



DAIRY FACTS

TANK HEATERS ARE FAVORED

When Milk Cows Are Watered Infrequently It Is Poor Policy to Supply Ice Water,

When a cow drinks water, her body at once sets to work raising it, if necessary, to the same temperature as exists normally in the body. In order to warm the water taken in, heat is just as necessary as it is to warm a kettle of water on the stove.

To provide the heat necessary, the blood and internal organs give up a portion of their supply until more is supplied from food previously consumed. As the milk cow is a heavy consumer of water, much heat is required to warm it. Consequently when cows are allowed to drink water that is very cold, a high percentage of the feed eaten is required to heat it. If It is true that some heat is being given off from the body all the time and when the amount of water taken in at one time is small the loss is unimportant. But when the cows are watered only once or twice daily, and then get near ice water, they are likely to suffer injury and more feed is necessary. Stated briefly, it is a question of balancing good feed and the cow's time digesting it, against the cost of a good tank heater and a few pails of cobs or coal. The man interested in getting the most out of his cows and in their comfort will not expect them to be their own tank

SILAGE READY WHEN NEEDED

Mistaken Idea to Think That Certain Time Must Elapse Before Feeding to Stock.

What is the best time to begin feeding silage, is a question which is interesting many dairy farmers.

The specialists on live stock feeding say that the time to begin using silage is when the dairyman needs it; they feel there is no justification for the idea that a certain time must elapse between the filling of the silo

and opening it for use. Experiments made at the state colleges of the country indicate that fermentation starts almost as soon as the corn is placed in the silo, and that the greatest change takes place during the first five days after filling. After 12



Fermentation of Silage Is Complete After Twelve Days.

days, fermentation is practically complete, and the silage undergoes very little modification after two weeks. Some farmers do not know that silage will keep for a long time. Experiments indicate that silage is as palatable after several years as that which has been kept only a few

months. Although moldy sliage apparently does not injure mature cows, it has been found to affect the health of calves and horses. To be on the safe side, careful farmers discard the moldy silage from the top of the silo.

REAL VALUE OF DAIRY COW Most Reliable Method Is to Figure

Her Actual Butterfat Production by Weight.

The most reliable way of getting at the real value of a dairy cow is to figure her actual butterfat production. This can be done by weighing the milk produced by each cow and by determining the per cent of butterfat through occasional tests of the milk with a Babcock tester.

COMPARATIVE COST OF COWS

Cheaper to Milk and Feed One Animal Giving Large Yield Than It Is for Three Scrubs.

It is much cheaper to milk and care for one cow giving 300 pounds of butterfat in a year than it is to milk and care for three cows giving 100 pounds of butterfat each, and if the 300-pound cow is heavily fed she will not eat as much as the three 100-pound



VARIETIES OF SWEET POTATOES AND THEIR USES IN HOUSEHOLD



Sweet Potatoes May Be Served in Some Form in Almost Any Course in a Menu.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Sweet potatoes, although of tropical origin, are now grown in large quantities in the United States. According to figures for 1921, more than 98,000,000 bushels, valued at over \$86,000,000, were produced in this country. Naturally the climate of the Southern states is better suited to this crop than the shorter growing season of the North, but, with early planting, sweet potatoes um oven 25 to 30 minutes, are grown successfully as far north as southern Michigan.

The United States Department of Agriculture has recently made a study of the different varieties of sweet potatoes now grown in the United States, and has classified them in eight groups. varieties having special characteristics, while the list of names by which minor | Escalloped Sweet Potatoes and Meat. varieties are known runs into the hun-

Sweet potatoes vary in shape and size from slender banana-shaped roots the nickname of "underground squash" sometimes applied to them.

The texture, flavor and color of the flesh of sweet potatoes range from dry, mealy ones of whitish color and low sugar content, to julcy, pumpkin-colored kinds from which sweet sirup oozes during the baking.

Sweet Potato Puff. 2 pounds of sweet 2 teaspoonfuls of butter.
Whites of 2 eggs. 1/2 teaspoonful of salt.

Boil and mash sweet potatoes. Add butter, salt and stiffly beaten whites of eggs. Pour into buttered baking dish or custard cups. Bake in a medi-

Baked Sweet Potatoes (Special). Bake six medium-sized sweet potatoes and cut them in halves lengthwise. Scoop out the inside and season it with salt, pepper and butter, and moisten with milk. Cover the bottom of a buttered baking dish with cooked sliced sweet potatoes, cover with a layer of cold meat, either ground or chopped; add another to those so large and thick as to merit layer of sweet potatoes; season with salt, pepper and butter, or meat fryings. MARKETING METHODS IMPROVED IN SOUTH

Women Ship in Weekly Eggs Graded and Guaranteed.

No One Thinks of Shipping Poultry Money Made in Selling Pre-

Without First Fattening It-Much serves and Jelly.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Acting upon the advice of extension workers, South Carolina women have made steady advances in standardizing the products they offer for sale and in increasing their output. For example, in Charleston county, starting with one woman two years ago, there are now over 70 women shipping in weekly their graded and guaranteed eggs. Two years ago no one thought of fattening poultry before sending to market. Today no one thinks of sending poultry to market without first fattening it. The women realize as never before that a standard-bred fowl produces higher-priced eggs and market poultry than a mongrel. The improve-ment in preserving is also marked. Two years ago only one woman produced really standard preserves and jelly. Now there are nine who can for market and many others who put up a few dozen to sell. The original woman who sold preserves has so developed her business that she has built a factory and has planned for an output of 10,000 containers. The members of the local home demonstration club assist her and in this way not only make pocket money for themselves but im-prove their own work, and in a few years the entire community bids fair to be well known for its specialized products. The number of dozen eggs sold, as reported to the extension agent, is 8,142, and the pounds of poultry, 19,667. The value of canned goods actually sold is \$512, and the total amount of all products is \$8,-

In the state last year approximately 5,000 containers of such standardized products as Dixle burgoo, pine bark fish stew, Brunswick stew, soup mixture, blackberry jam, fig preserves, plum jelly, grape juice, artichoke reiish, and butter were put on the mar-ket through the South Carolina Home Producers' association. This year con-tracts have been signed for about 200,

Grapefruit Jelly.

Grapefruit jelly is made by following the directions for making bitter orange jelly, with the exception that for each pound of fruit taken three-quarters pound of sugar is added. These directions are given by the United States Department of Agriculture.
