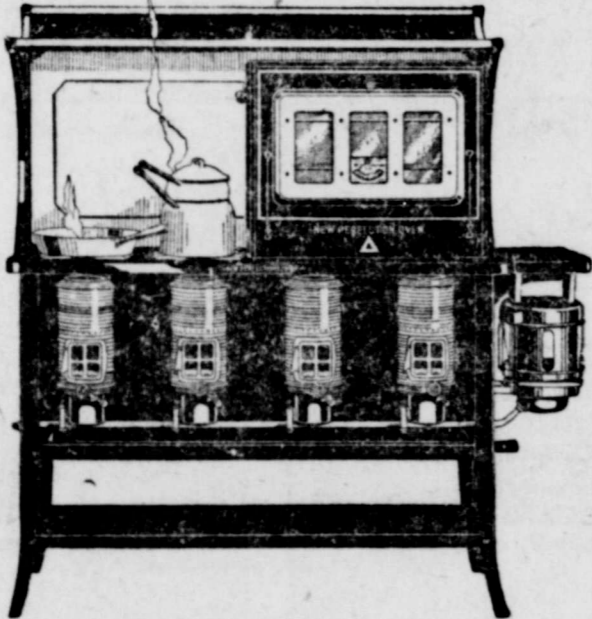

## WELLINGTON LADY DIES AFTER AUTO ACCIDENT

Mrs. Leo Chaney of Wellington suffered a fractured skull when the car in which she was returning from Amarillo was struck by another automobile and overturned Sunday afternoon on the highway a mile west of Hedley. She died that night in the hospital at Wellington. She was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Skaggs, a sister, Mrs. Fennel, both of whom were hurt, and two children who escaped injury.

Sheriff elect M. O. Barnett, who was nearby when the tragic event took place, pursued and arrested the driver of the other car, who is said to be a Wellington chiropractor. He later made bond. Mrs. Chaney was a sister of Mrs. Chas. Boies, who lived in Hedley some years ago.

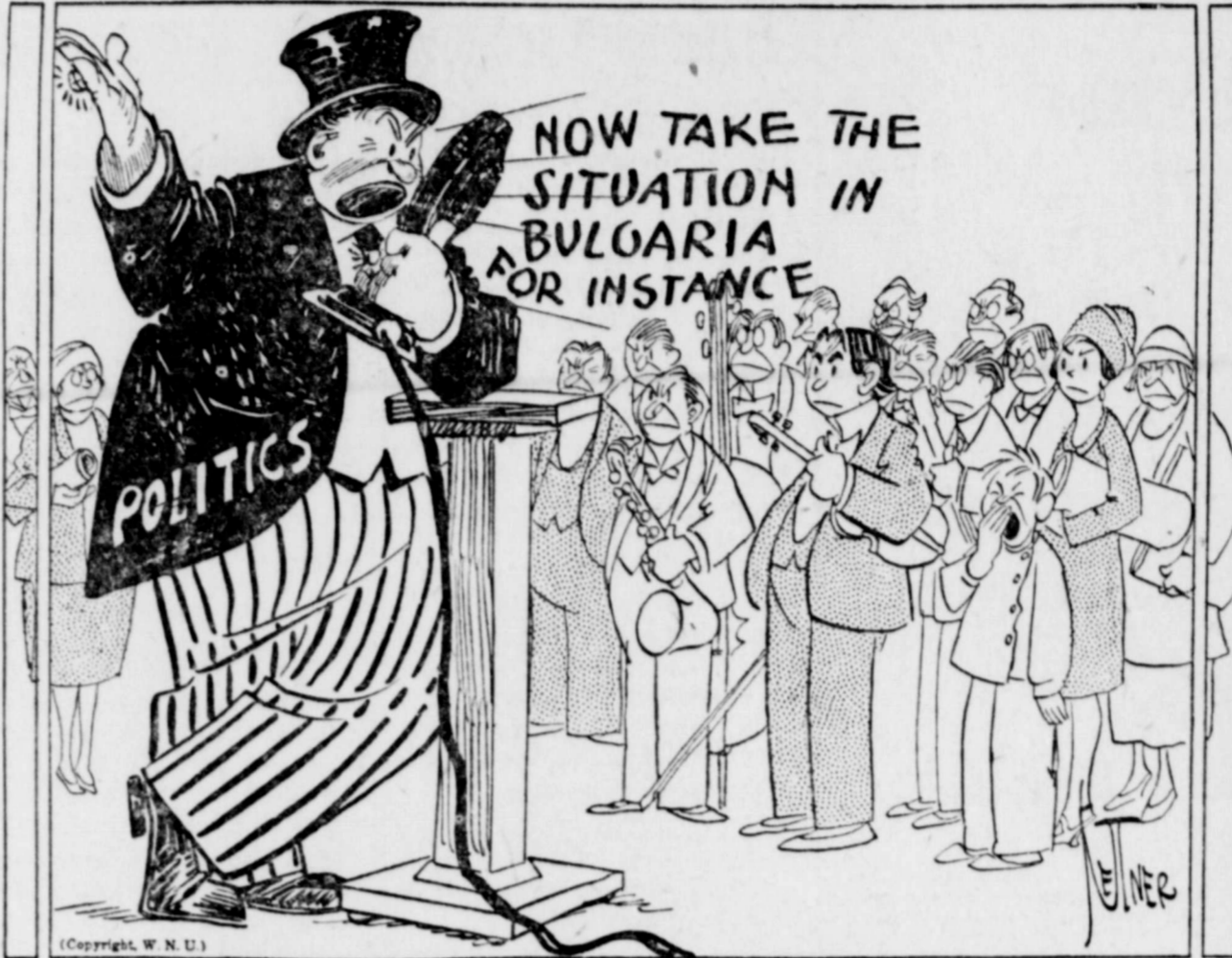

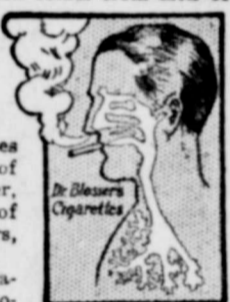

2 cups green corn pulp.  
2 EGGS  
2 1/2 tablespoons flour.  
1/4 level teaspoons Calumet Baking Powder.  
1 level teaspoon salt.  
Dash of pepper or paprika.  
1 tablespoon melted shortening.  
The corn must be uncooked and freshly scraped, not cut. Beat the egg yolks into the corn, then fold in stiff whites. Add other ingredients. It may need more flour, but add as little as possible. Fry in a hot greased frying pan browning on one side then the other.

...nce conference between the Liberal  
and Conservative forces in Nicaragua  
which it was hoped would end the  
civil strife in that republic. American  
peace forces already had landed at  
... and were preserving the  
peace. The leaders of the Liberals in-  
dicated they would continue, with  
Mexican help, their fight against  
Samarro's de facto government un-  
less the peace conference should of-  
fer them considerable concessions.  
They want the former vice president  
deposed and deported and Senor  
Cassas made president. Mr. Dennis  
insists that all factions must agree  
to a free and impartial election.

TWO representatives of the Polish  
government arrived in Washington  
and presented to President Coolidge  
9 volumes containing the signatures  
of 5,000,000 Poles expressing their  
affitude to the United States for its  
post-war help. One million of the  
signers are those of school children  
and the remainder are those of par-  
ents in all walks of life. The pres-  
ent also was presented with a com-  
memorative gold medal and silver  
medals from the same dies were given  
Secretary of Commerce Hoover and  
United States Military academy.

TWO notable men met death by ac-  
cident last week. H. H. Topaka-  
s, wealthy importer and for years  
Russian consul general in New York,  
was killed by a fall from the seven-  
teenth story of the Yale club in that  
city. D. P. Davis, one of the best  
own of Florida's real estate men  
and the builder of Davis islands at  
Naples, fell overboard from the liner  
Destic while en route to Europe  
and was drowned.

AFTER a 40-day siege, the city  
of Wuchang, China, was stormed  
and captured by the Cantonese troops.  
The commander of the garrison was  
killed and promptly executed, but it  
is presumed his forces would be in-  
corporated in the Canton army. The  
siegers gained their first entry into  
the city through treachery of some of  
the defenders, and the ensuing battle  
was fierce and bloody. The civilians  
who remained passive were not mor-  
tally.

A cablegram from Peking says three  
American missionaries who were cap-  
tured by bandits in western Hunan  
province have been released without  
payment of ransom after being held  
several days. They are Miss Minerva Welt-  
ch, Karl H. Beck of the Reformed  
mission and Miss Lydia Koebe of the  
Anglican mission.

BOTH France and Poland have per-  
fectly balanced budgets for 1927,  
according to official announcements.  
The French budget provides for the  
reduction of approximately \$1,237,  
000 in direct and indirect taxes  
and makes no provision for exterior  
political debts, but does contain cred-  
its which cover payments for A. E. F.  
stocks and take care of the Mo-  
rocco loan. Almost one-third of Pol-  
and's income for next year will go  
to the army, and the next largest  
amount will be set aside for the  
ministry of education.

Finance Minister Volpi of Italy says  
the government is determined to sta-  
bilize the native currency and stop  
speculation. The program is to  
utilize the lira at 120 to the Eng-  
lish pound, a figure which will enable  
Italy to import raw materials at  
reasonable prices and dispose of  
products at a fair profit.

TALIN and his colleagues in the  
Soviet government of Russia have  
shown patience with Trotsky. Zinov-  
iev and Pyatakotiv, who have been  
leading on a campaign against the  
government throughout the country, and have  
been tried and placed on trial before  
the central control committee of the  
Communist party.

DELIBERATION for nearly six  
hours failed to bring a verdict  
from the jury that heard the  
piracy case against Harry M. Da-  
vis, former attorney general, and  
F. Miller, former alien property  
owner, so the jurors were dismis-  
sed. Their final vote was 7 to 5 for  
acquittal of Daucherty and 10 to 0  
for conviction of Miller. The indict-  
ment stands, but the government  
attorneys would not say whether a  
new trial would be granted.

## TO CUT THE FARMERS

Much has been said about the difference in weights on cotton put up in Round Bale as compared with the usual square bale method

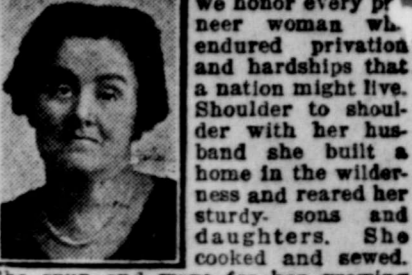

No consumer or customer will  
be allowed to furnish another  
water through his or her or its  
hydrant and meter, and if such  
consumer does furnish any other  
person through his or her or its  
meter such customer will forfeit  
further right and privilege to  
such water and will be cut off  
from further use of said water.  
Any person other than the duly  
authorized and empowered agent  
employee or representative of  
the City of Hedley who shall or  
does go into, open up or enter  
any meter box on said water-  
works system within the city  
limits of the city of Hedley shall  
thereby commit a misdemeanor  
and be fined in a sum not exceed-  
ing \$5.00, and if such person is  
a consumer of water shall have  
his, her or its water supply cut  
off for going into, opening or en-  
tering such water meter.

Whereas, because of the neces-  
sity of immediately installing  
and putting into operation the  
waterworks system and because  
there is no exact rate of charge  
for the water consumed or rules  
regulating the same, there is an  
emergency creating an impera-  
tive public necessity that the  
rule requiring ordinances to be  
read on three separate days be-  
fore final passage be suspended,  
and such is hereby suspended,  
and it is ordained and enacted  
that this ordinance shall take ef-  
fect and be in force immediately  
upon its approval.

40c per 1000 gallons for the next  
40 000 gallons; and 25c per 1000  
gallons for all over 50,000 gallons  
per month  
That all bills due or to become  
due for the use of water from  
said waterworks system shall be  
payable in advance unless the  
user is using such water under  
meter measurements  
In the event any consumer or  
patron of the said waterworks  
system fails and refuses or fails  
or refuses to pay such charges  
in advance, such customer and  
patron of said waterworks sys-  
tem will be cut off from further
