A French transatlantic steamship company was the first to experiment with the radiogoniometer invented by Bellini and Tosi. By means of this apparatus the direction of an invisible vessel, sailing along a coast and emitting wireless signals, can be determined from two stations on the shore and its course can be accurately mapped. APPETIZING USES FOR VARIOUS CUTS OF PORK TO ADD VARIETY

Pork is one of the most widely used meats. In China, for example, pork is the staple flesh food; in this country it constitutes a large part of the meat used in the farming districts. Naturally where hogs are slaughtered on the farm use is made of all cuts of the pork, but persons who purchase meat from the markets are likely to limit their selection to chops, roasts,

The following suggestions made by the United States Department of Agriculture may be of help both to those who buy their pork at the market and to the farmers who may be glad to secure greater variety in the use of their home product.

There is no marked difference in the tenderness of the different cuts of pork, but the meat from the fore quarter is somewhat coarser grained than that of the loin and hams, and the proportion of fat to lean is greater.

Shoulders well-trimmed and smoked are satisfactory to use in place of ham. if offered at a price low enough to offset the larger amount of bone which they contain. The thick end of the shoulder is known as the Boston butt. Shoulders are sometimes boned, rolled and smoked. Since there is practically no waste to this cut, the real cost can readily be estimated. Smoked hams and shoulders are commonly belled, but both are excellent when baked, fried or broiled.

No matter what the method of preparation, all pork should be thoroughly cooked.

Baked Smoked Ham or Shoulder. Wash the ham or shoulder well, over with cold water and simmer for about three hours for medium-sized about 15 minutes per pound when followed by baking. Allow it to cool in the broth or remove at once, trim off the brown crust and remove the skin. Smear the surface well with brown sugar, stick it liberally with cloves, using perhaps one to each covered roaster. Remove cover and brown the fat side well. Serve either



Again you may make the mistake of buying a young boar and start using him without trying him out. In selecting a herd boar, three things should be considered, individuality, ancestry and if an aged animal, his offspring. In considering the individual, of course type, quality, bone, masculinity and size for age are the main things to consider. The prospective purchaser should always insist on seeing the sire and dam, and as many of the close relatives as possible. By so doing, one gets a good idea of what he can expect from the boar when he is mated to suitable females. Of course, the surest buy is to buy the aged boar which has been tried, and in considering him, one should always insist on seeing as many of his offspring as possible. Here one has a

sure check of what the boar will do. It has been said that, "A good sire is half the herd, but a poor sire is all of it." No statement is more true

#### FEEDING MINERALS TO HOGS

Farmers Believe It Assists Growth and Development as Well as Promoting Digestion.

It has been well said that nobody has very much really practical scientific knowledge about feeding minerals to hogs, but most farmers believe that it does assist growth and development, as well as promotes digestion, so there you are. Probably the best form in which to feed it is in ordinary fine ground raw bone, but some use rock phosphate, claiming equally good results. A common mixture is salt, copperas, glauber salts, sulphur and charcoal mixed with ground bone, a combination that is not highly scientific, but probably satisfies the feeder who feels that he must use something of the kind. The best method of feeding this is in combination with tankage and in such amount that a 100-pound pig may get half an ounce of it in

Crop Rotations.

Finding a grower who is convinced that clover is essential in crop rotations is as easy as finding quack grass, but finding one who knows all about growing the crop without fail-ure is as hard as finding four-leaf clover itself. When we do reach that "four-leaf clover" fellow he is quite apt to insist that the four leaves stand for phosphate, lime, manure and inoc-ulation. Hence all public agencies engaged in agricultural advancement are bent upon solving the solution of clov-

PUREBRED FEMALES GAIN

Rapid Improvement of Live Stock Brought About by "Better Sires-Better Stock" Campaign.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

When farmers adopt purebred sires to head their herds and flocks it is not long before the percentage of purebred females increases noticeably. This encouraging tendency toward more rapid improvement of live stock has been brought out by the United States Department of Agriculture in the "Better



Use of Purebred Females Is on Rapid Increase.

Sires-Better Stock" campaign. Of a total of more than 300,000 female animals listed by farmers who have agreed to keep nothing but purebred sires, more than 35 per cent are of pure breeding. On these farms scrubs have practically disappeared. For the larger animals the reports show that only 2.4 per cent of the females are scrubs and, of course, the males are of pure blood as that is the basis on which

The poultry flocks owned by these farmers are particularly well bred, only 1-3 per cent of the female birds being listed as scrubs. More than 68 per cent of a total of 610,000 birds are entered on the list as standardbred. Among the herds of swine there are very few scrub sows-only 1.1 per cent. Nearly two-thirds of them are purebred.

This federal-state effort to improve the live stock and poultry of the country has now brought in a membership campaign that represents nearly a million head of animals and poultry. Farmers who have become members have sent in interesting accounts of their experiences in improving their animals and their bank accounts. Other farmers who are taking part in the work are invited by the department to send in their individual experiences as well as those of community organizations engaged in the improvement ures should be included whenever no sible.

#### Occasionation of the contraction Big Disease Factors

Dirty cows, stables and utensils are the prime factors in distribution of pathogenic or disease producing organisms through milk. There are few dairy herds in which there is not a case or two of garget each year. In every case investigated during an Illinois survey the milk from cows having garget contained germs which cause stomach and intestinal diseases and general sickness.

Garget or mammitis is almost invariably induced by infections of the urinary tract and uterus. When a cow lies down in dirty stables and barnyards her udder rests on the ground and the germs become lodged in the teat openings where they multiply rapidly.

#### RIGHT FEEDING FOR CALVES

Number of Times a Day Varies With Different Dairymen-Temperature is important.

The number of times a day to feed the calf varies with the different dairymen. For the first three or four weeks some men feed the calves three times a day. This is an excellent practice, but many do not give proper attention to the temperature of the milk, particularly at now. This milk is often given cold and it would be far better to feed only twice a day and have the milk at proper temperature than to feed three times a day and have noon milk cold.

Value of Protein Feed.

Realizing the value of more protein in the feed mixture for dairy cous, more dairymen than ever before, says L. V. Wilson, dairy specialist, are putting in some soy beans with their silage corn or are sowing the beans for an emergency hay crop.

Calves Need Much Water. Calves should have all the water they want to drink. They will not drink very much at a time but if it is before them all the time they will drink considerable in a day.
