FARM LIVE STOCK

MANY DISEASES ARE COSTLY

Three-Fourths of Ailments Which Often Ruin Valuable Herd Can Be Prevented.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Every year the people of the United States lose over \$200,000,000 directly (and no one knows how much indirectly) through the diseases of farm animals. There are five principal causes of disease and death of animals-contagious diseases, sporadic diseases, parasitic troubles, accidents, and neglect. Contagious diseases can be avoided, or at least their consequences greatly diminished, if farmers will learn to co-operate with the United States Department of Agriculture and the various state live stock and sanitary authorities, who are striving to maintain animal "health. Farmers should report promptly to the nearest official any suspicion of the presence of contagious diseases, and they should observe carefully all regulations in regard to quarantine, sanitation, and



the Foot and Mouth Disease.

care of animals, as protection against contagion.

Parasitic diseases also carry off large numbers of valuable animals every year. They are largely the result of improper housing and neglect. The average farmer cannot be expected to have the time and aptitude for study which will keep him apace with the latest developments in feeds and feeding, animal nutrition and medicines, hygiene, and other important matters related to the stock raising industry. He can, however, avail himself of the benefit of the studies and demonstrations of specialists who have devoted their entire time to these subjects. Every state agricultural college maintains a corps of specialists whose publications and services are

available The Department of Agriculture is constantly giving out important information in books and bulletins which may be had on request and in every state the department has representatives combating animal diseases. The wise breeder is ever on the lookout to prevent disease instead of waiting until a cure is necessary.

SPLENDID FEED FOR HOGS

Experiments Have Shown That There Is Nothing Better Than Rape, to Produce Results.

In one experiment lasting 119 days this crop had a value, as forage for hogs, of \$77.87 an acre in replacing concentrates in the ration. corn being valued at \$1.12 a bushel and tankage at \$60 a ton. In addition to this pasture the hogs received a daily grain ration amounting to 2.8 per cent of their live weight.

The crop may be seeded from April to the middle of July, either broadcasted or drilled solid or in rows 24 to 28 inches apart. Five to eight pounds of seed are needed to broadcast an conditions that once did gall. Even as acre, and from two to three pounds if though they were hitched in a harness, the rape is to be grown in rows. On good soil and with early cultivation the crop is ready to be pastured in six to ten weeks from planting.

EXAMINE FEET OF HORSES

Their Condition Is a Marked Factor in the Capacity of the Animals for Work.

In breeding horses, stress should be

laid on having sound, well-shaped feet in both mares and stallions, so as to ensure this desirable quality in their progeny. Poorly shaped, weak and flat feet in the parents, or in one of them. are readily transmitted to the offspring in the same way as any other bad quality. Although poor feet are found most breeds of horses, they are more frequent in certain breeds than in others. This is due largely to climate influences and the nature of the soil. It may be broadly stated that dry, high-lying soil and a comparatively dry climate favors the production of horses with strong, tough, sound, well-proportioned and rather small feet, while horses bred on lowlying, marshy land and in a damp climate have soft, speading and often flat feet of an inferior quality as recards ability to stand work.

DAIRY FACTS

RECORDS OF GREAT BENEFIT

Much Valuable Information on Relations Between Milk and Butterfat Production.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Tabulation of the yearly records of 38.532 cow-testing association cows has brought to light much valuable information on the relations between milk and butterfat production, butterfat test, income over cost of feed, and other factors, say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. The average milk production per cow was 5,980 pounds; butterfat, 246 pounds; butterfat test, 4.11 per cent; income over cost of feed, \$55.69; returns for \$1 expended for feed,

The records show that in those associations where the work has been continued for a long period the production has generally increased from

year to year. As production increased, the income over cost of feed increased rapidly, and for each increase of 50 pounds in butterfat there was an increase of \$15 in income over cost of feed.

Cows that freshened in the fall produced more milk and butterfat and greater average income over cost of feed than those which freshened in the spring or summer. Large cows excelled small cows of the same breed in production of milk and butterfat and in income over cost of feed. As the butterfat test increased, the average production of butterfat advanced and the average production of milk

declined. These records also indicate that cows remain in the herd an average of about 4.7 years.

BETTER-STOCK CAMPAIGN AID

Poster Issued by Department of Agriculture Illustrates Value of

Good Dairy Cows. "For the Children's Sake" is the title of an attractive poster just issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, to be used in its betterstock campaign. The poster shows two cows, each surrounded by pictures of healthy children. Good milk, it is well known, is a health-giving food for children, but scrub cows do not give enough milk to feed many children. One of the animals shown on the poster is a scrub cow which produced about five quarts of milk a dayenough to supply the five children who are grouped about her. The other cow is a purebred, which gave a daily yield of 20 quarts-enough to feed the 20

children surrounding her. "A good dairy cow," says the poster, "produces enough to feed about twenty children a quart of milk a day. An ordinary cow produces enough to feed about five children a quart a day. Every quart of milk contains health

and a smile for some baby." CORN ALONE FOR MILK COWS

It Can Be Used to Better Advantage With Such Feeds as Bran, Meal and Legumes.

With well-filled corn cribs on many farms, and relatively low prices now in effect, the United States Department of Agriculture believes it is time to correct the impression that corn is not good feed for milk cows. Of course, corn cannot be fed alone, as its function is to supply heat, energy, and fat, rather than such elements as make up bone, muscle and the casein in milk But it can be used to advantage along with such feeds as bran, linseed, meal, or cottonseed meal. Bran lightens and helps to balance the ration. Alfalfa or clover is usually fed with corn to supply protein.

COW IS EFFICIENT MACHINE

Animal of Big Value in Converting Farm-Grown Feeds Into High-Priced Products.

The dairy cow, of all farm animals, is our most efficient machine for converting farm-grown feeds into concentrated, high-priced food products, and therefore is entitled to the best of care. She is thin in flesh and naturally more susceptible to cold than most other classes of form stock. If she is compelled to fortify herself against cold, snow, sleet and rain, she must, of course, convert a greater proportion of her feed into heat with which to keep up body temperature, and as a result she becomes less efficient for milk production

May Give Gems Color. If experiments now being carried on at the Reno station of the bureau of mines are successful, says the Mining Congress Journal, it will be possible to give color to colorless gems which exist in abundance in the West. The experiments so far have produced results which are considered promising. The penetrating radiation of radium is the agency through which gems are being colored. In a preliminary experiment, a colorless Colorado topaz was tinted yellow. The coloring when exposed to light was found to be not permanent, and the experimentation continues with a view to making the color light-proof. Successful termination of the experiments would add materially to the value of western gem stones, whose market value is low on account of their lack of the tint qualities deemed essential for gem



Style Lends Itself Well to Rural Surroundings.

Design Shown Here Has Six Big Rooms, Sleeping Porch and Open Porch-Pleasure and Comfort for the Family.



Most people in discussing bungalows are inclined to associate them with the larger cities, towns or suburbs. But they overlook a best bet. There is no reason why the bungalow should not be adaptable for a farm home. In fact, there are many reasons in its favor, the main one being that all of the rooms are on one floor. There is no fatiguing climbing up and down stairs for the farmer's wife and daughters who take care of the housework. Moreover, built as farm homes generally are, low, rambling and comfortable, the bungalow design fits in very well. It offers unlimited opportunity for exterior decoration in the way of flowers and vines, and there is no reason why practically the four sides cannot be surrounded by a great roomy porch.

Such is the case in the house shown in the accompanying illustration, Here we have a low, rambling dwelling house set upon a broad plot of lawn. Around front and side extends a wide open porch approximately 100 feet in length. It makes a wonderful resting place for the men and family after a hard day's work in the field or about the house and a real playground for the children. Two small porches on the opposite side of the house have been made into sleeping porches, giving plenty of healthy sleeping space to the house.

Still another door opens out of the dining room into a short hall in the back of the house, opening on one side to a linen-closet and to two bedrooms and the bathroom. The bathroom ordinarily would not call for any comment, as it is the usual thing in city houses, but this farm home is just as modern as any city home. Here we have a modern bathroom with fixtures, running water and showers. The water supply is made available by a water supply system. Next to the bathroom on the right side is a bedroom, 11 feet 6 inches by 13 feet 6 inches, and across the hall from this room is another bedroom of the same size.

Both of these bedrooms open out on to sleeping porches. The latter are excellent sleeping quarters for the young and growing children, who require plenty of fresh air at all times.

Coming back to the kitchen, we find it opening toto a handy washroom, equipped with a complete set of laundry machinery, froning board, lockers for the workmen's clothes, tubs, etc. This room, which is 10 by 16 feet, is one of the important parts of a farm house. There is always much washing to be done. Labor-saving equipment of the type installed in this home certainly will relieve the women of the household of untold drudgery. Moreover this room serves as a cleaning-up place for the men returning from their work in the fields. Instead of tracking through the kitchen where the wife is trying to prepare a meal, they can step into the washroom and clean up before eating and without messing up any other part of the house. Conveniently adjacent is a toilet equipped with a chemical closet. The stairs to the attic above and to the cellar be-

low start in this section of the house. Considered as a whole this is a very delightful roomy house that will bring infinite pleasure and comfort to any farmer and his family. British Coastguard Stations Will Soon Be Equipped With Guns Firing Peculiar Ammunition.






