, 43.1 per cent of milk produced is used as liquid milk, 41 per cent for making butter, 4.3 per cent for feeding calves, 5 per cent for making cheese, 3.7 per cent for making ice cream, and 2.9 for condensed milk. The United States has about 23,000,000 dairy cows. It is estimated that Europe lost about 22,000,000 cows in the last few years.

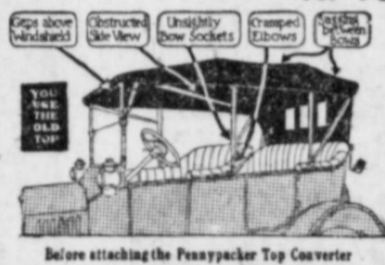

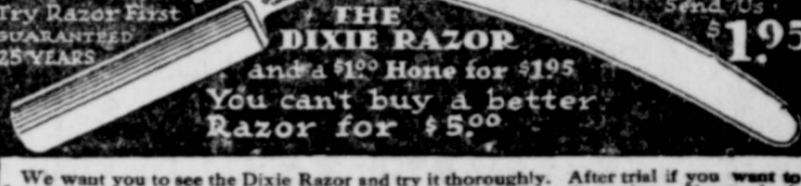

GIVEN PRIVILEGE IN WAR

Channel Islanders for Centuries Were Not Forced to Take Part in Britain's Conflicts.

For over two centuries the Channel Islands were allowed to remain neutral in any war that England might undertake. This singular privilege was granted to them by Edward IV, and was not revoked till the reign of William and Mary. It was granted as a reward for the loyalty of the islanders, whose commerce with the neighboring coasts of Brittany and Normandy was constantly being interrupted by the numerous wars. Even the pope joined in enforcing the right, and by a bull dated 1483 Sextus IV threatened to excommunicate any one who violated the order. On the whole, it was fairly rigidly observed, and when a Guernsey vessel was taken in the channel by a privateer of Morlaix, the islanders with their boat were released, but a few Englishmen on board, with their merchandise, were captured. The privilege does not seem to have been of any great commercial value, for when it was withdrawn the islanders made more money than before by fitting their vessels out as privateers.
