GOLD FIND REPORTED IN WHEELER COUNTY

A gold mine has been discovered in Wheeler county, according to a Mr. Timberlake, who lives nine miles east of Shamrock, and upon whose place a shaft has been sunk sixty feet, where it is said a large deposit of both gold and silver has been found.

Several representatives from companies of Colorado and Joplin, Mo., have been to Wheeler county and have spent considerable time in making investigations, and it is said the specimens sent for analysis have been found to contain large amounts of both gold and silver.

One company has made a tentative offer to Mr. Timberlake which looks exceedingly good, as it is reported to be \$50,000 for a lease upon thirty acres of land. He expects the officers of this company to arrive within the next ten days to close up the lease.

All of the people living east of Shamrock are very much excited, and land cannot be bought in that section for any reasonable amount—Amarillo News.

IRISH FREE STATE IS RESULT OF TREATY

The centuries old quarrel between England and Ireland was ended as has been recently hoped, in the small hours of Tuesday morning, by the signature in the Prime Minister's cabinet room of a treaty between Great Britain and Ireland, consisting of eighteen articles, giving Ireland the title of Irish Free State, and the same constitutional status as Canada, Australia and other overseas dominions.

The question of allegiance which up to the last moment threatened to wreck the negotiations, was surmounted by permitting the members of the Irish parliament to swear allegiance to the constitution of the Irish Free State and "be faithful to his majesty, the King."

WHAT TO EAT.

Oyster Stew. Put a pint of oysters in a colander and pour over them cold water to rinse, then pick out the oysters with the fingers to see that there are no bits of shell. Heat three cupsful of milk over hot water; strain into it the oyster liquor and add three tablespoonfuls of butter. Cook the oysters until they are plump and the liquid is thick; add the hot milk, boil up and serve at once.

English Pastry. Meats are put into small pieces a pound of beef, steak; cut in slices a pint of "safestons"; slice three onions. HOW DO YOU SAY IT?

Common Errors in English and How to Avoid Them

"BETWEEN YOU AND I"

"BETWEEN you and I," says the careless speaker. "I do not like that fellow." Probably the speaker has been taught, in school, the rule of grammar which says that in English all prepositions govern the objective case; that is the word which follows a preposition must be in the objective case, but he has forgotten the rule.

Now, "between" is a preposition—a word used before a noun or pronoun to show the relation between the person or thing named and the idea expressed by some other word or phrase in a sentence. And "I" (used incorrectly in the phrase "between you and I") is a pronoun and should not be "I" at all, but "me," since "me" is the objective form of the personal pronoun, first person singular.

All of the above, expressed in simple English, means simply this: Never say "between you and I," but say "between you and me."

BUNGALOW MAKES GOOD FARM HOME

Style Lends Itself Well to Rural Surroundings.

MAKES HOUSEWORK EASIER

Design Shown Here Has Six Big Rooms, Sleeping Porch and Open Porch—Pleasure and Comfort for the Family.

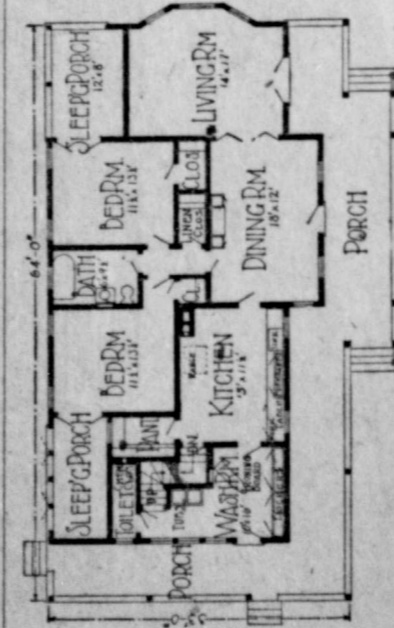

Most people in discussing bungalows are inclined to associate them with the larger cities, towns or suburbs. But they overlook a best bet. There is no reason why the bungalow should not be adaptable for a farm home. In fact, there are many reasons in its favor, the main one being that all of the rooms are on one floor. There is no fatiguing climbing up and down stairs for the farmer's wife and daughters who take care of the housework. Moreover, built as farm homes generally are, low, rambling and comfortable, the bungalow design fits in very well. It offers unlimited opportunity for exterior decoration in the way of flowers and vines, and there is no reason why practically the four sides cannot be surrounded by a great roomy porch.

Such is the case in the house shown in the accompanying illustration. Here we have a low, rambling dwelling house set upon a broad plot of lawn. Around front and side extends a wide open porch approximately 100 feet in length. It makes a wonderful resting place for the men and family after a hard day's work in the field or about the house and a real playground for the children. Two small porches on the opposite side of the house have been made into sleeping porches, giving plenty of healthy sleeping space to the house.

Entrance to the house is gained by a short stairway to the porch, which at this point is extended slightly beyond the main building line. The building is frame in construction, that is, shingle sided, and rests on a concrete foundation.

Opening the front door, the visitor finds himself in the dining room, a large room 18 by 12 feet, large enough for a number of eaters, which are always found on a farm, especially during the busy harvest days. At the right, so-called accordion doors open the way to the living room, of practically equal



size with the dining room and having the advantage of an unusually large bay window with three broad windows facing the roadway. This room also opens out on to the large porch through French doors of artistic design. Everywhere the idea of generous size and comfort is apparent. The living room is 14 by 17 feet.

On the opposite side of the dining room is a door leading to the kitchen, which, by the way, is not like many of the old-style farm kitchens. It is smaller by far but just as complete, in fact a much more efficient workshop and a factor in lightening the duties of the farmer's wife. Grouped about this room in reachable fashion are cupboards, sink, work table and range. It

is but a few steps to the dining room where the meals are served.

Still another door opens out of the dining room into a short hall in the back of the house, opening on one side to a linen closet and to two bedrooms and the bathroom. The bathroom ordinarily would not call for any comment, as it is the usual thing in city houses, but this farm home is just as modern as any city home. Here we have a modern bathroom with fixtures, running water and showers. The water supply is made available by a water supply system. Next to the bathroom on the right side is a bedroom, 11 feet 6 inches by 13 feet 6 inches, and across the hall from this room is another bedroom of the same size.

Both of these bedrooms open out on to sleeping porches. The latter are excellent sleeping quarters for the young and growing children, who require plenty of fresh air at all times.

Coming back to the kitchen, we find it opening into a handy washroom, equipped with a complete set of laundry machinery, ironing board, lockers for the workmen's clothes, tubs, etc. This room, which is 10 by 16 feet, is one of the important parts of a farm house. There is always much washing to be done. Labor-saving equipment of the type installed in this home certainly will relieve the women of the household of untold drudgery. Moreover, this room serves as a cleaning-up place for the men returning from their work in the fields. Instead of tracking through the kitchen where the wife is trying to prepare a meal, they can step into the washroom and clean up before eating and without messing up any other part of the house. Conveniently adjacent is a toilet equipped with a chemical closet. The stairs to the attic above and to the cellar below start in this section of the house.

Considered as a whole this is a very delightful roomy house that will bring infinite pleasure and comfort to any farmer and his family. It is not pretentious by any means but attractive. It demonstrates beyond all shadow of doubt that the bungalow can be used on the farm with very satisfactory results.

SHELL SHIPS TO SAVE THEM

British Coastguard Stations Will Soon Be Equipped With Guns Firing Peculiar Ammunition.

Most people are aware that oil has a remarkable effect on the waves of a stormy sea. Many a ship has been kept afloat in a tempest by her crew pouring overboard part of the oil that formed her cargo.

The reason why oil has this wonderful effect is that it floats upon water, and that it spreads itself into a very thin film over an enormous area. A pint of oil will cover more than an acre of water. This floating film acts as a kind of insulation, preventing the wind from acting fully upon the water. The waves decrease in size, and soon a comparative calm results.

An idea has been developed recently which may result in the saving of numbers of hard-pressed ships. Coastguard stations are to be provided with guns which fire shells filled with oil. If distress signals are seen by the watchers, the gun will be taken to the nearest possible point to the ship. Shells will then be fired, aimed to strike the water ahead and astern of her. As each falls it will burst, allowing its contents to spread over the face of the sea. In this way the ship may be enabled to hold out until the lifeboat can reach her.—London Tit-Bits.

Fine Feat of Engineering.

A remarkable interesting engineering operation was performed in Brooklyn. A large theater building, having walls 90 feet in height was lifted from its foundations, turned squarely around and moved 300 feet to a new site. To turn it, the exact center of the floor was ascertained, and with this as a hub a series of small steel rollers was laid on a prepared platform, and then the building, resting on steel beams, was allowed to settle down on the rollers. With jackscrew on two diagonally opposite corners pushing in opposite directions, the structure was then turned as if on a pivot. The moving of brick buildings is common, but this is said to be the largest and heaviest structure ever has ever been put bodily on foundations.

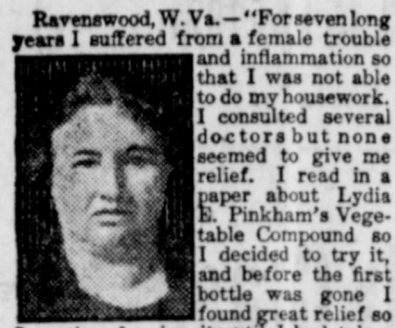

An Englishman, Francis Galton, was the first real weather man. Galton was a cousin of Charles Darwin. He was born in England in 1824. Whether he was really able to forecast rain and sunshine with more accuracy than his successors is an open question; but it is certain that he was the first to attempt the charting, on a large scale, of the progress of the elements of weather. The methods devised by him, in modified form, are used to this day.

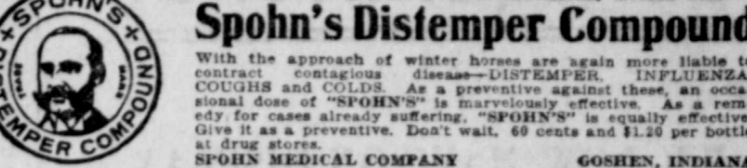

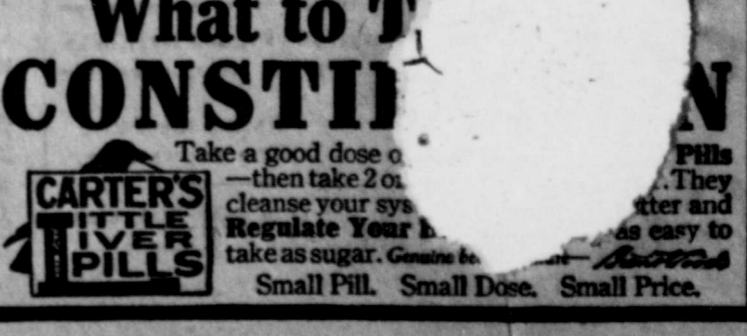

SELL SURPLUS FEEDS TO THE DAIRY COW

Can you think of a better way
of marketing the feeds grown
on the farm than to feed them to
a small herd of high producing
dairy cattle? There is no better
way; for the cow takes alfalfa
hay and all kinds of grain and
converts them into a product for
which there is always a ready
sale. Think how much easier it
is to send the butter fat to the
cream station than to haul the
hay and kafir heads to town and
sell them at a price less than
production cost. And not only
easier, but decidedly more prof-
itable, for it keeps the soil fertil-
ity at home and furnishes a good
ready cash market for the above
farm products, including cheap
roughage and pasture.

Too long have we been content
to ship the substance of our once
fertile soil in the form of hay and
grain to enrich the land in some
far distant state, or in a foreign
country. Texas with her God
given resources has built many
a nice red barn and made many
rich acres on the dairy farms of
sunny Holland; both of these we
need more of—right in our
own fair state. We have shipped
our cheap grain to these coun-
tries, paying transportation on
it: through the dairy cow they
have manufactured it into high
priced butter and shipped it
back to us. We also paid the
freight on shipping the butter
back here, and they kept the fer-
tility to enrich the soils of their
country, for they knew that a
fertile soil means a prosperous
and contented people. Is that
sound business on our part?

Suppose we had a large sum
of money invested in a factory
which was capable of producing
some kind of high priced life
sustaining food, and that we al-
ready had the raw material on
hands sufficient to manufacture
thousands of dollars worth of
this finished product, even tho'
we were obliged to make some
few repairs, would it pay us to
sell our raw material for less
than cost price, or make the few
necessary repairs and put out
the finished product?

This is our problem here. We
have the valuable land and the
raw material for the production
of butter and butter fat; we have
a few dairy cows, but not enough.
If we sell this grain, or raw ma-
terial, we must take less than it
cost us, besides the wear and
tear on our equipment. But we
can get its cost, plus a profit, by
selling it in the form of butter
and cream, provided we feed it
to good high producing cows.

Which practice shall we follow
in the future?
