At Twenty-one Richard Le Gallienne Received His First Commission.

AT THIS age came my first commission, from Mr. John Lane, to write a book on John Meredith. I had at this time said good-by to the accountant's office where I had been working, rented an old loft in an ancient office building in Liverpool and seriously, as they used to say, 'commenced author.'

I would hardly venture upon the task now, but one is afraid of nothing at twenty-one. So I wrote the book for Mr. Lane and, as a result of it, went up to London. It chanced that just at that moment one of our 'T. P.'s (T. P. O'Connor) earliest successes, the Star, was about to lose one of its most valued contributors. Mr. Clement Shorter, his column on 'Books and Bookmen' was vacant and open to competition. I took my fling at it, fearfully, as one should essay some inaccessible flight. But, one incredible afternoon it was announced to me that I had been chosen to fill the giant's robe. I was to be paid for writing every Thursday about the books I loved; I was to have my pick of all the books that came into the office—and yet I was to be paid.—Richard Le Gallienne.

THE WHY OF SUPERSTITIONS
By H. IRVING KING

OVER THE LEFT

AMONG children it is common after making a false statement to say "over the left." This is frequently uttered in so low a tone that the person addressed cannot hear it; but in the child's mind the "over the left" takes away, or neutralizes, the sin of the lie. If the words are uttered so as to be heard the hearer at once knows that the statement just made is not to be taken as a true one. Among adults, too, the words "over the left" are not infrequently added to a statement to convey the idea that it is to be taken in just an opposite sense; for instance, they change a laudatory statement into a sarcastic comment.

The idea of the power of magical inversion in "over the left" comes entirely from the primitive superstition with regard to right hand and left hand—an idea applied by extension to the right and left of the entire body. The idea, in brief, is that as the right hand is the "right" hand to do things with, the left hand consequently the wrong one. It naturally follows that good resides on the right and evil on the left.

In former times the words "over the left" were considered much more seriously by adults than they are now and believed capable of changing a blessing into a very potent curse. In 1765 one David Waters, having lost a suit in the court at Hartford, Conn., said to the bench as he left the room: "What a curse you all—over the left shoulder!" The court took expert testimony from the bench from the two ministers of the two Hartford churches who declared that Waters had uttered "the words of a curse the most terrible that can ordinarily be used." "Whereupon the culprit was heavily fined."

WHO SAID

"O would I were a boy again,
When life seemed formed of sunny years,
And all the heart then knew of pain,
Was wept away in transient tears!"

MARK LEMON, one of the great British humorists of the past century and the author of the lines quoted, is chiefly remembered in the United States as one of the foremost foreign critics and detractors of President Abraham Lincoln, during the Civil war.

Lincoln and Lemon were born in the same year and died within five years of each other. Until the former's death the latter never missed an opportunity to ridicule his handling of the affairs of the United States. When Lincoln died, however, and the wisdom of his course had become apparent, Mark Lemon was one of the first to pen an apology for his criticism. This is in the form of a poem and its obvious sincerity and easy style make it worth reading.

In addition to being a humorous writer Mark Lemon was well known in his day as a capable playwright. During his lifetime he supplied the London stage with more than 60 farces, melodramas and comedies. When the magazine Punch was established in 1841 Lemon became joint editor with Henry Mayhew, and later he was sole editor of the publication. It was in this satirical paper that most of Lemon's jibes at Lincoln were published.

Lemon also achieved some success as a free-lance writer. He contributed to the Illustrated London News, to Dickens' Household Words, Once a Week, and other periodicals. Among his later works are several novels of average merit. Of all Lemon's works his claim to fame rests most securely upon his work as editor of Punch.—Wayne D. McMurray.

Mother's Cook Book
HEALTHFUL DISHES

MOTHERS of families should remember to serve onions freely to the whole family, especially to the children. As a seasoning or flavor vegetable, the onion is invaluable, and served as a vegetable at least twice a week, the family will keep in the best of health.

Cream of Onion Soup.
Heat a quart of milk, add two tablespoonfuls of butter and two of flour that have been cooked together, and two cupfuls of cooked onions that have been mashed and put through a strainer. Season with salt, cayenne and a bit of grated cheese. Serve hot with croutons.

Celery Sandwiches.
Mix one cupful of finely chopped celery with one cupful of chopped Jonathan apples and one cupful of chopped English walnut meats. Mashed with mayonnaise. Spread between thin slices of nut bread. Serve with cold roast pork, chicken or turkey.

Onion Salad.
Slice a Spanish onion quite thin, cover with French dressing, adding a teaspoonful of tomato catsup, salt, cayenne, a little vinegar or lemon juice.

Sauce for Fish.
Add grated horseradish to season, to one cupful of thick sour cream. Season with salt, a dash of cayenne and sugar, beat until well-blended and serve with fish, either boiled, steamed or canned salmon.

Conservation of Texas Waters.

Nature is wise in her provision for man, but man is wasteful in the use of nature's gifts. A few years ago the streams of Texas were regarded as valuable only for providing water for stock and fishing for idlers. Since Texas has become a farming country we find that we need the waters of every stream for irrigating our fertile valleys. The corporations are seeing the great value in these waters that are now going to waste and they are bidding for "water rights" along Texas rivers. The people should be slow to part with these rights, for the result will be that in time they will merely be farming for the corporations that will exact every cent for water that the farmers can pay. Great storage reservoirs should be built wherever possible, but they should belong to the people who own the adjacent lands and not to corporations. Texas needs a constitutional provision safeguarding its waters from corporate control, otherwise the streams will soon be under the control of exacting corporate interests of whom the land owners will virtually be enslaved.

Irrigation Districts the Remedy.

Whatever corporations are able to do, the people themselves can do under good management. Instead of giving the streams of Texas to private or corporate interests for the exploitation of land owners, the laws should be so amended that only the people who own lands may use the water. They may organize irrigation districts under existing laws, but individuals and corporations are on equal footing with land owners, and the public is slow to vote bonds for irrigation projects. Our laws governing water control have not been written with a view to the liking of those who want to acquire this great source of wealth. As the laws now stand, unless the streams are soon saved to the people by the organization of irrigation districts, our waters will soon pass into the ownership of corporations from which it will be impossible to wrest them. Right now greedy speculators have their eyes on every stream in Texas and are using every effort to get possession of them.

Texas Needs a New Constitution.

The constitution of Texas is out of date. It was framed for a country almost without population and that needed but few laws. Lands were then worth very little and exploitation of the public by individuals and corporations was almost unknown. Public office was regarded as a public trust and not as a private snap. The State officials, and especially the governor, were given large authority in the belief that such authority would not be abused. The powers of the governor have been increased from time to time by legislative enactment until he has, through his appointive boards and commissions, almost entire control of the State government. During his term of office he is an almost unrestrained dictator, able to bring to the strength of the State government to carry out his will, whether it be good or bad. Texas is in the unenviable position of being at the mercy of its governing head. We have exalted official rights and privileges and have lowered those of the individual. Texas needs a new declaration of principles and a constitution for their enforcement that will restore the ordinary citizen to his former rights as a citizen and that will make its officials servants of the people and not their masters.

Hi-Jacking a Popular Profession.

Crime in every form appears to have become a popular pastime in Texas. We no longer speak of a "crime wave," but now have a "crime inundation." Criminals no longer fear grand juries, stand in awe of courts, or are terrorized by prisons. All these apparently are accepted as the possible consequences of the business, retarding it temporarily at times, but not seriously handicapping it. Criminals serve terms or are pardoned merely to resume their chosen life work, and a few influential friends with money may almost insure escape from punishment for crime of any kind.

Crime Should Be Punished.

The public has become too lax in law enforcement; too much sympathy is being shown convicts. So-called "prison reform" methods have resulted in a maudlin sentiment that has given encouragement to crime. Prisoners are no longer reformed, but spend their short terms in prison studying new methods in their profession. Prisons have become crime schools, open forums in the discussion of methods, under the leadership of the most expert in their several lines. The most seasoned criminals among them are the greatest heroes. We need to cultivate mercy, but in failing to punish crime we are lending it public support.

The World Gets Better.

Those who read the crime reports often conclude that the world is going to the bow-wows. Despite the boldness with which crime is committed, the criminals are comparatively few in number. The vast majority of people are improving in intellect, in morals, in religion, in all things that go to make the world better. The world is a happier place in which to live than it was a half century or so ago; the people get more joy out of life than they once did. They are doing more to make others happy

TEXAS NEWS

Farming has been very much delayed in Waller County due to continued rains.

Heavily weighted with young buds, fig trees in East Texas promise a prolific yield of fruit this year.

This week is designated in a proclamation issued by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson as "Be Kind to Animals Week."

Strawberries are moving from Alvin now in large quantities, more than 250 crates going out by local express in one day. The berries are large and of fine quality.

Construction of an 18-foot concrete highway involving an expenditure of \$1,200,000, for 35 miles across Liberty County, is well under way, states Judge E. B. Pickett, Jr., of Liberty County.

Interest received by the state on funds deposited in state and reserve banks in 1925 amounted to \$256,000, W. Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer, says. He predicts the interest will be greater this year.

An ordinance putting in effect a 7-cent street car fare and giving the Dallas Railway Company 10 days in which to accept it was passed by the city commission recently. The fare heretofore has been 6 cents.

A survey of 20 tomato farms where tomatoes are being grown for the market near Palestine, shows that the plants now in the fields are getting a good start in growth, and that the recent cold spell did very little damage, if any.

During the cotton season of 1925-26 the Texas prison system produced 10,500 bales of cotton which was sold for \$903,134, according to a report compiled by George B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture, and released Saturday.

A "normal boll weevil" season is anticipated by H. H. Schultz, federal statistician for Texas. He has just issued a warning to farmers in the coastal region to prepare for a "comparatively light initial infestation" of the weevil.

No damage has resulted this season to the bean crop in the Lower Rio Grande Valley from freezes, and present indications are that with continued good weather yields above the average may be looked for from the 4200 acres planted.

Nearly one-fourth of the corn crop in Nacogdoches County will have to be planted over because of the killing frost recently, according to reports reaching the office of County Agent Montague at Nacogdoches. The freeze did not injure the fruit.

Potatoes were moving out of the Lower Rio Grande Valley toward the close of the past week at the rate of more than 20 carloads a day, with expectations of the shipments this year reaching a total of 1300 cars, including mixed carlot shipments.

Friends of long ago, some of whom, as early settlers of Texas, prepared the way for the state's millions of inhabitants today, will be reunited at San Antonio April 19, to live for a day in the memories of the past. The occasion will be the eighth annual meeting of the State Association of Texas Pioneers.

In the Texas prison system there are 3560 inmates, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson was informed last week by prison commission. Of the inmates 27 are in asylums and 357 are in the main prison at Huntsville. The distribution on prison farms is as follows: Ramsey, 513; Blue Ridge, 303; Clemens, 298; Darrington, 188; Eastham, 294; Ferguson, 141; Goree, 67; Harlem, 286; Imperial, 348; Retrieve, 189; Shaw, 135; Senior, 18; Wynne, 111, and Oil Mill, 154.

The state board of control has completed the awarding of contracts for supplying approximately \$100,000 worth of dry goods and notions for the various state eleemosynary institutions for a period of three months. The prices paid for the merchandise are practically the same as were paid under a previous contract of three months.

By refusing a writ of error in the case of the International-Great Northern Railroad Company against the Texas Company, of Houston, the Supreme Court in effect upheld a judgment obtained in the District Court at Austin by the Texas Company against the railroad for upward of \$300,000 on a claim for fuel oil supplied the railroad.

Increase in quantity and improvement in the quality in the oyster industry of Texas, is the goal of the game, fish, and oyster commission. Judge J. R. Smith, chief deputy, stated at Austin at a conference with George Britz and Glen R. Peck, both of Galveston, deputies in charge of scientific investigation of the oyster industry on the coast.

Income tax receipts of the first quarter of 1926 on incomes of 1925, a drought year in Central Texas, showed an increase of \$1,191,105 over the receipts for the same quarter, of 1925, according to records announced by James W. Lass, collector of internal revenue for the first district of Texas, which embraces more than one-half of the state. The unexpected increase indicates "healthy" conditions and prosperity regardless of the drought losses to farmers and business interests generally, in the opinion of Collector Lass.

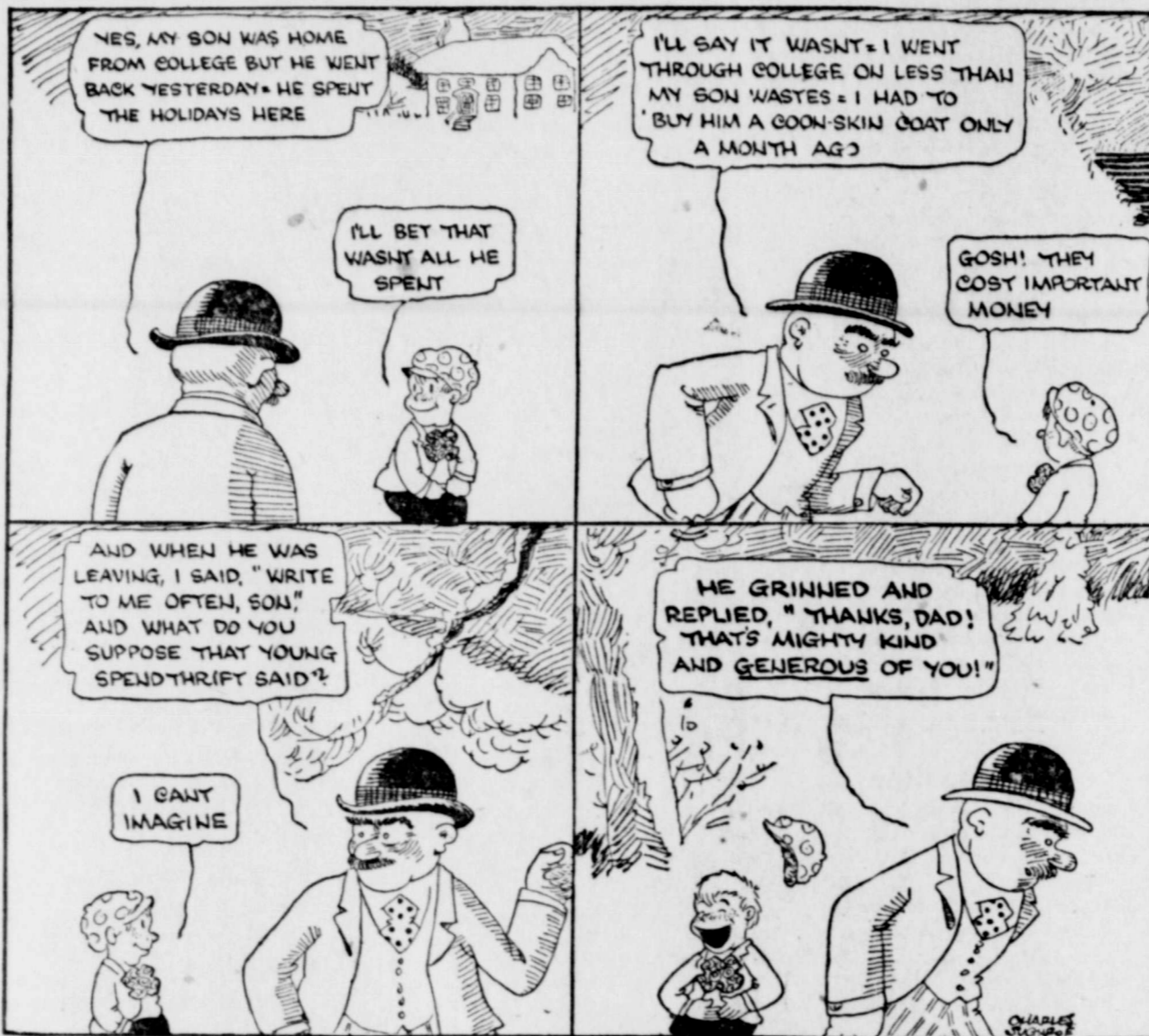

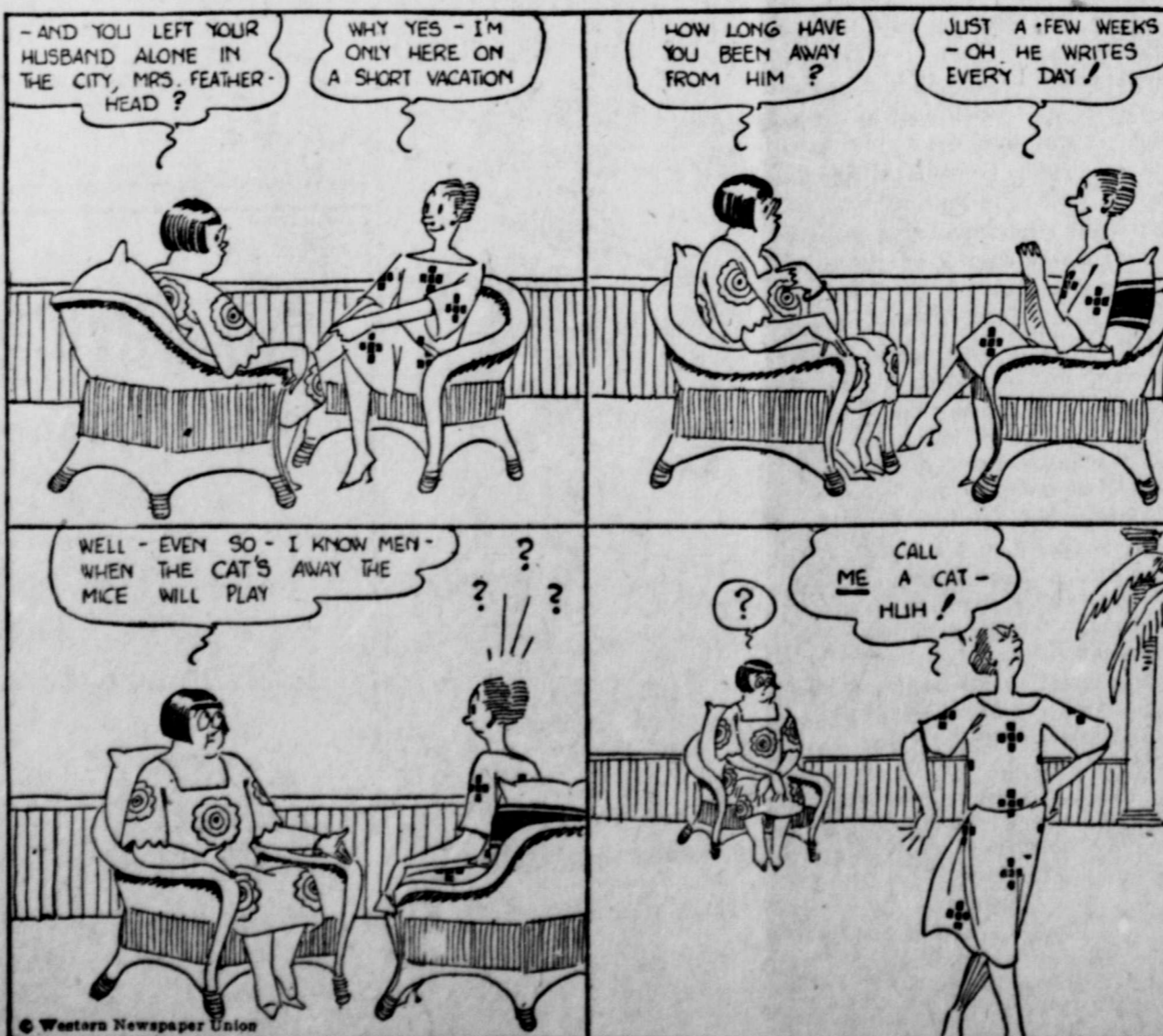

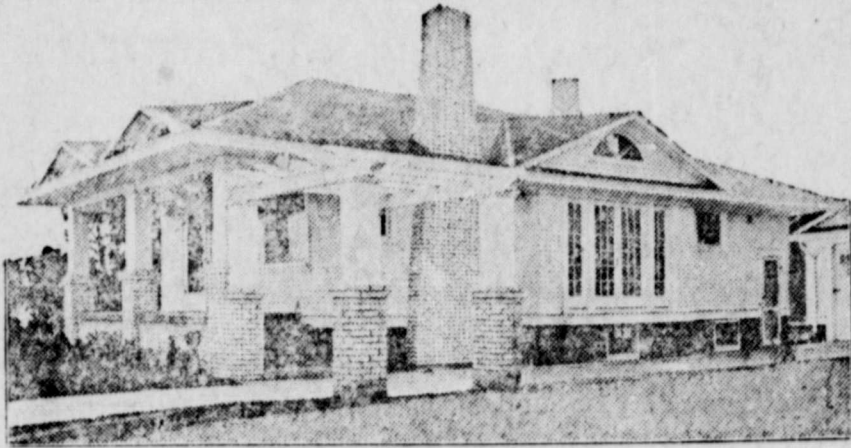

modern Design Especially important for the One-Story House

Many people prefer the one-story or bungalow type of home and it possesses many advantages, especially for the housekeeper who must do all her own work. Eliminating the need of numerous trips up and down stairs during the course of the day certainly saves much energy and when properly designed the bungalow has an air of coziness that is particularly appealing.

In planning a one-story home, however, care should be taken to avoid the natural tendency to spreading and irregular shapes which often materially increases the cost of building to an extent out of proportion to results obtained. Compactness is a prime virtue in the modern house and it is especially important in the bungalow. Rectangular forms are always the most compact and the more closely they approach the square the greater space is obtained in proportion to construction cost.

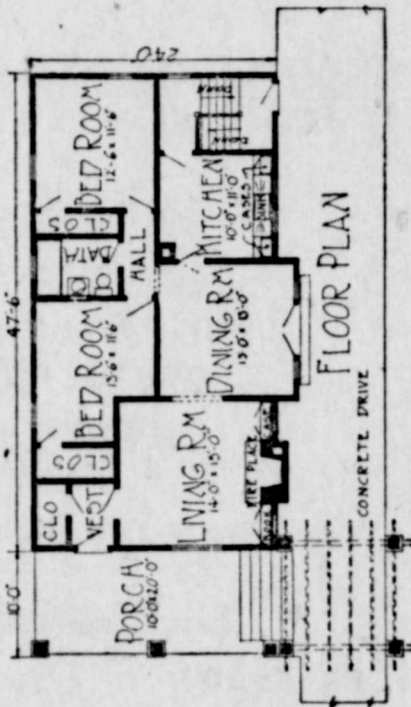
This plan shows a house which has a slight projection of the dining room, but otherwise conforms to the rectangular form. It is adapted to the long narrow lot, being 47 1/2 feet deep, exclusive of the porch, and only 24 feet wide. It is walled with drop siding and set on a concrete foundation of sufficient height to give full basement windows. The open porch is also of concrete with brick foundation and pillars of brick and wood. The chimneys are of brick and the plain, tapering line of the fireplace chimney is particularly attractive, while the wide eaves add to the cozy effect and tie the house closely to the lot.

A combined walk and drive leads to the front porch and the garage at the rear. The porch steps are at the side, while the front entrance is at the other end of the porch. It leads into a vestibule off of which there is a large and convenient coat closet. This is an advantage which is frequently omitted in the present-day house, but is worth the space which it occupies. The vestibule affords an entrance which prevents a gust of cold wind sweeping into the living room when the front door is opened in the winter time and the coat closet affords an opportunity to dispose of snowy wraps.

The living room is nearly square, with a bookcase-flanked fireplace at one side. Over the bookcase are small windows and one large window is placed in the front wall. Opposite this window is the arched doorway opening into the dining room. This room also is square in shape and is made cheerful by French windows filling almost the entire wall space at one side.

Back of the dining room is the kitchen, small and compact, in accordance with the accepted modern idea. It is lighted by two windows over the sink and this sink is flanked by built-

in cupboards. Still farther to the rear is a back entrance vestibule containing also the basement stairs. This vestibule is perfectly designed for placing the refrigerator, which could well be built in with a provision for filling from the outside.

Access to the sleeping quarters is from the dining room. A door opens into a hallway off of which there are two bedrooms and the bathroom. The bathroom is most conveniently placed between the two bedrooms and each of the latter is supplied with an unusually large closet. One modification in the plan might well be made here. A portion of the rear bedroom closet could be used for a linen closet with hall entrance without greatly reducing the size of the bedroom closet.

Shingle Most Typically American of Materials

Architecturally the shingle is the most typically American of all materials excepting, perhaps, logs. It is particularly applicable in designs of a Colonial flavor. Moreover, with its aid, by the use of broad weathering and double coursing, the apparent height of a house can be materially lessened to enhance its artistic appeal.

The all-shingle covering is adequate from every point of view. But, more than that, an all-shingle home is a vital part of the landscape. It grows out of its surroundings. Its velvety, tapestry-like exterior harmonizes perfectly with the beauty of foliage and flowers. Clinging vines and ramblers attach themselves to it lovingly, and all growing things accept it as a comrade.

In short, an all-shingle home has character. There is about it no suggestion of the artificial. It stands not as a challenge to the neighborhood, but as an expression of good will and friendliness. Its shingled surfaces are, to the exterior, what an open hearth is to the interior; and, however simple the design, they never fail to inspire a sense of real home cheer.

Rubber Bands Take Up Shock of Hammer Blow

Hammers lined with rubber in the opening that fits onto the handle so that the shock of the blows is absorbed, have been placed on the market. Gripping the handle firmly in the socket, the rubber cushion takes up the jar of the blow before it can reach the hand of the person using the tool. Extreme tests are said to have proved the efficiency of the idea.

Gray Is Pleasing Color for Furniture Environment

Walls painted gray make an attractive background for the furnishings of the room. By using a gray paint produced by mixing red and green pigments together you can materially assist the electric luminaries which light the room. Gray, thus prepared, has high light reflecting properties, while gray made from white paint and lamp black does not possess this virtue.

Gumwood Used for Oak, Birch to Save on Cost

Gumwood is rapidly taking the place of oak and birch in small homes or apartments, or in any buildings where the builder wishes to keep the cost down as low as possible.

We do not say that gumwood is as pretty as some of the harder woods, but with modern practice carpenters have been able to turn out a very good scheme of interior decoration with its use.

It can be finished very attractively, either painted or stained, and it has a certain permanency that many of the softer woods have not.

One thing in particular pertaining to the selection of gumwood for interior trim is that the wood should be properly cured before installation. If the wood either is too dry or too damp it will pull out from its fastening when the first heat is put into the house and all the nailing in the world will not get it to go back in place again.

Have Chimney Higher Than Ridge of Roof

Tops of chimneys should extend at least three feet above flat roofs and two feet above the ridge of a hip or gable roof, and should be properly capped.

The flue lining should project at least four inches above the chimney top to allow for a two-inch wash and a two-inch projection. This prevents disintegration of chimneys by freezing and thawing, as there is no chance for water to collect and remain around the top of the flue and in the cracks between the mortar and masonry.

The wash or splay should be formed of a cement mortar. The draft would be improved if this surface was concave wherever possible.

Plan for Fixtures

Plan the bathroom in advance, not at the last minute, and allow plenty of space for the fixtures, which should include tub, shower, pedestal or wall hung lavatory and a low-down sink combination. For the kitchen choose preferably a 30-inch high, modern one-piece sink complete with drain board, and therefore easily cleaned.
