## PRETTY HOUSE OF ORIENTAL DESIGN

Will Appeal to Those in Search of Something Different.

### PAGODA ROOF IS DISTINCTIVE

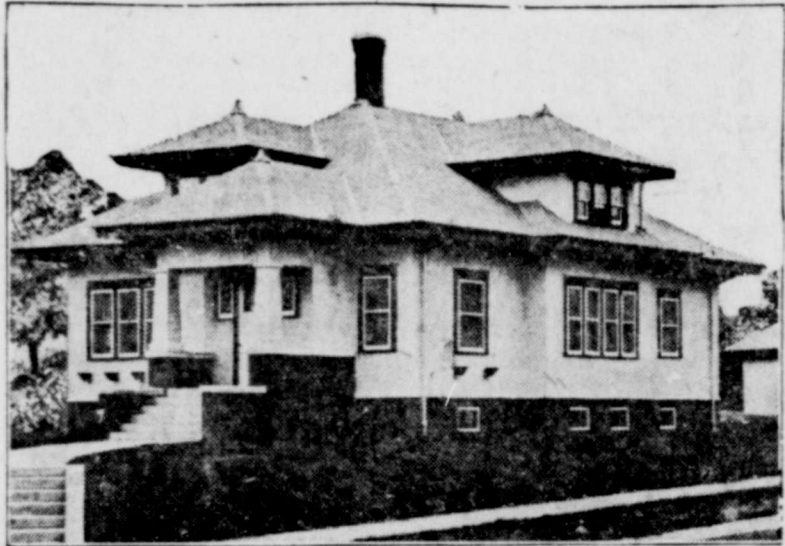
Influence of Far East Type of Architecture Quite Apparent in Pagoda Porch and Dormer Roofs—Not Expensive to Build.

Happily for us in particular and for the world at large, each one strives to do something different. In the case of women, they are continually striving to dress differently from their neighbor, resulting in the wonderful variety of designs and colors in women's dress. We dress differently, act differently and live differently, and as a result the world is an interesting place in which to live. If this were not the case it would be drab, monotonous and uninteresting.

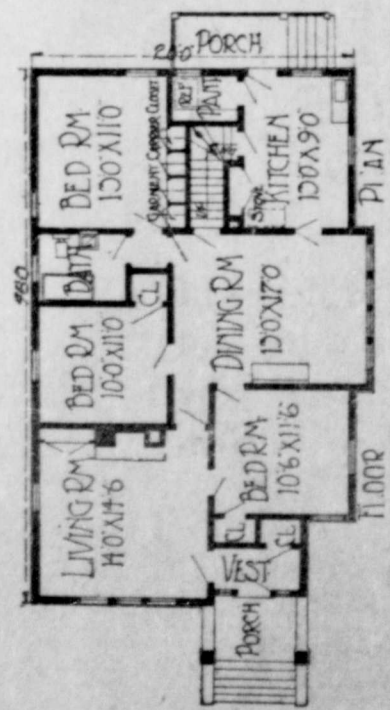
In no phase of human activity is this variety more essential and more beneficial than in the home and its



environment. A street of homes of the same exterior design, same color and same material is one of the most depressing scenes that one can look at. Too often hope of profit has obscured a builder's vision to the effect this sameness of design will have in the future on that section of the city. It is inevitable that sooner or later it will degenerate into slums. Whereas, take a street of homes that are distinctive and different, they instill pride of ownership and last for generations.

That was the thought uppermost in the mind of the architect who designed this unique home of stucco and brick. It is quite exotic in appearance, the influence of Far East architecture being apparent in the pagoda porch and dormer roofs. The design takes on a certain Japanese or oriental appearance that makes it quite unusual and therefore certainly bound to appeal to those who are in search of something different.

In construction it is substantial, resting on a solid brick foundation and well lighted and equipped with a

modern heating plant, fuel room, workshop and laundry. These are essential features of the modern home that should be considered carefully when drawing up the plans.

A short set of concrete steps lead the way to the front porch which is Japanese in design and small, more of a protective shelter than a lounging place. The front door with two small flanking windows opens into a small vestibule with closet for outdoor clothing, rubbers, etc. At the left of the vestibule is the door leading into the living room, a very cozy and comfortable room of good size, 14 by 14 feet 6 inches, with open brick fireplace in the wall opposite the front of the

house. A triple window in the front and one window on the side afford plenty of fresh air and sunlight.

The clean white stucco coating makes this house very pleasing in exterior appearance and affords quite a contrast to the dark foundation of brick, and the window frames.

Leading from the living room is a short hall which opens into a side bedroom, 10 by 11 feet and the dining room on the right side of the house. The dining room is splendidly arranged and is very bright and cheerful, a row of four windows at the side providing an abundance of sunshine. At the end of the dining room the hall turns and leads to the bath at the far end to the left and to another bedroom in the rear, also to the stairway going up. This rear bedroom is larger than the other one and is equipped with special space-saving garment carriers which do not take up much space.

Directly in back of the dining room and connected with it by a swinging door is the kitchen, a delightfully arranged workshop for the housewife. This arrangement of kitchen room and dining room saves many steps for the housewife in serving meals. Moreover, the kitchen is quite small and does not call for a whole lot of unnecessary work which a larger room would require. It is completely equipped with sink, range and cupboards. A small pantry provides extra storage space, opening out on the rear porch from the pantry is a refrigerator with outdoor icing arrangement.

At the rear of the lot is a very attractive appearing garage of stucco large enough to hold two cars. The owner of the house can get some extra revenue by renting out half of this building to some tenant. If extra room is needed in the house proper there is



a very high, well lighted and ventilated attic or half story which can be made habitable quickly and reasonably. There is room for at least two more bedrooms in the attic.

For a cozy all-around comfortable home this attractive little bungalow is difficult to beat. It offers convenience for the housewife, comfort for the family and a pleasing picture to the passerby. There is nothing about it that will cost a whole lot of money, which is an important consideration nowadays, and it will look attractive in any neighborhood.

## DAIRY FACTS

### COW TESTING IS IMPORTANT

Much Progress Has Been Made in Replacing Inferior Bulls With High-Class Animals.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Numerous examples of the valuable work being done by cow-testing associations are contained in reports of testers of these organizations sent to the western office of the dairy division of the United States Department of Agriculture.

According to the reports, marked progress has been made in replacing inferior bulls with high-class purebred animals. Six of the testing associations—of which three are in Idaho, two in Colorado and one in Washington—have reached the 100 per cent purebred bull mark, having eliminated all scrub sires from their herds. Another 100 per cent association was added to the list in January, and several others are getting near this mark.

The Petaluma (Cal.) association has only two scrub bulls left. The dairy department of the local farm bureau is located in a plan for an annual purebred bull sale, the first of which was held several months ago. Young bulls out of 400-pound dams and older proved bulls are consigned to this sale by breeders and by dairymen wishing to dispose of bulls which they have used as long as they can in their own herds. The sale was the means of introducing 25 purebred bulls into the county, and the association hopes by this means to eliminate all scrub bulls from the county and to keep the dairymen supplied with good bulls in the future. Through these sales it also hopes to open a market for proved bulls, and so keep these bulls in service in the county for many years.

The tester of the Skagit Valley (Wash.) association reports that the last scrub bull has been "discharged from service." He also says that one farmer increased his production by 12 pounds of fat per cow on 25 cows from November to December by better care and feeding, and adds that this is an easy way of getting 300 pounds of fat more a month without milking any more cows.

The head tester for the Los Angeles (Cal.) association reports an increased

## FARM STOCK

### GUARD AGAINST HOG CHOLERA

Dread Disease Most Likely to Appear in Herds During Months of October and November.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

October and November are the months when the dread disease, hog cholera, is most likely to appear. During those months and until snow covers the ground swine raisers are urged by the United States Department of Agriculture to be especially observing when feeding hogs in the morning. Any animals in the herd which fail to come to their feed, and particularly those having arched backs and rough coats, should be removed promptly from the rest of the herd.

In some cases hogs sick with cholera die within a few days; in others the disease may assume a chronic form and linger for several weeks. If cholera is suspected swine growers should immediately call a competent veterinarian to make a proper diagnosis and to apply the preventive serum treatment if they are found to be affected with cholera. A post-mortem examination of swine that have

died from cholera generally will show one or more of the following symptoms: Purple blotches on the skin; blood-colored spots on the surfaces of the lungs and heart, on the kidneys, and on both the outer surface and inner linings of the intestines, stomach, and bladder; reddening of lymphatic glands; enlargement of the spleen, in acute cases; an ulceration of the inner lining of the large intestine.

In the lingering or chronic cases of hog cholera it is usual to find intestinal button-like ulcers on the intestines.

### WORK HORSES REQUIRE CARE

Animals That Have Had Their Teeth Looked After Are Usually Most Efficient.

Horses working in the fields not only require good care and feed but they will eat better.

Horses that have had their teeth looked after are usually more efficient workers than those which have not, especially horses with some age. Horses with poor teeth cannot digest their feed efficiently. A little time spent in rasping the teeth down level is often well spent.

### MINERAL MIXTURE FOR HOGS

Animals Crave Something in Addition to Feeds Given Them to Meet Growth Requirements.

Hogs need certain minerals to meet their growth requirements. One such mixture that has proved satisfactory is composed of: Charcoal, 50 pounds; wood ashes, 50; epsom salts, 3 pounds. Palfly burned corn cobs and soft coal are good. It is well to keep a mineral mixture before the hogs all the time.

### HOGS ARE HARVEST HELPERS

In Most Cases It Will Pay to Let Them Take Care of Part of Small Grain Crops.

Hogs can be of great assistance in harvesting small grain crops. In most cases when hogs are a paying proposition at all it will be found profitable to let them take care of part of the crops in this way, whether labor is scarce or not.

### DISPOSING OF DEAD ANIMALS

All Carcasses Should Be Burned or Covered With Quicklime and Buried Quite Deeply.

Burn to ashes or cover with quicklime and bury under four feet of earth all dead animals at butchering time, because they attract buzzards, dogs, etc., which may carry hog-cholera infection.

## MOTHER'S COOK BOOK by Nellie Maxwell

Words of frank cheer, glances of friendly eyes, Love's smallest coin, which yet to some may give The morsel that may keep alive a starving heart.

### GOOD FOODS

A DESSERT which is different but which is both attractive and nutritious is:

Rice Ice Cream. Boil two and one-half tablespoonsful of rice in a pint of milk with three-fourths of a cupful of sugar, a pinch of salt and when done rub through a sieve; when cold add one-half cupful of finely chopped almonds, one-fourth of a cupful of powdered sugar, one pint of whipped cream and two stiffly beaten egg whites. Freeze and serve in sherbet glasses garnished with cherries.

Sardine Salad. Cut two stalks of celery into bits, chop half a teaspoonful of parsley, remove the skins and bones from a box of sardines and break into bits. Toss all together and chill. Serve with a boiled dressing with some of the oil from the can added if it is of good flavor. Serve on crisp, well chilled lettuce leaves.

Raisin Pie. This is the last word in raisin pies: Stew together one cupful of seeded raisins and one-quarter of a cupful of dried currants in one pint of apricot juice. Add three tablespoonfuls of butter and two egg yolks, two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice and sugar to taste. Put into a shell that has been previously baked, cover with a meringue made with the whites of the eggs and four tablespoonfuls of sugar.

Hot Potato Salad. Wash and peel potatoes and cut into balls with a small French cutter—there should be two cupfuls. Cook in boiling salted water until tender, drain and pour over the following dressing after they are well sprinkled with minced parsley: Mix one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper, four tablespoonfuls of olive oil, one-half cupful of finely minced celery, two slices of lemon,

two tablespoonfuls of tarragon vinegar and two tablespoonfuls of minced onion, one tablespoonful of cider vinegar. Heat to the boiling point, remove the slices of lemon and pour over the potatoes.

Sour Cream Cake Filling. Cook together one cupful each of sour cream and brown sugar; when thick stir in one cupful of hickory nut meats. Add flavoring and spread on the cake while still warm.

Sardine Salad. Cut two stalks of celery into bits, chop half a teaspoonful of parsley, remove the skins and bones from a box of sardines and break into bits. Toss all together and chill. ### HOW TO MAKE HOME BREW

The following recipe for making home brew is now going the rounds of the press, and we pass it on to those of our readers who may be thirsty:

Chase three bull frogs thirty minutes, carefully gathering the "hops," add five gallons pickled brine, two quarts of shellac, one bar of grandpa's soap, half gallon of barn paint, four ounces of royal glue. Boil mixture sixty hours, then strain through a dirty sock to insure proper fermentation. Put in pint bottles adding one jackass to each pint to give it the proper kick. Will be ready to drink by 9.30 p. m. Oct. 30, 1921.

## DIG YOUR SWEET POTATOES

Potatoes intended for storage or shipping should be well matured, but when freezing weather is expected to occur it is well to dig the potatoes just before the first killing frost. Even a light frost will injure sweet potato vines, but it does not materially injure the potatoes; however if a freeze should come on them at this stage there is danger of the frozen sap passing down into the tubers, causing them to decay within a short time after harvesting.

If your vines have been killed by frost, as most of them have, and it is impossible to dig them at once, cut the vines away and throw loose soil over the rows for protection from further cold. Do not neglect this important matter, as it might be the cause of you losing your entire potato crop.

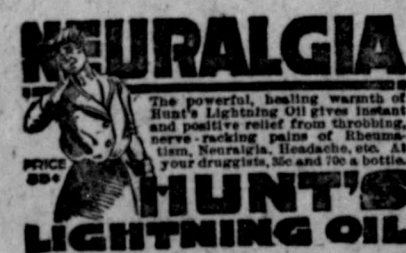
