

POLAND PLAYS NO NEW ROLE

Country Harassed by Bolsheviki larger than the combined populations Was Once the Savior of Europe.

STAYED MARCH OF THE TURK

In Size Poland Once Outranked Every Nation of Continent and in Population Stood at the Forefront of Europe.

Washington .- Poland, whose history is tragedy, and whose people have been called "Children of the Sun," plays no new role when she seeks to stop the onslaughts of the bolsheviki, for it was she who once stayed the

march of the Turk across Europe. This fact is recalled in a communication to the National Geographic society, which sums up Poland's sad and eventful history as follows:

"In size she outranked nearly every nation of the continent. Russia alone of the European nations is larger than Poland was at her greatest. In population she stood at the forefront of Europe; only Russia and Germany had greater populations before the war than are to be found in the lands that once were Poland; for unpartitioned Poland had an area of 282,000 square miles, and the lands that once lay within her boundaries support a population of approximately 50,000,-000. In area she was as large as the former German empire. Switzerland. Belgium, Holland and Denmark together; larger than Great Britain, Italy and Greece combined; larger than Austria-Hungary and Serbia in one. Within what were her boundaries there dwells a present population

of Great Britain and Belgium; larger than those of France, Belgium and Holland together; and matching that of the old Austria-Hungary. Three Times Partitioned.

"Poland was three times partitioned, and these partitionings were readjusted between the partitioners by the congress of Vienna in 1815. Where the original partitions had given Russia 181,000 square miles. Prussia 54,square miles, the reapportionment of rich alluvial soil. the Vienna congress gave Russia 220,-

500, Prussia 26,000, and Austria 35,-000 square miles. Much of the land which Russia secured, and particularly Kiev, had been identified with Russia generations before. "Poland, in the days of her greatest

area, extended from a point within 50 miles of Berlin, on the west, to the meridian of the Sea of Azov on the east; on the north it reached nearly to the Gulf of Finland and on the south down to the Khanate of Crimea.



up draft deserters will be inaugurated by the war department in the next few weeks with the publication of a slacker list containing, according to the present records, 173,911 **Dames**

and Shoshone, Wyo.

Although every effort has been made to reach every man classified as a draft deserter in order to give him

an opportunity to show that he did not willfully evade his duty, notice of the impending "drive" is given, and every man in doubt as to his draft record is urged by the adjutant general of the army to write to him within the next two weeks so as to afford sufficient time for his case to be settled before the slacker list is made

public. "The war department is most anxlous not to place upon any man who served his country honorably the humiliation of having his name appear as a slacker, and for that reason is seeking the widest publicity of the fact that a list of deserters will be published, and that the men whose names appear on that list will be arrested and brought to trial before a multary court," according to a statement issued by the adjutant general.



opportunity to clear his record and avoid the probable publication of his name as a deserter. Once the list of deserters is posted, every means at the disposal of the army will be brought into play to bring about the arrest and trial of the guilty.

"The tremendous public sentiment against slackers will cause the whereabouts of most of them to be revealed, and it is not expected that any guilty man will escape.'

The payment of \$50 for each draft deserter apprehended and turned over to the military authorities has been temporarily suspended by the war department because of the tremendous expense involved.



DAIRY HINTS

"MILK COW" NOW PREFERRED

Advocates of Word Contended That It Was More Strictly English-Milch Akin to German.

Hereafter it will be "milk cow" and not "milch cow"-at least so far as the United States department of agriculture is concerned.

This decision marks the termination of a controversy in which etymologists in the department have had not a little interest. Those defending "milch" have pointed to scriptural use and certain of the classics as establishing proce-

dents, while the opposition has contended that dairymen, ranchmen and farmers in general use "milk" instead of "milch" almost universally. The advocates of "milk" also favored that word because, they contended, it was more strictly an English word, while "milch" was akin to German. Since Americanization of language as well as ideals is an article in every patriot's creed, it is thought that this last sally of the "milk" defenders helped as much as any to decide the question in

their favor.

Animals Are Naturally of Nervous and Excitable Disposition and Resent Roughness

In the hurry of getting chores done, dairyman sometimes forgets thatdairy cows are naturally of a nervous and excitable disposition, and that under conditions of excitement or fear the milk flow is lessened materially. Driving cows on the run, chasing them by dogs and with loud shouting are not allowed on a well-managed dairy farm. In the stable all operations should be carried on quietly. When a cow kicks there usually is a reason for it; the teats may be hurt by the milker

or the cow may be frightened. At such a time a little care in removing the cause and pacifying the cow often will prevent further trouble. Many good cows become confirmed kickers and consequently less profitable as a result of a lack of careful observation and kindness on the part of the attend







Perhaps the most common mistake In feeding grain to dairy cows is the practice of feeding every cow in the herd the same quantity regardless of the amount of milk she is producing, instead of regulating the grain according to the daily amount of milk produced.

Considerable waste of feed may result from failure to balance rations. This is especially true if the ration happens to be in protein; for, while an excess of protein may be substituted for energy, energy producing foods can in no case take the place of protein in a ration. The milk flow, therefore, may be limited to the protein content of the ration, even the energy produc-ing foods may be present in excess. An economical ration is a balanced ration.

HOW TO FEED CALVES

Feed the calf only small mounts of milk for the first few feeds.

Do not overfeed. Scours, stunted calves, and deaths are caused largely by overfeeding. A pfit of milk weighs a pound. Meas-ure or weigh the milk for each calf. Do not guess at it.

Feed regularly twice a day. Have the milk warm, sweet and fresh. If the milk is poor in quality, feed less of it, not

Feed grain and milk from clean boxes and buckets. Buck-ets should be washed and scalded every morning.

Scutari, principal city of Albania, cenically suggests Geneva, nestling between the limpid waters of Lake Scutari and the mountains of northern Albania, snow-capped for the greater part of the year, rising to orm an Alp-like background. Instead of being a city of highly organized industry and industrious and frugal artisans, Scutari has been scarred by word. earthquake and flood.

To reach Scutari from any Monte-negrin town, op the north side of Lake Scutari, one boards a "londra," the sharp-pointed prow and stern rising high out of the water. Oarsmen propel it by short, quick jerks, often accompanying their strokes by a wild barbaric chant. The gondola-like boats on Lake Scutaria are accounted for by the Venetian influence that is evi-

An important report, which posesses peculiar interest for all motorts, regarding good road progress during the present year, made by the bu-reau of public roads of the United States department of agriculture shows that for 1919 the expenditure for hard-surfaced highways establishes a new record, in so far as the de partment's road program is concerned the total amount being \$138,000,000 The indications are that the follow ing year will exceed this record by a large margin, as the available funds for road expenditure by the bur for 1920 amount to \$633,000,000.
