

Conservation of Texas Waters. Nature is wise in



wasteful in the use of nature's gifts. A few years ago the streams of Texas were regarded as valuable only for providing water for stock and fishing for idlers. Since Texas has become a farming country we find that we need the waters of every stream for irrigating our fertile valleys. The corpora-

tions are seeing the great value in these waters that are now going to waste and they are bidding for "water rights" along Texas rivers. The people should be slow to part with these rights, for the result will be that in time they will merely be farming for the corporations that will exact every cent for water that the farmers can pay. Great storage reservoirs should be built wherever possible, but they should belong to the people who own When hearts were sore, and eyes were the adjacent lands and not to corporations. Texas needs a constitutional provision safeguarding its waters from corporate control, otherwise the streams will soon be under the control of exacting corporate interests o whom the land owners will virtually be enslaved.

> Irrigation Districts the Remedy. Whatever corporations are able to if any. do, the people themselves can do under good management. Instead of giving the streams of Texas to private or corporate interests for the exploitation of land owners, the laws should be so amended that only the people who own lands may use the water. missioner They may organize irrigation districts Saturday. under existing laws, but individuals and corporations are on equal footing with land owners, and the public is slow to vote bonds for irrigation projects. Our laws governing water conto the liking of those who want to acquire this great source of wealth. As the laws now stand, unless the streams are soon saved to the people by the organization of irrigation districts, our waters will soon pass into the ownership of corporations from which it will be impossible to wrest them. Right now greedy speculators have their eyes on every stream in Texas and are using every effort to get pos session of them.

Texas Needs a New Constitution. The constitution of Texas is out of date. It was framed for a country almost without population and that needed but few laws. Lands were then worth very little and exploitation "The boss cert'n'y is a sport," the of the public by individuals and corernor, were given large authority in the belief that such authority would not be abused. The powers of the governor have been increased from time to time by legislative enactment until he has, through his appointive control of the State government. During his term of office he is an almost unrestrained dictator, able to bring all the strength of the State government to carry out his will, whether it be bad. Texas is in the unenviable position of being at the mercy of its governing head. We have exalted official rights and privileges and have lowered those of the individual. Texas needs a new declaration of principles and a constitution for their enforcement that will restore the ordinary citizen to his former rights as a citizen and that will make its officials servants of the people and not their masters.

Hi-Jacking a Popular Profession. Crime in every form appears to have become a popular pastime in Texas. We no longer speak of a "crime wave," but now have a "crime inundation." whole five-dollar bill the day before Criminals no longer fear grand juries, stand in awe of courts, or are terrorized by prisons. All these apparently are accepted as the possible consequences of the business, retarding it temporarily at times, but not seriously handicapping it. Criminals serve terms or are pardoned merely to resume their chosen life work, and a few influential friends with money may almost insure escape from purishment for crime of any kind.

Crime Should Be Punished. The public has become too lax in law enforcement; too much sympathy is being shown convicts. So-called "prison reform" methods have resulted in a maudlin sentiment that has given encouragement to crime. Prisoners are no longer reformed, but spend their short terms in prison studying new methods in their profession. Prisons have become crime schools, open forums in the discussion of methods, under the leadership of the most expert in their several lines. The most seasoned criminals among them are the greatest heroes. need to cultivate mercy, but in failing to punish crime we are lending it pub lic support.

The World Gets Better.

Those who read the crime reports often conclude that the world is going to the bow-wows. Despite the boldness with which crime is committed. the criminals are comparatively few in number. The vast majority of people are improving in intellect, in morals, in religion, in all things that go to make the world better. world is a happier place in which to ago; the people get more joy out of life than they once did. They are doing more to make others happy

Daddys Ivening DAIRY FACTS

PROTEINS NEEDED FOR DAIRY COWS

Many dairymen overlook the fact that summer pastures supply an insufficient amount of proteins to enable a dairy cow to give her best production, according to the National Dairy council in advocating that some grain rations be used at all times to supplement grasses, even if alfalfa, clover, soy beans or other legume crops are being pastured.

Prof. W. J. Fraser of the University of Illinois has made an interesting statement to emphasize this fact to dairymen. He referred to a pasture experiment made during twelve weeks of mid-summer by the Illinois experiment station, and summarizes the results thus:

"It would have required 30 acres of pasture to support an ordinary cow. If the cow is to graze over this area every week, she would have to travel 30 miles a day and have a muzzle two feet wide.

Prof. J. J. Hooper of the Kentucky experiment station made a similar observation, to determine how much grass a dairy cow required. He clipped, some grass with a pair of shears and was surprised at the area required to yield 100 pounds, the amount needed by a 1,000-pound cow giving 25 pounds of milk a day.

"I had to clip 800 square feet of blue grass," states Professor Hooper. "the heads of which stood 15 inches high. All the blades were not this high, but the seed heads were. I clipped as close as a cow would graze, and the grass was good and thick."

By cramming the grass into gunny sacks, Professor Hooper used three sacks, showing how much grass a cow must eat each day to produce even a minimum amount of milk.

Dairymen should not overlook the value of feeding their cheaper grains for increased efficiency, according to the National Dairy council. A surplus of corn during the winter has made this a desirable feed for dairy lows if supplemented by protein feeds, while the prices paid for dairy products have been maintained by an increasing demand for milk, butter, ice cream and cheese. Not only does the dairy farmer make a profit by thus marketing corn products, but he is paid regularly throughout the year. and in addition still has valuable fertilizer with which to maintain the fer tility of his land.

Type and Equipment of

Model Farm Milk House Years of study have resulted in the development of a type of farm milk house and equipment for the production of clean and wholesome milk on the carm. This building, with its cooler, storage tank, wash sink, and steamer, is one of the essentials in the production of a wholesome food product through the "milk route." At the request of the Smithsonian institution in Washington, D. C., a miniature of a model farm milk house will be placed on exhibition there, where it will form a part of the mammoth display of various other factors at. fecting the food and the health of the nation. Preliminary plans for the model have been drawn by the bureau of dairying of the United States Department of Agriculture. It will be constructed and put in place by the department's office of exhibits.

Is Profitable Practice


"Does it pay to feed grain to my cows?" is a question which many farmers will be asking themselves. Results have been obtained in Kansas cow test association work clearly proving that it does, even in a season of high feed prices. Under favorable conditions it is possible to produce an average of 150 pounds of fat yearly on a ration of good roughage such as alfalfa, hay and silage. But with cows capable of producing more than this it is very questionable if it is economical to limit the feed. Like a manufacturing plant, the dairy cow is only operating on the most economical basis when being run to her normal capacity.

Remove Horns From Cattle

Unless dairy animals are to be used for show purposes their horns should he removed. Cows with horns endanger each other and even their attendants. Many a good udder has been partially or totally spoiled by a gouge from a sharp horn. Bulls are much more easily and safely handled when dehorned. The easiest way to remove horns is with caustic potash on the week-old calf. Clip the hair around the horn button and rub the spot about the size of a penny with the stick of caustic until blood appears.

Regularity With Cows

Feeding, watering, milking and turning the cows out for exercise should be done as regularly as possible every day. The time between feeding and milking mornings and nights should be divided as evenly as possible. Milking should be done as rapidly as possible without being rough, and it is impor-tant that the cows should be milked dry, because milk remaining in the udder after the cows have been milked acts as a positive check upon future

In planning a one-story home, however, care should be taken to avoid the natural tendency to spreading and irregular shapes which often materially increases the cost of building to an extent out of proportion to results obtained. Compactness is a prime virtue in the modern house and it is especially important in the bungalow. Rectangular forms are always the most compact and the more closely they approach the square the greater space is obtained in proportion to construction cost,


