

THE chestnut is most popular in Chestnuts cooked in a thick sugar slip parts of the United States, sirup flavored with orange juice and though it is not grown in all form and is used from soup to con- dishes.

To remove the shells, make a slit one-half inch long in the side of each nut, then put them into a pan with a little butter, a half teaspoonful to a cupful of nuts, and shake them over the fire to cover with butter and become hot. Place in the oven and bake five minutes. Remove and with a sharp knife take off the shells and the funer brown skin will come off at the same time.

Cream of Chestnut Soup. Cook two cupfuls of shelled and blanched chestnuts in boiling water until tender, press through a sieve and add two cupfuls of scalded milk. Cook two tablespoonfuls of chopped onion in four tablespoonfuls of butter, add two tablespoonfuls of flour, and when well cooked add to one pint of cream or rich milk with the chestnut mixture. Season with cayenne and cook five minutes until the flour is well cooked.

DAIRY POINTS

SUNFLOWER IS MADE USEFUL

Experiments Not Sufficiently Devel oped to Reach Definite Conclusions in Northwest.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Sunflowers are likely to become good for silage material for farmers on irrigated land in the Northwest, according to reports received by the United States Department of Agriculture from Montana. The Mammoth Russian is in much favor, although experiments have been tried with some of the smaller varieties. The sunflowers were drilled in rows 20 inches apage and irrigated. They were put in about the middle of May, but from their frost-resistant qualities it is believed they could be put in at the same time as grain is sown. About 15 pounds of seed were used to the acre on irrigated land, but it was stated that if sunflow

ers are to be raised under dry-land conditions the seed should be put in rows 30 to 36 inches apart.

On the project under observation it was intended to let the sunflowers get fairly well matured, about the same as corn, before putting them in the silo. but as a storm broke them down it was necessary to put them in the silo earlier. The yield was from 30 to 40 tons per acre. Cows fed on sunflower sliage kept up the usual flow of milk as well as those which were fed on the grain silage. Some of the big Holstein cows ate as much as 90 pounds per day. No unfavorable results could be noticed in the flavor of the milk. While this experiment has not gone far enough to reach definite conclusions, it indicates that sunflowers may be considered a good crop for silage in some

FIGURE OUT DAIRY RATIONS

Farmers Given Better Understanding of Value and Cost of Various Feeds Available.

A series of 26 dairy feeding schools were conducted during the spring months in six New Hampshire counties by county agents, working co-operatively with the United States De-Agricultural college. Seven more are planned. In carrying out these schools lecturing and formal talk have been practically eliminated and the dairymen are seated at tables, where they sition of various rations and compute costs. Much enthusiasm has been aroused.

That the results are worth while is indicated by the statement of a Hooksett farmer, who reported a saving of \$1 a day, while another who attended the school at Warner wrote the county agent that he is now saving \$36 a month as a result of feeding a ration that he figured out there. The discussion provoked by the farmers figuring these rations gives a better understanding of the value and cost of the various feeds available than any amount of lecturing could possibly accomplish.

WHITE SCOURS CAUSES LOSS

Disease Contracted by Way of Navel or Mouth Soon After Birth-Tablets Worth Trying.

Many calves die of white scours or pneumo-enteritis, which is a deadly pings will not maintain the maximum germ disease born in the calf and contracted by way of the navel or mouth soon after birth. Medicinal treatment usually falls, but triple sulpho-carholate tablets are well worth trying, under direction of a qualified veterinarian. He should also immunize each new-born calf with polyvalent anti-dysenteric serum and likewise use it in double doses should a case occur. Provide a new clean pen for new-born calves. At birth saturate the stump of the navel of each calf with tincture of lodine and then apply powdered starch. Repeat the treatment daily until the navel is entirely healed. Also cleanse the teats with a saturated solution of boric acid before the calf is allowed to suck for the first time and daily for ten days

RULES FOR FEEDING SILAGE

Good Plan Is to Allow Three Pounds of Material to Every 100 Pounds of Live Weight.

A rule for feeding silnes to the dairy cows is: Feed three pounds of affage for every 100 pounds of live weight. A now weighing 1,000 pounds cow which weights over 1.500 pounds should receive about 45 pounds of silage per day. Silage is usually fel-twice a day, in the morning and eve-

COMMON AILMENTS OF SHEEP

Information Given in Farmer's Bulletin to Enable Owners to Recognize Symptoma.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.) How to recognize and treat the more important diseases and common allments of sheep is told in Farmers' Bulletin 1155, just issued by the United States Department of Agriculture,

While the actual treatment of disease is primarily a matter for veterinarians, the information given in the new bulletin will enable sheep owners to recognize symptoms early in their development and thus avoid losses to their flocks. Altogether 57 kinds of diseases and ailments are discussed.

The sheep industry of the country has suffered severely from the ravages of infectious and noninfectious diseases. In addition to the scientific names, the bulletin gives the common names by which the various diseases are known. A convenient arrangement of cause, symptoms, post-morten appearance, diagnosis, treatment, and prevention makes it possible for sheep owners to obtain a practical knowledge of the best means for preventing and controlling sickness in the flocks. Numerous illustrations add to the the Lenox dance at the Laws clearness of the discussion.

LIQUID MANURE IS VALUABLE

Nitrogen and Potassium Should Be Carefully Preserved and Used for Improving Crops.

The liquid excrement from farm animals contains nearly half the nitrogen and potassium voided by them and should be carefully preserved. When steers are fed on cement floors the value of the manure produced is more than \$4 per year greater for each animal than when fed on earth floors. Open barnyard manure is about one half as valuable as stall manure. The least amount of nitrogen will be lost from stored manure if animals are kept on it or it is kept in a moist, well packed condition. Manure used in connection with continuous cropyield, but when used in connection with crop rotation it increases the yield of all crops grown in that rotation. Manure used in confunction with a complete fertilizer high in phosphorus will give better returns than when either is used alone.

NEEDS OF GROWING ANIMALS

Pigs Thrive Better on Ear Corn and Green Alfaifa Than on Chopped and Ground Feeds.

Ear corn and green alfalfa meet the eeds of growing pigs better, and at less cost, than chopped alfalfa and ground cob and cornmeal. The alfalfa stems and cob meal are better suited to the needs of sheep or cattle. They can handle more fibrous, indigestible matter than pigs.

DISCARD INEFFICIENT HORSE

Indiscriminate Breeding of Small, Unsound, Scrubby Animals Highly Unprofitable.

The light, inefficient horse is undoubtedly destined to be discarded as a factor in American husbandry, and the indiscriminate breeding of small, unsound, scrubby animals will continue to be highly unprofitable if persisted in.







SAND KILLS FOREST THEES

Coos Bay Dunes in Oregon Have Made a Desert of Once Heavily Wooded Land.

In few places is the destruction of forests by sand more impressive than mong the dunes of Coos bay, in southwestern Oregon. Approaching the entrance of Coos bay, one sees to the south a succession of bold headlands covered by forest of fir and spruce, and to the north miles of rolling sand dunes stretching inland like a desert, with patches of willow and beach plants here and there, and in the distance clumps of trees and even large areas of forests making a last stand against the encroaching dunes.

The destruction of the forests there by sifting sands seem all the more remarkable when one considers that the region is excessively humid. One observer reports that in August and September, when he was there, not one day in five was it dry enough and the wind right and strong enough to move the sand. When a dry day comes, however, and the wind is strong from the west, the sand flows at so great a rate that it will cover a six-inch log in the lee of a dune in less than an hour.

The sand laden wind makes carlous etchings on sticks and timber and eventually wears away all the wood except the knots. 

that are made at Home

C INCE the fad for artificial fruits and flowers, used in decorative furnishings, is growing, it is worth while to learn how these pretty things are made. The work, like other fancywork, is more of a recreation than a task and puts bits of finery for the iouse within reach of every one, besides allowing refreshing changes. In the group of small furnishings pletured above there are two basketsmade of paper rope-one filled with fruit and one with flowers, both of nery foliage or in foliage bought with them as lovely as those the shops have the paper.

The fruits, which may be placed in any sort of basket or sultable dish, require wire, crepe paper and colored sealing wax for making them. Wads of cotton, wool batting or crepe paper, rolled into the right size and fastened to a wire stem, are covered with melted sealing wax, which is dripped over them as it melts. They are twirled about to round them, the shape con trolled white the wax is pliable, and dipped in water to cool them. Stems are made by winding the wire with strips of green crepe paper or tissue paper. The grapes are made in green red and purple bunches in the natural color tones. The small apples require two or three colors. After the apple is made in one color, and cooled, it is wiped dry and blts of other, colors droupped on it and blended in over






