



POULTRY FLOCKS

FOOD PRODUCTS FROM FOWLS

On Average Farm Poultry Furnish About 10 Per Cent of Meat for Family Use.

A large proportion of the poultry products of this country are produced n general farms. Nearly every farm has its poultry flock. The average American farmer reserves about three dozen eggs a week for family use and about 50 fowls are consumed by the family during the year. These food products can be secured absolutely fresh, which considerably enhances the value of this contribution from the farm, says the United States department of agriculture. Of the meat furnished by the farm to the operator and its family, poultry constitutes about 10 per cent.

A small flock of posttry can be kept on the farm at little cost. The fowls find scattered grain about the farmstead and on the adjoining grain fields after harvest. Garden refuse and kitchen waste are usually available for them. They also feed on insects and worms. In many cases the farmer's wife and children find pleasure in caring for the flock.

HOMEMADE HOPPER IS HANDY

Joint of Stovepipe and Wooden Box Make Convenient Device for Feeding Dry Mash.

An easy way to make a hopper for feeding dry mash to poultry is with a joint of stovepipe and a wooden box, 10x10x4 inches. Set the box on the floor and hang the stovepipe from the roof so that it is about 1/2 inch from the bottom of the box. Fill the pipe with the dry mash. It will feed down into the box as the chickens eat if



ever done. J. E. Madden bought him for \$50,000 and retired him to the stud. J. H. Rosseter, the California sportsman and breeder, bought Friar Rock and some mares and their foals for \$100,000. One of these foals, Inchcape, hatled as a second Man o' War, was bought the other day by S. C. Hildreth for \$150,000. Mr. Rosseter let Inchcape go because he thinks some of the others of this first crop of Friar Rock youngsters are better still, but he refused Hildreth's offer of \$250,000 for Friar Rock.

Mr. Riddle bought Man o' War on a bid of \$5,000 at the Belmont yearling sale of 1918 at Saratoga, which three other colts brought apward of \$13,000 each.

As a 2-year-old Man o' War ran nine races and won them all except the Sanford Memorial at Saratoga. In that stake J. Loftus got him practically left at the post and he was beaten a neck by H. P. Whitney's Upset in 1:11 1-5. At the next meeting Man o' War beat Upset like breaking Incidentally, J. Loftus could get no license

Up to July 10 Man o' War had run five races this year and had won them all—the Breakness,

Withers, Stuyvesant, Belmont and Dwyer.
As a 2-year-old he won \$83,325. His victory in
the Dwyer brought his 1920 winnings to \$44,475, and made him the leading money-winning horse of the year. Were his owner a stake-hog instead of a sportsman, he could doubtless have won the rich Kentucky and Latonia derbies with the colt.

Man o' War as a 2-year-old met and defeated the best of his age, including Upset, Golden Broom, Blazes, King Thrush, Cleopatra, Domin-ique and John P. Grier. The racing world recognized his quality and asked: "Will he go on as a 3-year-old?" Man o' War answered the question by winning the Preakness at Pimlico last spring from Upset, Wildair and King Thrush in 1:51 3-5 for the mile and an eighth with 126 pounds up.

They got it. The two horses ran neck and neck to the last sixteenth. Here they went to the whip. John P. Grier cracked and Man o' War went on to win, ridden out, by a length and a half.

The time, 1:49 1-5, is a new world record. The previous American was one-fifth of a second slower and was held jointly by Borrow and Boots. Brown Prince ran the distance in England in 1917 in 1:50 2-5 with 105 pounds up. The best Austra-lian time is 1:52. Man o' War ran the quarter in 23 2-5, the half in 46, the three-quarters in 1:09 2-5, and the mile in 1:35 8-5. So the horse ran faster than the records all the way around. Donau's half-mile in 46 1-5 at Los Angeles has stood since 1909. Artful's three-quarters over the straight course at Morris Park in 1:09 3-5 has stood since 1904. The mile in 1:85 3-5 was one-fifth second faster than Man o' War's new record in the Withbrs.



After consecrating the site of the future cathedral, Bishop Poore laid the first foundation stone in the name of Pope Honorius; a second for Stephen Langton, Archbishop of Canterbury, Cand a third for himself. William Longespee, first earl of Sallsbury, whose nave is a masterplece of statuary art, was placed by his countess, Ela. Other stone laying followed, "amidst the acclamation," and old chronicler tells us, "of multitudes of the people, weeping for joy, and contributing thereto their alms with a ready mind, accord-ing to the ability which God had given them." So quickly did the work progress that three altars were conse-crated in the new building within five years of the foundation ceremonies.

Why the Site Was Changed. The founders of the new cathedral gave several reasons for abandoning the structure on the hill of Old Sarum. the structure on the hill of Old Sarum. One reason mentioned in the bull obtained for the purpose from Pope Honorius, dated March 29, 1219, was that the hilly situation of Old Sarum placed the cathedral at the mercy of winds so stormy that not only was it often difficult to hear the words of the service, but the structure became in constant need of repair. Another trouble was the insufficiency of the water supply and a third was the most cogent of all, the military in the neighboring castle taking all possible pains to show that they, and not the ecclesias-tics, were the lords of Old Sarum.

"What has the House of the Lord to do with castles?" asked Peter of Blois in support of the proposal to remove the See from Old Sarum. "It is the Ark of the Covenant in a temple of Balaam. Let us, in the name of God, descend into the meads. There are rich meadows and fertile valleys profusely watered by living streams. There is a seat for the virgin patroness of our church to which the whole world cannot produce a parallel."

His conclusions as to the situation were in every sense correct, for among English cathedrals scarcely one—if any—can vie with the exquisite setting of Salisbury's aspiring loveliness of pinnacles and spire in the center of



Shown in the accompanying illus trations is a design for an eight-room house that is modern in every wayexterior appearance and interior arrangement-and one that can be erected at a minimum cost. This house is of frame construction, set on a concrete foundation, the exterior being of board siding with stucco above the second floor.

With the exception of the ernament ed roof, this is a colonial design. The balance of the colonial is maintained throughout the exterior and the interior, and the porch, with its square piers and railed balcony above, adds another touch that is along the lines of the early American homes. The roof is covered with tile of concrete, and a good effect is secured by running the rafters to the eaves without boxing them, as is done ordinarily.

How the eight rooms are arranged is seen from the floor plans which also

Taken all together this is an excellent home for a good sized family. At the same time it is not expensive, its dimensions being only 36 by 36 feet. All of the walls, both foundation and in the superstructure, are straight, which are the most economical in both labor and materials to con-




