From a sheer dollar standpoint, it would have been good business. However, there were many other things which figured into such action.

If passed, the bill will proide additional state funds in more places than just the lead !it would probably bring about a re-organization of Bovina Schools.

For instance, it would provide for one full-time principal, something Bovina's never had. This would probably cause more grades, maybe from seventh grade up, to be under that principal who would have no classroom duties, as such, and would attend to administrative duties only.

Also, Morton says, under the proposed bill, our school would be entitled to more teachers, "which we need."





Cotton, being a warm weather crop, needs a high soil temperature before it will germinate and it will just naturally sprout faster on the ridge, say farmers who have been planting this way for several years.

There are supposedly advantages and disadvantages to both ridge and furrow planting, but Wendol Christian, an Oklahoma Lane farmer who has been planting on the ridge for several years, says that there is really no disadvantage to ridge plant-

Christian cites the soil temperature as an important factor, and he also lists several other points which make this type of planting more desirable.

Even though irrigating of early cotton is not a recommended practice, there are times, such as a dry spring like this one, when the crop needs a little water to help it along. By planting on the ridge, it is possible to water between the rows, thus giving the cotton some badly- advantageous in this respect held in the Oklahoma Lane Com-

Christian, who has been planting on the ridge for several years, says that this is the first year he has found the planting method he really wanted. He says that the knife planter, "something that our fathers used," solved a couple of his problems.

Previously, even though he had planted on the ridge, Chriswhich is a disc-type rather than a knife planter. The disc-planter, while effective, still left something to be desired, he

It has been the custom to attribute the condition to a high fever but too many of the children are uncooperative -- no

Shoemen seek an answer to the question because good customers are lost when parents blame shoes for the occurrence. If a certain shoe was responsible, most of the children who wear that kind of shoes would develop the weakness. That just doesn't happen.

The most acceptable reason is that periods of weakening and strengthening should be expected because children's feet grow in spurts. Growth of a size or a size-and-a-half is usually followed by a period of slow growth or no growth at all. We believe that rapid growth causes the weakness which is overcome by exercise during the period of slow growth. That may not be the whole answer or the correct answer but it sure beats the high fever story and being told by the mother that her child has been disgustingly healthy.




